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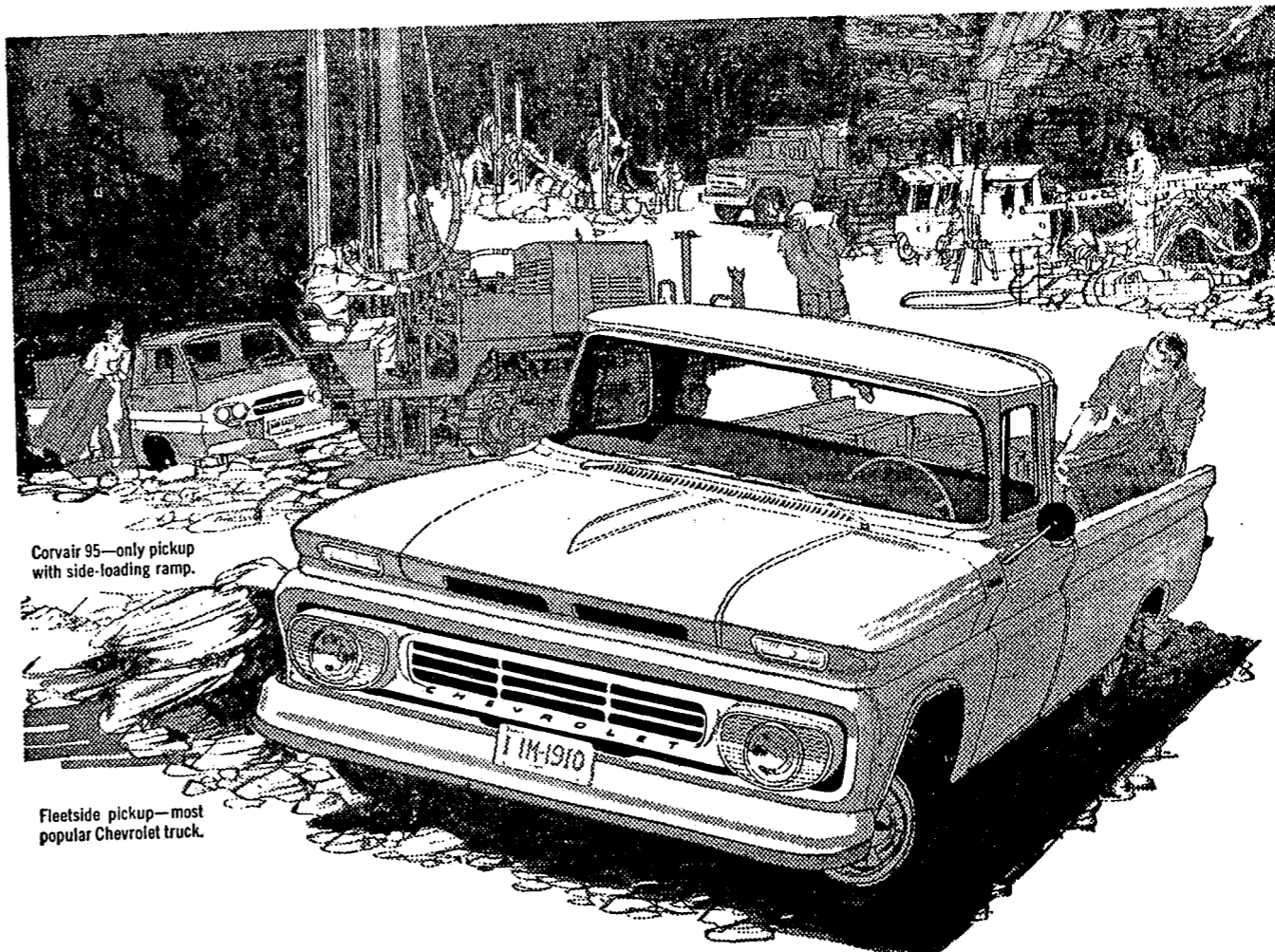


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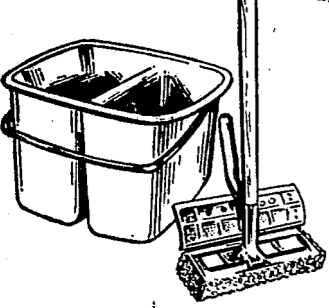

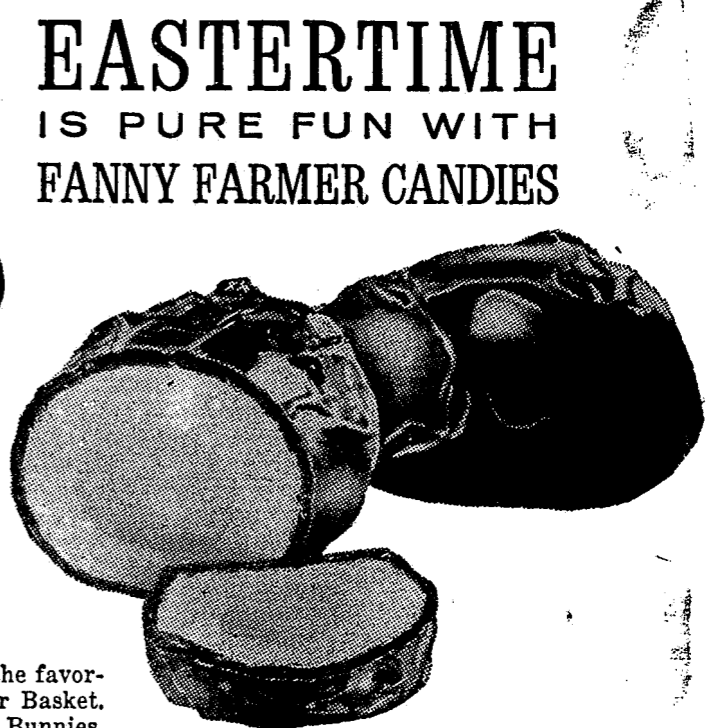
Sharon Williams. Eleanor Andrews led the group in singing "Songs of Spring".
