For the past three years Mr. Giguere has served as assistant minister at the Brooklyn Methodist Church, Baltimore, Maryland while pursuing graduate work towards a S.T.B. degree at Wesley Theological Seminary, located in Washington, D.C. This degree was conferred on him last week.

Employed as a secretary for The Federal Probation Department, she has worked for the U.S. Courts for the past three years. She loves being a homemaker and takes particular interest in cooking, sewing, and women's fashions. Her other interests include music and the

theater. Mr. Giguere, on the other hand, enjoys an interest in antiques and oil painting. Their home in Clarkston is located at 149 North Main Street.

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Oakland County Needs Nurses

Foreseeing the likelihood of a critical shortage of registered nurses in Oakland County, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital of Pontiac will inaugurate a centralized program of professional nursing education this fall as a community service to the entire county.

The three-year course announced by Sister Mary Xavier will be the first in the county since 1951 and will provide a basic diploma in professional nursing for students of any race, color and creed. Affiliation with various health agencies will provide opportunities for experience in out-patient and psychiatric nursing.

Students will study basic subjects for nine months at Mercy School of Nursing in Detroit, a pre-clinical center recently formed by pooling the resources of the St. Joseph Mercy Hospitals in Ann Arbor, Detroit, and Pontiac, and conclude their three-year education in Pontiac under the special professional faculty and nursing staff of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, supervised by Miss Marie Hickey, Director of Nursing.

Tuition of approximately \$700 for the entire three-year program includes room and board, uniforms, cape, caps, and books, with cultural and recreational activities provided by religious, social and professional student organization. Scholarships are available for eligible students.

Where'd They Go?



Insects put on a good disappearing act during the winter, but they're still here--sometimes in unfamiliar forms or hiding, waiting for spring's return. Housewives don't have to ask where the box elder bug (top, right) hibernates. Much to their displeasure, he goes right into the house or other sheltered places when cold weather comes. Fortunately, most insects stay out of doors during the winter. Eastern tent caterpillars (top, left) remain on cherry trees in the form of eggs left by adults which die each summer. Many other insects spend the winter as eggs. Some, like pine sawfly eggs are found inside of pine needles; others are found under bark, on stones, and in almost every place imaginable. Eggs laid by walkingsticks (bottom, right) become buried under leaves where they remain for two winters before hatching. The brown and black woolly-bear caterpillars (middle, right) crawl under rocks, boards, or other sheltered hideaways and hibernate much like a real bear. Aquatic insects that breathe with gills and live in lakes continue to feed under the ice. Other water insects that hibernate in the mud, or in surface to breathe, hibernate by burrowing in the mud, or in banks of streams and lakes. Social insects like bees and ants may hibernate by congregating in a mass, or they may all die except the queen. Monarch butterflies are probably the envy of the insect world for they spend the winter in the south. Flies and certain other insects are light "sleepers" and sometimes are seen flitting about on warm days in the winter.

WANTED BY THE FBI



Eugene Francis Newman. Newman is the alleged machine gun-carrying leader of a gang that attempted the robbery of an armored car carrying \$498,500 in American and Canadian currency in Buffalo, New York, on August 3, 1955. He and his associates, wearing silk stocking masks, engaged in a running gun battle with the truck's guards and Buffalo Police, and a machine gun bullet, allegedly fired by Newman, seriously wounded a guard. Two bandits were quickly apprehended but Newman remains at large. A complaint, filed before a U.S. Commissioner at Buffalo, New York, on August 5, 1955, charges Newman with fleeing the State of New York to avoid prosecution for robbery. Heavily armed, with a violent temper, Newman has previously been convicted for theft of Government property, interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle, petty larceny, and burglary. He is a white American, reportedly born on October 2, 1929, at Brooklyn, New York, who is 5'9" tall, weighs 170 to 180 pounds, has blond hair, blue eyes, a medium build, and medium complexion. He has scars near his right eye, on the back of his right hand and on the center of his left cheek. A blemish appears on his upper left arm and a mole on his left index finger. Tattoos include the name "Danny" and a heart on the outside of his right forearm, and the number "13" within a dotted circle on the back of his left hand. He has worked as a bricklayer, clerk, construction worker, counterman, and laborer. Consider extremely dangerous. 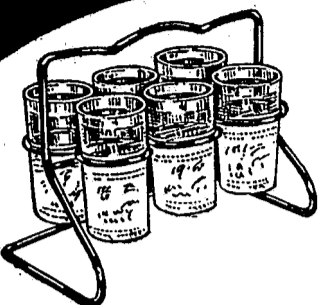

Last Thursday the Harold Brooks held a farewell dinner for the Halpin family of Dvorak Heights. Their new home is in Madison Heights.

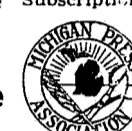
