The Book Nook

Brooke Bennett

Frederic Remington's Own West by Frederic Remington, Edited by Harold McCracken

One of the two greatest illustrators of American Western History, Frederic Remington, was a man of many talents. Not the least of these was his picturesque style of writing about the things he did and saw during the period when he was also painting the life and characters of the "wild west." It is unfortunate that his writing has been relegated into the background because the documentary approach to our western history has been neglected and overridden by the novelists' romantic viewpoint. A true picture of this era in history is becoming more difficult to find with each passing year.

Editor Harold McCracken has gathered together a collection of Remington's best descriptive writings and interspersed them with drawings made in the same period of time so that the reader can see the settings and characters of the stories. Due to Remington's wide travels, each story has a different locale, and from the Dakotas to Mexico, Oklahoma to California, the book is alive with description and action, and suitable, covers the end of the most active era of our country's expansion.

Only one criticism may be levied at the book—and this certainly does not detract from the interest the book holds for a reader. It is unfortunate that the Remington paintings are not reproduced in color as they would add much more to the readers imagination of the scenes portrayed in writing. Taking the color from paintings by Charles Russell or Frederic Remington is like Currier and Ives in black and white, the flavor—the thrill—is lost. However, for anyone who really appreciates factual, exciting, and picturesque historical writing, Frederic Remington's Own West will provide several evenings of enjoyment—and a fine addition to a permanent library.

