## CLARKSTON SEES RECORD TURNOUT

Eighty-nine percent of the registered voters in the village of Clarkston made their appearance at the polls last Monday to make this a record turn out for a village election. Out of 349 registered voters, 304 turned out at the polls. Considering the fact that the total population of Clarkston is approximately 780, the village residents are to be commended for their fine turn out.

"Liquor by the glass," a large issue in the election, was voted by a 246 yes; 58 no vote. This referendum is believed to be the reason for the large turn out of voters. The possibility of a Win Schuler Restaurant being built in Clarkston, is greater than ever.

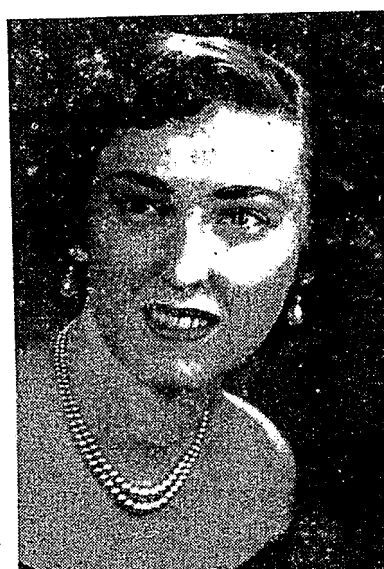

Mrs. Fred Haney very beautifully added to the service with her solo "God So Loved the World."

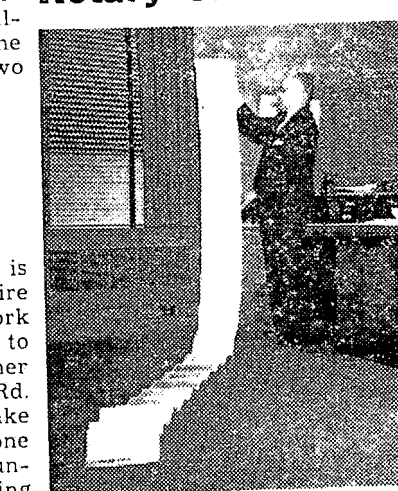
Proceeds from the offering were sent to the national headquarters of the United Church Women's World Day of Prayer.

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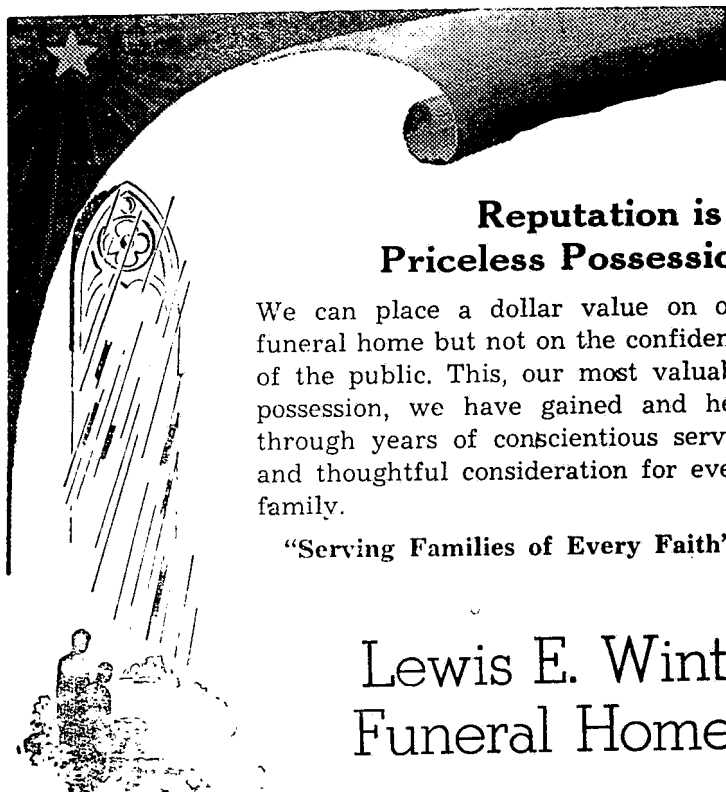
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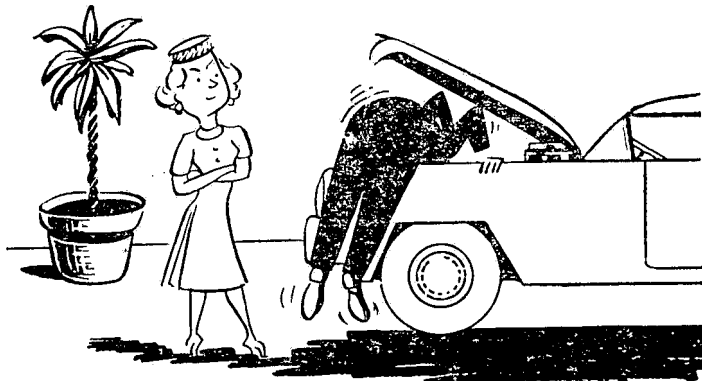

#### HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS NOSEBLEEDS

How do you stop a nosebleed? Almost everyone has his own pet remedy. Remember the technique of inserting a wad of paper under the upper lip? And after a while the bleeding stopped. Of course, the paper probably didn't really help and the bleeding would have stopped anyway.

Some people, particularly children, have frequent nosebleeds even though they have no serious disease. Small blood vessels under the delicate nasal lining may rupture easily, especially during violent exertion. Nosebleeds are common following a blow on the nose.

Exposure to high altitudes can cause nasal bleeding. Some diseases also are credited in nosebleeds. High blood pressure sometimes is to blame.

Loss of blood usually is much less than the victim thinks, and, unless bleeding persists, this loss usually isn't serious.

Several suggestions for treating nosebleeds are offered in the February issue of Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association --

- \* Have the victim sit up unless he is faint.
- \* Apply large, cold, wet towels over the face, nose and back of the head and neck.
- \* Pinch the nostrils together. The bleeding point is usually near the tip of the nose.
- \* Keep the victim quiet. He should not cough, blow his nose or walk about during or soon after a nosebleed. Even talking or laughing should be avoided. He should breathe through his mouth.
- \* If bleeding is severe or prolonged, call a physician.
