Jaycees To Sell - Install Seat Belts Sat. And Sun.

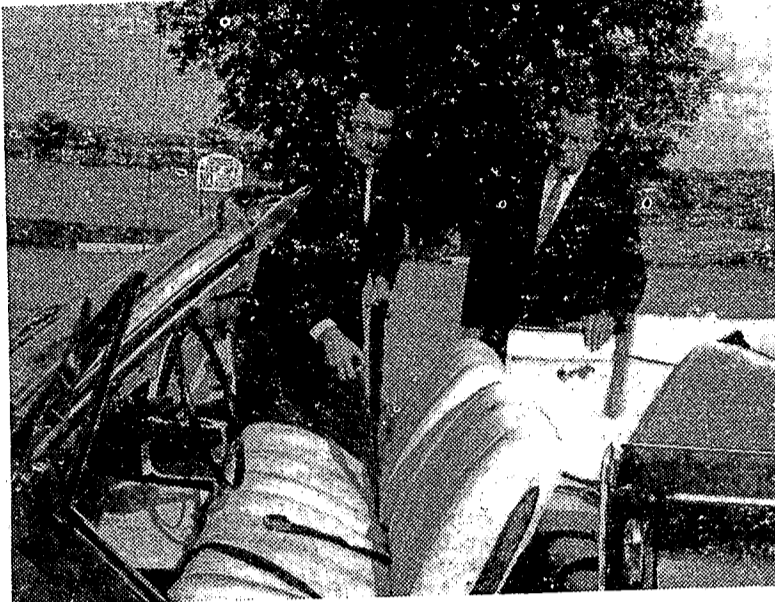
A trend is being established all over the country which could result in saving countless lives. Three states—Wisconsin, New York and Virginia—have passed laws requiring seat belts to be installed in all new cars sold in their states. Nine other states, including Michigan, have passed legislation regarding seat belts on automobiles. Many businesses are requiring that seat belts be installed in all their company cars.

With an awareness of seat belts increasing, the question raised by numerous people is—why should I wear a seat belt? To answer this question many studies have been conducted and many figures compiled. It is the opinion of many experts that over 5,000 lives a year could be saved by the use of seat belts.

People who have an anti-seat belt attitude have several common objections. The answers to several of their disapprovals may make you decide to install seat belts.

I seldom drive far or fast—Surveys show that 47% of all car deaths occurred at speeds below 40 m.p.h. and 66% took place within 25 miles of the driver's home.

If my car caught fire or went into the water I couldn't get out. Cornell University reports that fire occurs in only 1/5 of one percent of injury-producing acci-

dents. Only 3/10 of one percent involve submersion under water. Chances are made better that a belted passenger will remain conscious and be able to get out of the car.

Seat belts are uncomfortable. Studies show that in distance driving, seat belts actually help posture and reduce fatigue.

It's too much trouble—Belts can be fastened in two seconds flat and loosened with a flick of the wrist.

They cost too much—This is a relative question and depends on how much value you place on life and limb.

Seat belts are a fine safety feature to have on your car but, remember, good, safe driving depends on you.

Republicans Met Tuesday Evening

Approximately 61 enthusiastic men and women were interestingly exposed to the opinions, charges and counter charges of the panel of candidates for the offices of State Lt. Governor, State Senator and State Representative.

Emotions were valuable to the challenge as was shown by the polish and poise of Senator Farrell Roberts in contrast to the vigor and eagerness of Senatorial candidate, Richard Kuhn. While the former sought to gain an advantage, Senatorial candidate Robert Huber, mayor of Troy, attacked the recent State administration for not facing up to the problems that faces the business enterprises of Michigan.

Con Con delegate Kuhn accused Roberts of siding with Gus Scholle controlled Democrats, to ram income tax down the throats of the people. Roberts replied that the unions have been unhelpful with him in the past, and did not state definitely whether he did or did not vote for the income tax, although he stated he would support a state income tax.

Kuhn pointed out that Roberts and other so-called moderate senators had been patted on the back by Ray Courage, Free Press Columnist, for being statesmen. "It is interesting to note," said Kuhn, "that Courage has resigned from the Free Press and has accepted a job with D Neal Stables campaign organization. Stables was the man that master-minded ex-Governor Williams' campaign in the past."