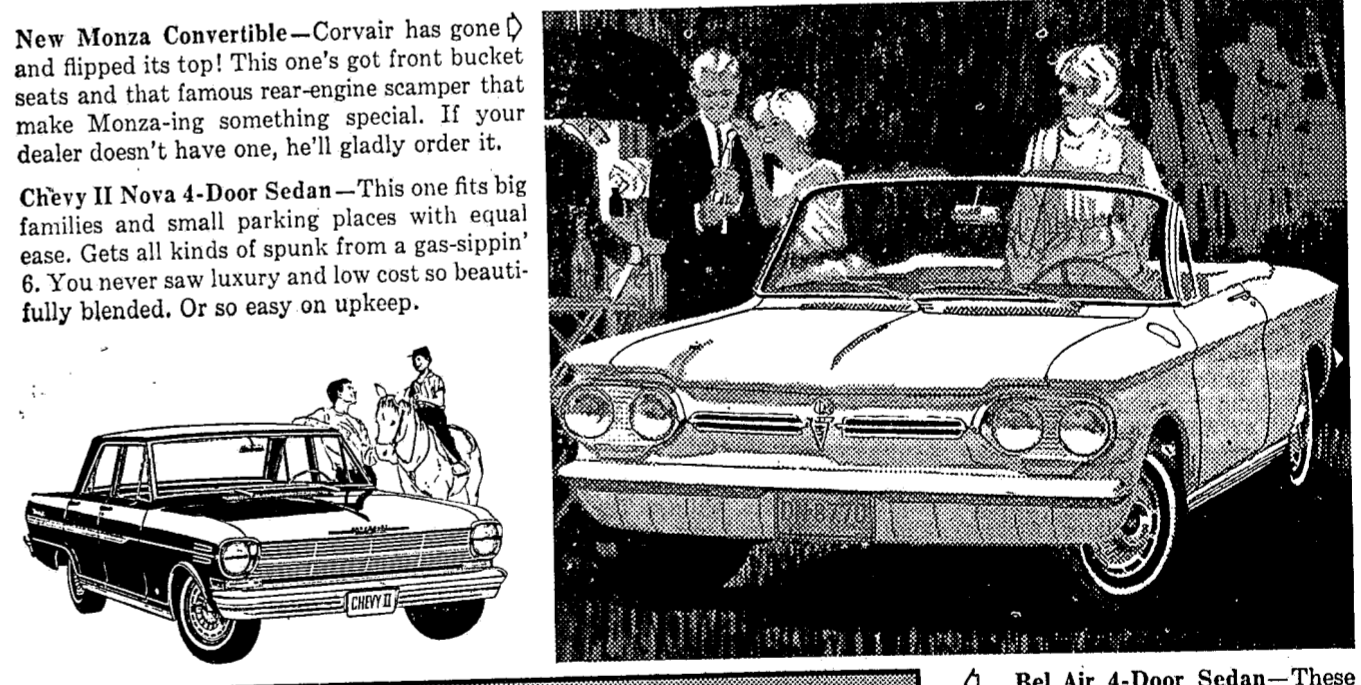

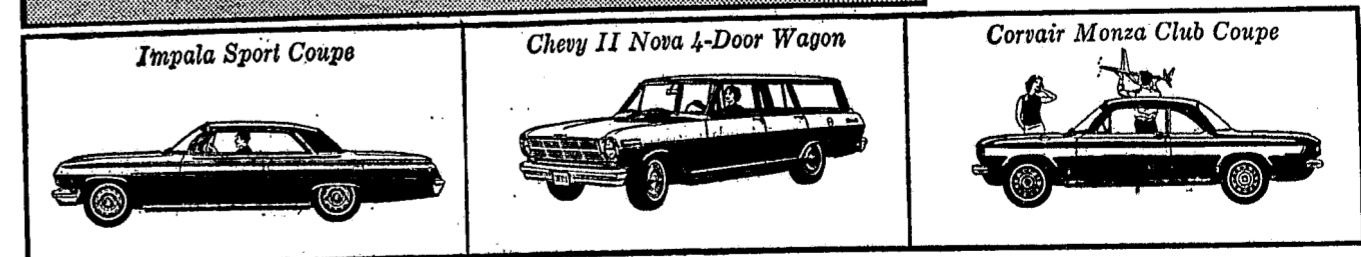

INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE No. 38
ITINERANT MERCHANTS ORDINANCE

An ordinance of Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan for the Control of Itinerant Merchants and to Provide Penalties for any Violation Thereof.

The Township Board of Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan Ordains as Follows:

Subject 1. Definition
Itinerant Merchants are defined

to be any person, firm, organization or corporation who sell, offer for sale, peddle hawk, display, canvass or solicit at the premises of others without the previous consent of the occupant of said premises any orders or sales for goods, publications, books, wares, merchandise, subscriptions, service or business of any kind.

Section 2. License Required.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to engage in activities as an Itinerant Merchant without first having obtained a license as hereinafter required.

Section 3. Application For License.

Itinerant Merchants desiring to be licensed hereunder shall apply for such license in writing to the Township Clerk and provide the following information, to-wit:

- (a) Complete name, address and description.
- (b) State whether employer, employee or self-employed.
- (c) Nature of the products and or service in which he does business.
- (d) The proposed method of his operation in the Township.
- (e) Names and addresses of all manufacturers and suppliers of products and/or services with which he does business.
- (f) Evidence of good character.

Section 4. Issuance of License.

Any Itinerant Merchant who has properly submitted an application for a license to the Clerk, as provided herein, who has a good character, reputation and no previous convictions for crimes of fraud or moral turpitude and pays the fees provided for herein shall be issued an Itinerant Merchants license. In the event the Clerk refuses to issue a license hereunder, any Itinerant Merchant feeling himself aggrieved by such refusal may demand a public hearing before The Township Board by sending a written request to the Township Supervisor within 5 days of notification of the refusal to issue a license by the Clerk. The Township Board hereby reserves the right to reverse the direction of the Clerk as the nonissuance of any license hereunder.

Section 5. Fraud

Any Itinerant Merchant who shall be guilty of any fraud, cheating or misrepresentation; wheather through the licensee or through an agent, servant, or employee, while acting as an Itinerant Merchant within the said Township of Independence, or who shall barter, sell, offer to sell, solicit sales for any goods, wares, books, publications, merchandise, subscriptions, services or business other than those specified in his License shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

Section 6. Possession of License.

Each Licensee shall carry his Itinerant Merchant license on him at all times while acting as an Itinerant Merchant within said Township of Independence and shall exhibit same whenever requested to do so by any prospective customer or peace officer.

(a) This Ordinance shall not be deemed to affect for in any way restrict or prohibit any resident(s) of said Township of Independence from displaying, selling or offering for sale any dairy, agricultural or other produce produced or raised upon any property owned, leased, rented or controlled by him or them.

(b) All Chuches Public and Non-secular Schools and religious organizations located within said Township of Independence and all recognized charities are hereby declared exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 8. Fees.

Each Itinerant Merchant shall pay the sum of \$5.00 per day or \$50.00 per year for his License, at the discretion of the applicant.

Each Licensed Itinerant Merchant may license his agent servant or employee by paying the additional sum of \$1.00 each in addition to regular license fee licensed agent, servant or employee. All licenses issued to an agent servant or employee shall expire on the same day as the Itinerant Merchant's employer's license expires. No agent, servant or employee shall expire on the same day as the Itinerant Merchant's employer's license expires. No agent, servant or employee shall be issued such a license hereunder until after he has fully complied with the provisions of Sections 3 and 4, supra.

Section 9. Penalty.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by fine not exceeding the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

Section 10 Seferance Clause.

The sentences, sections, provisions and phrases of this Ordinance are declared to be severable and if any such portion is declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such finding shall in no way affect or invalidate the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 11. Hours
Itinerant Merchants licensed hereunder shall engage in the activities for which he is licensed only between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. or sunset, whichever occurs last.

Section 12

This Ordinance shall take effect on 23rd day of June 1962.
Adopted by the Independence Township Board on the 15th day of May 1962.

Motion by Bennett supported by Bauer that Township Ordinance No. 38 (Itinerant Merchants Ordinance) be adopted and that said ordinance No. 38 shall become effective on the 23rd day of June 1962. Yea, 3. Nay, 0.

Any students in grades 7 - 12 are eligible for competition. Any student with 50 new subscriptions gets a bike, 25 new subscriptions a transistor radio. All subscriptions must be paid for in advance and they must be new ones no renewals.
