#### **March of Dimes To Have Airlift**

The New March of Dimes will hold an airlift this weekend with proceeds going to the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation. This is the first time such an activity has been held in this area, providing an opportunity to see many points of interest from the air at a substantial saving, while at the same time contributing to a worthy cause. The airlift will consist of four

to six passenger airplanes flying a course which will afford an excellent view of downtown Pontiac, the new Courthouse and service center, plus other interesting places in six outlying Townships, including most major lakes.