Senator Roberts and Con Con delegate Kuhn have been engaged in a "running feud" for some time.

Earlier in the program, after statements from Lt. Governor candidate, John Stahlen, Representative Lloyd Anderson, a seasoned veteran of many debates, casually met the charges of young Michael Carl who is seeking to win the 1st district seat of State Representative.

Township Supervisor, Duane Hursfall, served as moderator and was pleased with the fine turn out of interested citizens.

Another Day

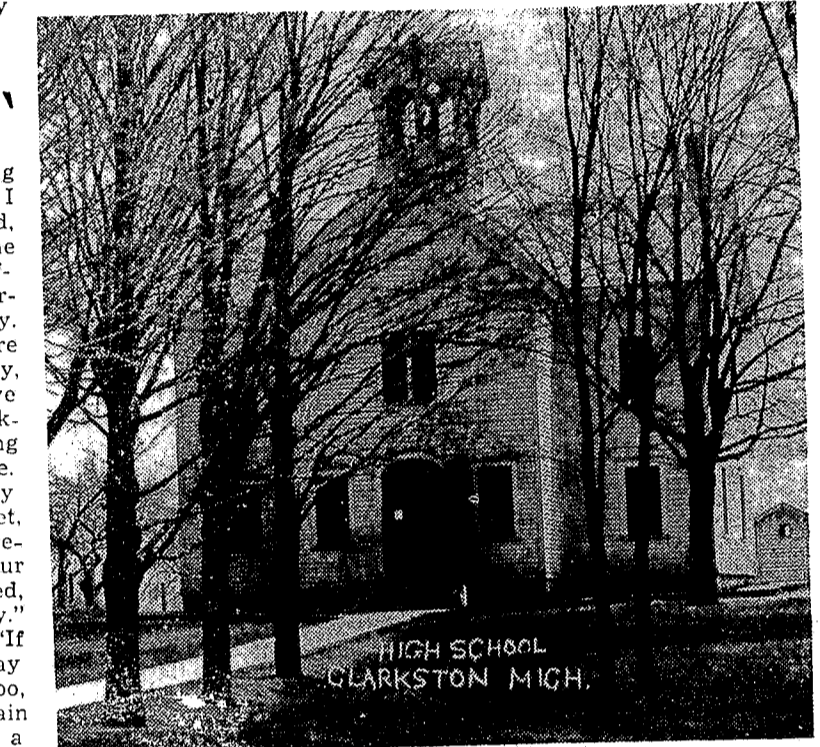

"Schools and the means of education shall forever be encouraged." So read an ordinance of 1787 put into effect by the federal government for the administration of the Northwest Territory which included that part of the country we now call Michigan. So, two years before our nation had its first president, there was already concern shown for the future of its young.

According to early laws, section 16 of each township was to be set aside for the site of a schoolhouse. Quite often, when the early settlers trudged out to section 16, they found a swamp

tion 26, land that now lays between Waldon and Maybee Roads and contains Dvorak Street and Console Street, among others. This was a small board shanty, built in the spring of 1834, from trees felled and planed by the first settlers. These people were for the most part Easterners, who received a fairly good education themselves. That summer they hired Miss Eliza Holden as their first teacher for their children.

Later they built a log schoolhouse, which in time was replaced by a frame building. By 1837, a second school was needed and this was built on section 29, which we drive thru entering



Clarkston from the Dixie. This was known as Pinery school. A year later a school was put up near the center of section 20, which is the present day village of Clarkston. Children from the Holcomb, Vliet and Wheeler families were taught there by Miss Clara Anderson.

The Union school, as it was called, was built by Nelson Clark on the west shore of Parke Lake and was quite an innovation with its second story and bell tower. Later, it became an academy under the direction of a Professor Isaac C. Cochran and in 1862, was sold to the public for use as a district school.

