## Another Day . . .

Thru the cold winter of 1818, a sleigh occupied by one man drove across Canada from New York state to Detroit. There is no record of where the man went after he got to Detroit — probably too tired to go any farther. And we don't know how long the trip took, but if he faced weather similar to the winter we just went thru, he was a brave soul. Apparently Canadian sleigh rides never became popular as a means of reaching the West from the Eastern states. For in the early 1800's, when young men, and some not so young, came West to make their fortunes, they came to Ohio, Indiana and Michigan territories. This trip was simplified when the Erie Canal was finally completed, opening a direct route from the Hudson River to Lake Erie, from Albany to Buffalo, a distance of approximately 363 miles.

The earliest settlers in our area were mainly farmers who had found that the best land in the seaboard states had been taken and since they were for the most part, poor men, they didn't have the price of a farm that was already under cultivation. But land could be had in Michigan territory for those with enough courage to cut their farms out of the wilderness and men of all walks of life, blacksmiths and whitesmiths, wheelwrights and millwrights, coopers and drovers, joined the farmers in the westward trip.

In 1831, Wilson Bailey arrived in Detroit, and finding no railroads or stage lines, walked to Independence Township. He was one of the first to locate in this section and the deed to his land was signed by General Andrew Jackson, who at that time was the president. Had Mr. Bailey waited another year his trip might have been a little easier for in 1832 the Saginaw turnpike, sometimes called the Territorial turnpike, was built thru the south west of Independence.

The trip to Michigan was difficult and arduous and things didn't get any easier after the pioneers got here. Nathaniel Bingham crossed from Buffalo to Detroit in 1837, in a lake boat named the "Mayflower" and followed the Territorial road to an area near what is now Ortonville. From this road he had to cut his way thru the woods, following government marked trees to the place where he staked his claim. He had close neighbors — three

hundred Indians on a camping grounds near Bald Eagle Lake. Since he was one of the earliest arrivals, Nathaniel Bingham helped to organize Brandon Township.

Travel by ox-cart was slow and tedious, but apparently afforded a safe sure way for a man to transport his family. Harry Husted arrived in the vicinity of what is now Davisburg in November 1834, coming all the distance from New York state with his wife and four children, riding in an ox-drawn wagon. Since most pioneers tried to arrive here during warm weather, we can only surmise that the trip took weeks longer than anticipated.

In June of 1836, a man left New York state by team, taking a southern route around the tip of Lake Erie to find land in Michigan. The trip took about 14 days. After staking his claim, he went back for his family and they made the return trip to Michigan by the Erie Canal and lake boat. A team brought them from Detroit, and they followed a trail of blazed trees to their new home. The man's name was Cornelius Davis, and the 780 acres he eventually acquired also contained the town that bore his name — Davisburg.

My thanks to Mrs. Richard Bullen, Mr. Alex Solley and Mr. Rudolf Schwarze for their pictures and news items, which will appear in later columns. We would appreciate hearing from anyone who might have something of interest that could be used in this column — anything that concerns the history of Clarkston, Independence Township or surrounding townships. Even a seemingly insignificant item might be something that could be tied in with information already received — maybe it would be just the piece of the puzzle we've been looking for. In particular, if there is information or pictures on Clarkston pioneer doctors we could have, it would be much appreciated.
