## Local Teen To Attend Boys State

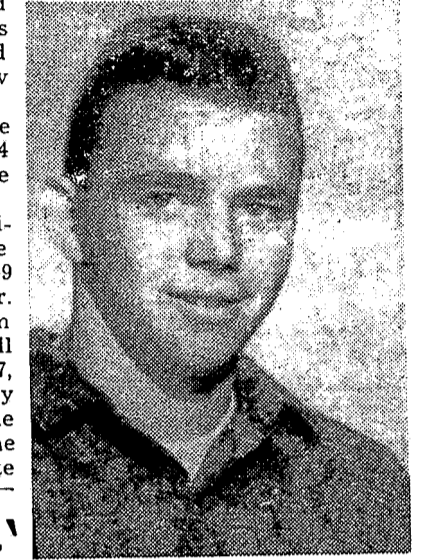
