Notice to Waterford, White Lake and Springfield Township voters registered in the Clarkston Community School District.

The Clarkston Community Schools in accordance with the provision of Chapter 8, part II of the School Code is now designated as a registration district. The Statutes covering registration school districts make it mandatory that all people wishing to vote in any school election be registered with the township clerk in the township in which they, reside. Citizens now registered with the township and otherwise qualified to vote need not re-register.

Voters residing in Waterford Township who are a part of the Clarkston Community School District are now registered in voting precinct no. 4. For all school elections there voting precinct will be located in the Clarkston Elementary School Building.

A Service of ground breaking by the Lutheran Church Women, for the new Calvary Lutheran Church, Clarkston, Michigan, was held Sunday, May 13. The congregation went in a car caravan right after the 9:30 A.M. worship service at the Clarkston Elementary School, where services are now being held, to the church property, located just north of the Clarkston Village limits on the west side of M-15.

Construction will begin May 14 on a \$50,000.00 first unit, which will be an all purpose functional unit for the church's activities. The building is approximately 4,000 sq. ft. and the Sanctuary will seat about 150 persons.

At the service remarks were brought by Martin Gustafson, Chairman of the building committee, and by Pastor Paul A. Johns. The choir under the direction of Mrs. H. Rubert Cox, provided music. Refreshments were served.
