Win Schuler's Restaurants operate under a very strict cost control system aimed at insuring his guests good food while, at the same time, guaranteeing him above average profits.

As in Marshall, should Schuler build in Clarkston, the small town location would enable him to keep taxes, wages and other costs low, enabling him to offer luxurious service at well below big city prices. Holiday magazine lists Schuler's as one of the nation's finest eating places.

Upon ordering a meal at a Schuler restaurant, the Schuler extra's start coming. Each dinner patron is served such extras as garlic toast, cheddar cheese, hot home-made bread, and relishes galore, including for instance, marinated herring, and chicken liver pate.

One of the main reasons for all these extra's is to keep customers from fidgeting impatiently while waiting for their main course, which generally takes about half an hour to prepare. The reason for what may seem to some as a long wait, is the special preparations of the food. Most meats are cooked to order, and fresh vegetables are prepared in small pans.

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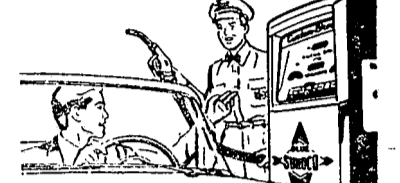

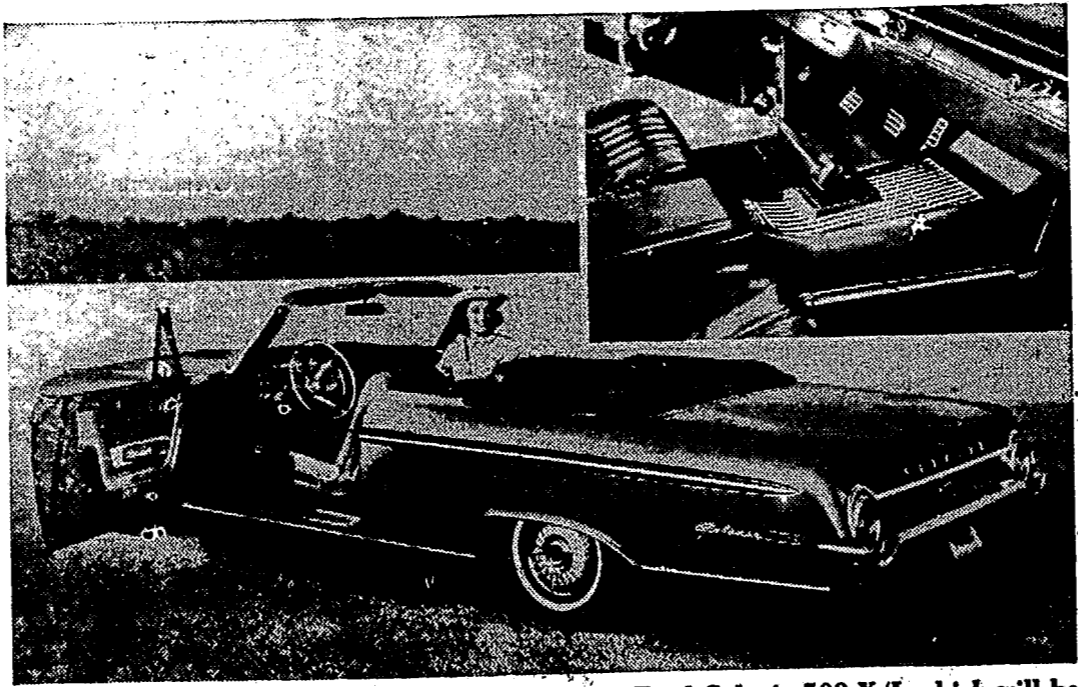

## Health and Safety Tips

### SKI INJURIES

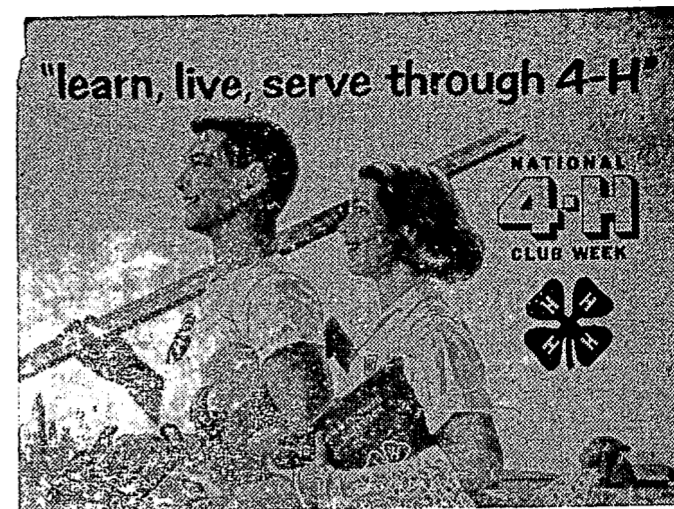
A few years ago a newspaper article on ski injuries would have been of personal interest only to a relatively few people in the mountain areas of the northern fringe of the United States. In the winter of 1961-62 skiing has grown to major proportions and Americans over a wide section of the nation are heading for the slopes and runs on winter weekends. Artificial snow machines make skiing possible even in areas that have little or no snow, and many fans are traveling long distances to the Get and stay in good physical condition, and don't be over confident in estimating skiing ability, and you're not likely to suffer serious injury, says an article in Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

Ski experts advise several weeks of daily exercise before braving the slopes. Ten minutes a day of knee bends toe-walking, deep waist bends and a few push-ups will condition the body for simple skiing. For the thigh muscles, sit on the edge of the table and lift the legs, straightening them out slowly. Add light weights to each foot and keep up the exercise.