It's hard to understand now why there were several schools so close together, but in the 1830's

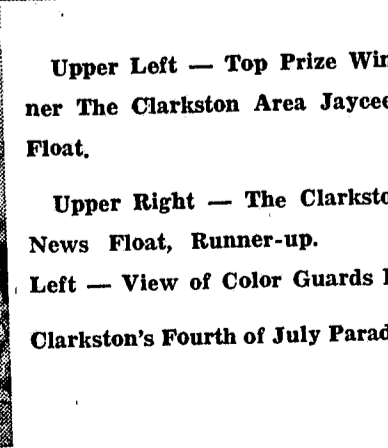
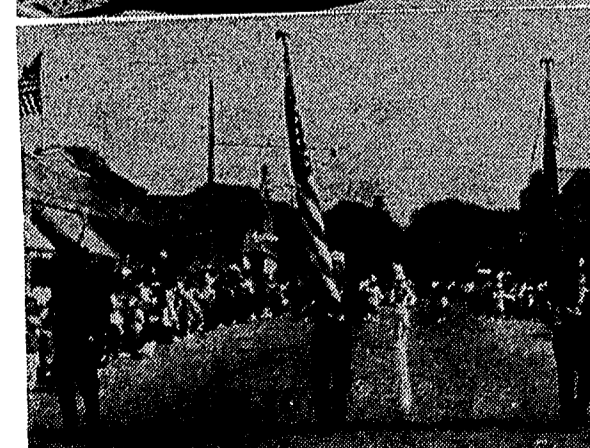
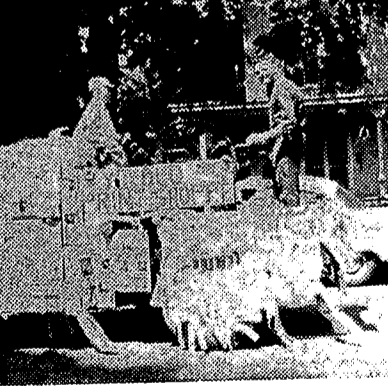

The Clarkston News float, runner-up, was a Jeep pick up truck from Bill Spence Rambler, Inc., covered completely with shredded Clarkston newspapers and carrying a treadle operated press which printed programs of the days activities. The programs were passed out to viewers. The press, believed to be 75 to 100 years old, was the first press ever operated by your editor, some 16 years ago.

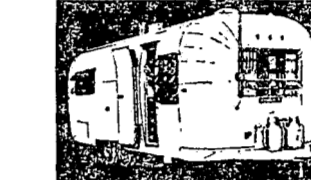

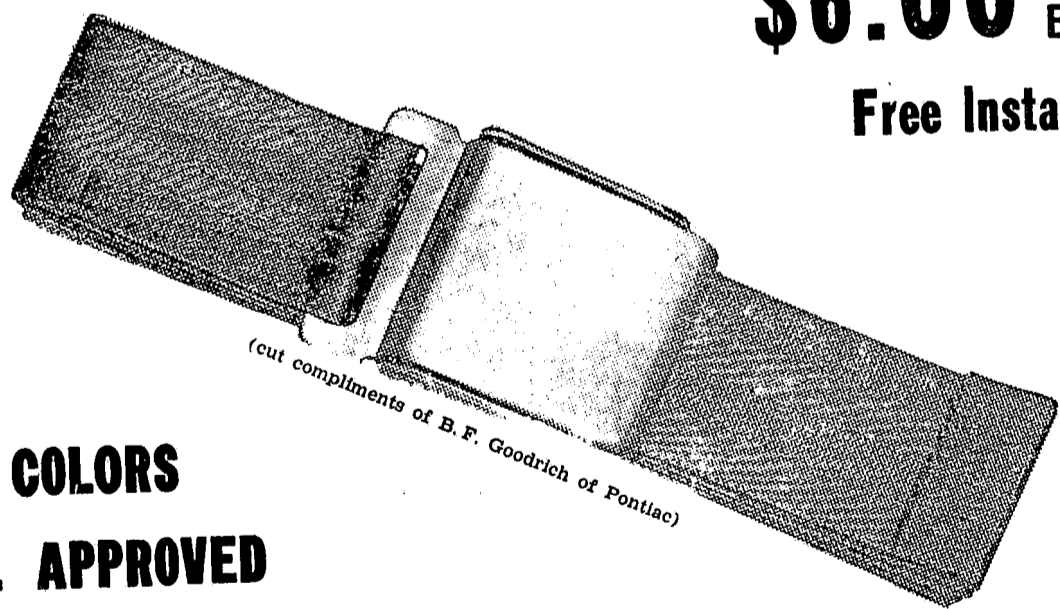

Ordinance No. 39 Uniform Watercraft Ordinance For Oakland County

By the authority granted the Township Board of the Township of Independence by Act 246 of the Public Acts of 1945, as amended,

