Open Letter To - - - Clarkston Residents

Feb. 6, 1962

On March 12th, the registered voters of the Village of Clarkston are going to decide a very important issue. It is unfortunate, but necessary, that the very wording of this referendum is detrimental to the cause. The wording of the referendum is roughly as follows "to allow the sale of spirits (in addition to beer and wine) for consumption on the premises in the Village of Clarkston".

A favorable "yes" vote on this issue will not increase the number of places where alcoholic beverages are served in the Village. It will enable the present owner of the tavern license in Clarkston to reclassify his license to a class C license and to trans-

fer it to Win Schuler Restaurant, Inc. This would enable Mr. Schuler to locate in our Village.

So in reality this vote is not a matter of "liquor". Actually it is a matter of whether the people of Clarkston want to have an attractive Early American styled building worth from a quarter to a half million dollars in our village, or whether they prefer to stifle progress to a point where we become regressive.

Monday, February 12th is the last day to register for the March 12th election in the Village. There are still a considerable number of qualified voters who are not registered. Some of these people may think that they are registered. They are apt to

be very disappointed when they attempt to vote on March 12th.

There are a few points I would like to make clear; Township & Village elections are entirely separate. Village elections are held in the Village Council Room next to Ronk's Barber Shop. Registration for Township election and registration for Village are also entirely separate. Being a registered voter in the Township and a resident of the Village of Clarkston does not mean that you are registered to vote in Village elections! Check with Village Clerk Ralph Thayer or with Charles Robinson in the Bank. Make sure that you are registered.

Psychologist To Hold Classes

Mr. John Jadwin, Mental Hygienist and School Psychologist, will conduct a series of eight meetings on "The Development and Health Personalities and Satisfying Relationships" beginning on Thursday, February 8th, at the First Methodist Church, Clarkston, 6600 Waldon Road. This series of lectures and discussion periods is being sponsored by The Christian Social Concerns Commission of First Methodist Church.

Mr. Jadwin holds the A.B. M.A., and ED. S. Degrees from The University of Michigan, and is at present School Psychological Consultant and Visiting Teacher with the Clarkston Public Schools where he is working with families of children with emotional problems. He just recently completed the University of Michigan graduate degree of Specialist in Educational Psychology. He additionally serves the community as Psychological Diagnostician for the Mentally Handicapped, and has a private practice as mental hygienist specializing in problems of personality and family relationships.

Mr. Jadwin's meetings will begin at 8:00 p.m. and continue every Thursday evening through March 29th. The first talk and discussion will center around the subject "What is Personality?" and will deal with the relationship of personality to the succeeding Thursday evenings are "How Personality Develops", "What is Normal", "Abnormal Personalities", "Perception", "Communication", "Emotional Maturity", and on the final Thursday, "The Challenge of Daily Living."

The classes are open to all residents of the area. A coffee hour with refreshments will be held during the discussion period. This is a community service project presented by the church. Speaking of the series, Reverend William J. Richards, pastor of First Church said, "Most of us cannot afford to miss such an opportunity as this to learn to know ourselves. Many guilt feelings which seek to destroy our personalities we learn to control by knowing and mastering ourselves. How can we know and understand others if we do not know ourselves?"

County Electricity Use Triples

The citizens of Oakland County last year used an amount of electricity equal to that used by the whole country of Greece for the year.

Oakland County's customers used three times as much as was consumed ten years ago and eleven times the amount used in 1941.

Detroit Edison serves 182,088 homes in Oakland County. To supply the electrical needs of customers and provide for the future, requires a small army of Edison people, more than 600 of whom are assigned full-time in Oakland County.

In 1961, alone The Detroit Edison Co. built 65 miles of transmission and distribution lines, brought new service to some 5,000 customers and install 703 new street lights in Oakland County Communities. They completed work on four new substations enlarged electrical facilities and buildings at six other stations and renovated or re-modeled several smaller facilities.

The professions represented by company employees are numerous. The story of electrical service in this county and elsewhere is a story about people and the hundreds of ways in which they serve other people.
