March of Dimes To Have Airlift

The New March of Dimes will hold an airlift this weekend with proceeds going to the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation. This is the first time such an activity has been held in this area, providing an opportunity to see many points of interest from the air at a substantial saving, while at the same time contributing to a worthy cause.

The airlift will consist of four to six passenger airplanes flying a course which will afford an excellent view of downtown Pontiac, the new Courthouse and service center, plus other interesting places in six outlying townships. Headquarters for the airlift will be the new terminal building at Pontiac Airport, and cadets from interlakes group No. 6310, Michigan Wing, Civil Air Patrol, will be on duty assisting with parking and escorting passengers to and from airplanes.

All aircraft to be used have been donated by the various owners. Adult tickets will be \$2.50, while tickets for children up to age 17 will be \$2.00. The \$2.00 rate will also apply to organized groups of six or more, such as Scout Troops, Clubs, and Lodges. Hours will be from 10:30 a.m. until dark on Saturday, and Sunday from 12:30 p.m. until dark. Tickets will be on sale at the gate.

It is hoped many will take advantage of this opportunity, and lend their support to the New March of Dimes.

With the excitement and sometimes hectic holiday pace behind us, the winter weeks that lie ahead are among the best of the year for reading—for several reasons. First, there is heightened pleasure in, as well as greater opportunity for an evening's reading when the weather is inclement. There is also less large scale entertaining to prepare for or recover from. And, very important, following Christmas, there is a need for inexpensive occupation. Concerning this need, no pastime or education costs less than that provided by the Independence Township Library.

Right now, this incomparable bargain is particularly attractive because of recent additions to the library shelves. These include: "No Longer at Ease," a novel by the young Nigerian writer, Chinua Achebe. It is the story of an African tragically under pressure from a changing world. "The Listener" by Taylor Caldwell, a 1946 novel written by a Miss Caldwell shows through a series of modern parables what desperation and spiritual aridity can result when fundamental faith is lost or allowed to wither. "Mans real need," writes Miss Caldwell, "is for someone to listen to him, not just as a 'patient,' but as a human soul."

Taylor Caldwell is the author of the popular story of St. Luke, "Dear and Glorious Physician." Those who have not read it will be happy to know it is most available, your library has three volumes. A thoroughly delightful book is "The Edge of Sadness" by Edwin O'Connor. He will be remembered as the author of "The Last Hurrah," and in this book as in the last he has an absorbing tale to tell in a style that is a pleasure to read.

The talented Dutch author of both plays and novels, Jan DeHartog is again at his best with the novel "The Inspector." It is a story which takes place in the spring of 1946, of a Dutch Inspector of Criminal Investigation and a young Jewish girl just freed from a concentration camp, who are involved in a weird and fascinating journey.

Two new and unusual mystery books are on the shelves for those who enjoy a taste of crime. "The Pledge" by Friedroch Durrenmat, a Swiss and another author playwright, has written a mystery that will appeal to the most demanding of fiction-readers, as well as the most surfeited of mystery-story devotees.

The English writer Julian Symonds tells a story of suspense in "The Progress of a Crime," that involves a reporter who witnesses a crime by a juvenile gang on Guy Fawks Night. It is an attention holder from beginning to end.

The Clarkston Village Players have chosen the popular mystery comedy "Ten Little Indians," by the well-known author of mysteries, Agatha Christie, as their next play. This will be presented Friday and Saturday, February 23 and 24.

Hal Newhouse, Oakland County Campaign Director for the New March of Dimes, this week officially opened the 1962 Fund-raising drive by announcing a goal of \$150,000.00 to be raised during January. Newhouse, former Detroit Tiger Pitching star, made an appeal for the voluntary health charity at a special kickoff brunch for Oakland County mayors, Village presidents, and Township Supervisors held this week at the Birmingham community house. He commented, "The March of Dimes, a January tradition for over twenty years, is continuing its good and necessary work in an expanded program which we now call, 'The New March of Dimes.' With the discovery of the Salk and Sabin polio vaccines, many thought the work of the National Foundation to be completed. However, while these vaccines have helped immeasurably to reduce the occurrence of polio in children and adults, there still is no cure for those who contract the disease. In addition to searching for such a cure, the National Foundation, for which the new March of Dimes is the most extensive patient care program of any health charity for those afflicted with the various types of polio. Moreover, the National Foundation's research is tackling other virus-oriented diseases, notably Arthritis and crip-

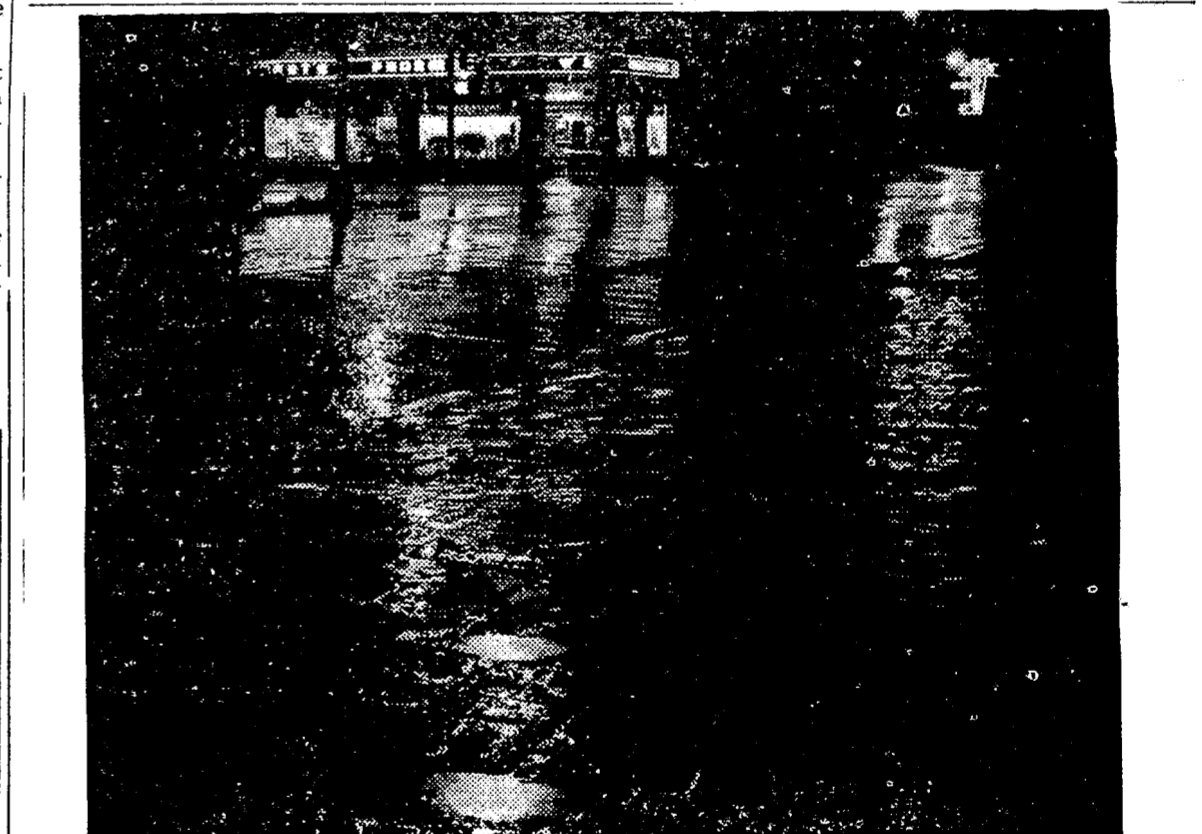