Beginners are cautioned to take ski lessons from an expert instructor. Learn controlled skiing, learning how to check your speed and learning to avoid falls beyond your ability. Never ski alone. A buddy can go for help in case of accident.

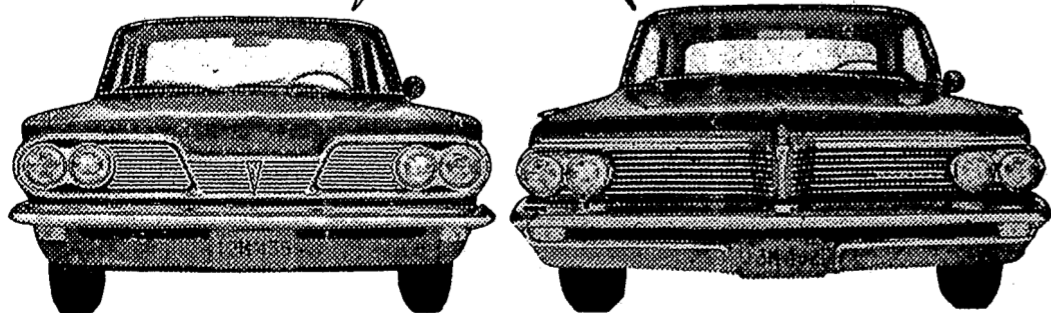

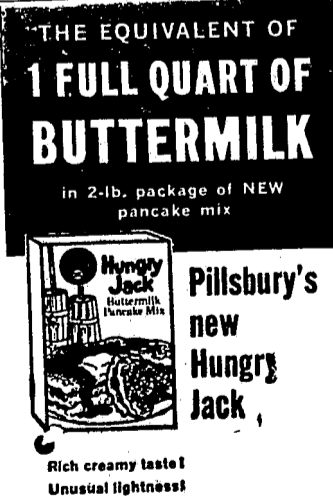

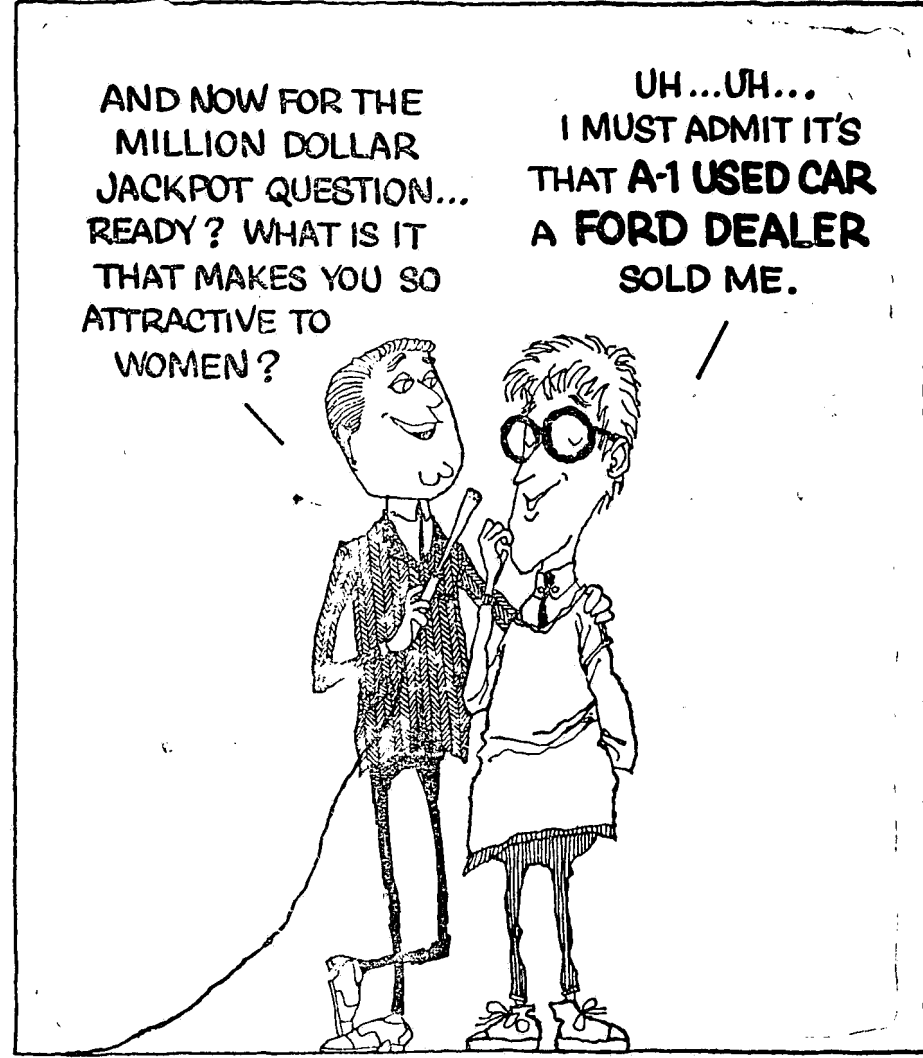
