The Library is buzzing with activity these days. Four elementary grades from the Pine Knolls and Clarkston schools have visited us recently. We tell them a story about libraries in general and how they began, and introduce them to their own local library. We shall be happy to cooperate with other teachers in this type of field trip, and, if notified well in advance, could arrange to give short talks on subjects of special interest to the children.

Your library card can open doors to many services for you not available to this community before the local library joined the North Oakland Cooperative. In addition to the hundreds of new books which come to our library from the State Library collection each month, local borrowers may use the Pontiac City Library facilities free of charge.

A new service which has recently been inaugurated is an arrangement with the Detroit Public Library whereby their collection of 1400 films can be rented by responsible adult card holders for the small fee of one dollar for each thirty minute film. The subjects range from Sports to Science, from Child Care to the Civil War, and from Music to Mental Health. Bookings should be made well in advance, and the borrower is responsible for picking up and returning the film to the Detroit Library.
