## The Book Nook

"What's new?" might well be called a slogan of our day. The newspapers and radio daily and by the hour, keep us abreast of the times. New forms of expression in the arts, new lines in clothes and cars, new tastes in recipes are constantly being brought to our attention. The past is almost forgotten, but, occasionally something tugs us back and we rediscover its wealth.

While browsing through the 800 section of the Independence Township Library shelves I chanced upon a story I had read years ago in the Saturday Evening Post in an anthology of Post Stories-1950. I found it as much pleasure to reread as had been my first reading, perhaps, moreso. I strongly recommend it. "The Rider on the Pale Horse" by Helen Eustis makes good reading aloud and will enthrall young listeners as well as old. The "rider" is death and tells of his love affair in a delightful western style.

There is varied fare in literature in the 800 section as these shelves contain anthologies of poetry, plans, essays, humorous writings, etc.

**The World That Couldn't Be**, a collection of science fiction novelets from the magazine Galaxy, edited by H.L. Gold, give disturbing glimpses into the future.

The past of our country is presented through words and pictures in **Literary America**. The editors, David E. Scherman and Rosemarie Redlich, have compiled photographs, biographical sketches and bits of representative writing of ninety-two American authors. A charming book.

**A Treasury of American Folk Humor** is a rare confection of laughter, tall tales, jests and gems of merriment of the American people, edited by James N. Tidwell.

The broad scope of **The World's Best** edited by Whit Burnett, will be best appreciated after spending a few hours with this fine book. Published in 1950, it contains the works of one-hundred and fifty living authors representing twenty-three countries.

An unusual book, **Afternoon of an Author** is a collection of hither-to uncollected stories by F. Scott Fitzgerald, as well as photographs from the author's scrapbook in the Princeton Library.

**10,000 Jokes, Toasts and Stories and Popular Quotations for All Uses**, both edited by Lewis and Faye Copeland, were compiled and arranged for reading enjoyment as well as an aid to public speakers and writers. In the latter under "Books" I found a quotation to use in closing. "Reading is to the mind, what exercise is to the body."

## Ten Little Indians Big Success

Take one murder mystery, add large quantities of suspense and a good dose of humor, mix well with some good enthusiastic acting, and the result is a highly enjoyable evening. Our Clarkston Village Players presentation of Agatha Christie's **Ten Little Indians** was just such an evening.

This play, the third production of the Village Players, was a real thriller. Its theme was a parable of the old nursery rhyme. "Ten little indians, standing in a line. One of them chokes himself and then there were nine." As the "Indians", actually house-guests in a large country house on an island off the English coast, are mysteriously murdered, one-by-one, the suspense mounts. Which guest is the murderer? Will all end just as the rhyme ends "...and then there were none?"

The third act of the play was definitely the highlight, not only because of the plot, but from the standpoint of some very good acting. Especially deserving of mention were the performances of Pete Rose as Sir Lawrence Wargrave, as it turned out, the villain, Nancy Lasswell as Secretary Vera Claythorne, Lew Wint as Phillip Lombard, and the part of Detective William Blore, played with a very convincing cockney accent by Dick Thomas.

The staging of the play was very well done. The lighting and sound effects, especially those of the roar of the sea and lightning flashes, contributed a great deal to the mood of mystery.

We should all be very proud of the Village Players. A considerable amount of hard work by many persons went into making this play the pleasant evening of entertainment that it was. The best way to express our pride is to "fill the house" at all of their performances. It is certain to be an evening well spent.

## THE SCHULER'S RESTAURANT STORY

An interesting and often more worth while occupation of Win Schuler's is his trips to other successful restaurants across the country. He goes as a customer in order to see the various restaurants as customers see them, rather than as management sees them. On these field trips he looks for ideas that appeal to him as a patron.

Behind-the-scenes operations play a big part in making the Schuler restaurants successful. One element is the commissary, located in Marshall which buys meat and most other foods and resells it to the five restaurants, thus cutting costs by volume purchases. Each year the Schuler organization utilizes in excess of a quarter of a million pounds of

trimmed and proportioned steaks. They have purchased much 4-H as well as other championship meat.

Another interesting behind-the-scenes operation of the Schuler restaurants is the close cost and menu control. Most restaurants use a simple system to determine whether their revenues are covering costs and providing profit. They may figure for example, that food costs should not amount to more than 40% of revenues. If in any period food costs rise above this percentage, the restaurant may raise prices to try to cut food costs. Changes in labor or other costs, of course, call for an adjustment of the formula.
