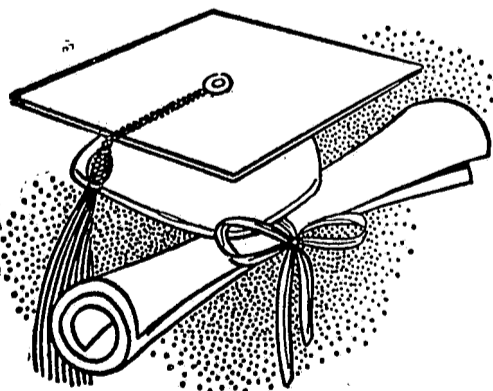

Rules for exhibitors are:

1. Entries must be in place and ready for judging by 9:30 a.m., June 20. Exhibits may not be removed before 9:15 p.m., but must be removed by 9:30 a.m., June 21. Doors open for exhibitors at 7:30 a.m., June 20.

2. Entries in Classes XVI and XVII must be delivered to the show June 19th between 3 and 5 p.m.

3. All containers and other property must be marked with the exhibitor's name. The Club cannot assume responsibility for loss or damage.

4. The number of entries in every class in artistic arrangements is limited and will be closed in order of registration. Registrations should be made with the Class Registrar. Exhibitors must find a substitute if unable to exhibit. Registrations close Monday, June 18th at noon.

5. In the Artistic Arrangements Division an exhibitor is limited to one entry in any one class, but may enter any number of classes. In the Horticulture Division an exhibitor is limited to one entry in any one variety, but may enter any number of varieties.

6. Flowers used in arrangements class MUST be grown by exhibitor, and be labeled by name. House plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least three months.

8. Accessories may be used in arrangement classes unless otherwise specified. Containers will be furnished for horticultural specimens.

9. Exhibits containing artificial, lacquered or painted plant material will be disqualified. No wiring of material is permitted.

10. Plants protected by Michigan State Law are not permitted. These are: Trailing Arbutus, Bird's Foot Violets, Flowering Dogwood, North American Lotus, Climbing Bittersweet, Trillium, Native Orchids, Gentians, Michigan Holly, Club Mosses.

11. All Exhibitors must be amateurs.

12. Judging from 10 to 1:30, will be by the Merit System. Decisions of the Judges will be final.