The Township of Independence Ordains:

1. Definitions

a. Boats are defined as all watercraft with or without self-propulsion machinery, including sea-planes when not airborne. The word "boat" shall include water skis, water sleds, surf boards or similar contrivances while being towed by any boat.

b. The term "navigable waters" is defined as including all lakes, ponds, streams, lagoons, canals or other waters capable of navigation within the territorial limits of the Township of Independence.

2. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat upon any navigable water unless said boat is properly licensed as required by the state and federal laws and regulations.

3. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat upon any navigable waters while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, narcotic drugs or barbiturates. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any boat or any person having such in charge or in control thereof to authorize or knowingly permit the same to be operated by any person while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, narcotic drugs or barbiturates.

4. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat upon any navigable waters in a reckless manner or at an excessive rate of speed or in a manner causing a wake which would endanger or be likely to endanger any person or property of any person. No person shall operate any boat at a rate of speed greater than will permit him in the exercise of reasonable care to bring the boat to a stop with the assured clear distance ahead. No person shall operate a boat in a manner so as to unreasonably interfere with the lawful use by others of any navigable waters.

5. No person shall operate on any navigable waters a motor boat at a speed in excess of 10 miles per hour within 100 feet of any boat lawfully anchored on such navigable waters, within 100 feet of any lawfully marked bathing beach or within 100 feet of any lawfully anchored raft or float used for swimming purposes.

6. No person under the age of fourteen (14) years shall operate any motor propelled boat equipped with a motor greater than 7½ horsepower, unless accompanied by an adult.

7. No person shall throw, place or otherwise discard any bottle, box, paper, garbage, rubbish or similar objects or any type of unsanitary matter, material or fluid into or upon any navigable waters.

8. No operator of any boat shall have in tow or shall otherwise assist in the propulsion of a person on water skis, water sleds, surf boards or other similar contrivances before 10:00 A.M. (in the morning) on any day. Such activities shall be permitted until sunset, except that on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, the day first preceding a holiday and the holiday, such activities shall be terminated not later than 7:00 P.M. (in the afternoon). Any person permitting himself to be towed on water skis, water sleds, surf boards or similar contrivances before or after the time set forth above shall be in violation of this paragraph and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

9. No person shall operate on any navigable waters a motor boat having in tow or to otherwise assist a person on water skis, water sleds, surf boards or similar contrivances unless there is in such motor boat in addition to the operator at least one competent person in a position to observe the progress of the person being towed. This requirement shall not apply to motor boats equipped with not less than a 170 degree wide angle rear view mirror affixed in such a manner as will permit the operator to observe the progress of the person being towed.

10. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat

without a proper muffler as required by State law, or to use any siren or noise producing or noise amplifying instrument on any boat on any navigable waters in such manner that the peace and good order of the neighborhood is disturbed; provided, however, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prohibit the use of whistles, bells or horns as signals required by the United States Motor Boat Act or other Federal law for the safe navigation of motors, boats or vessels.

11. The provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed to prohibit the running of racing or exhibition boats muffled or unmuffled during any race or regatta operating under the provisions of Act 208 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1958, as amended.

12. Should any provision, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance be held to be invalid for any reason, such holding shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared invalid, it being the legislative intent that this ordinance shall stand notwithstanding such holding.

13. Every operator of any boat livery or boat launching site open to the public shall post a copy of this ordinance in a conspicuous place.

14. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a fine not exceeding the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

15. Ordinance No. 39 (Operation of Watercraft, adopted by the Independence Township Board of June 5, 1962) shall become effective thirty days after first publication.
