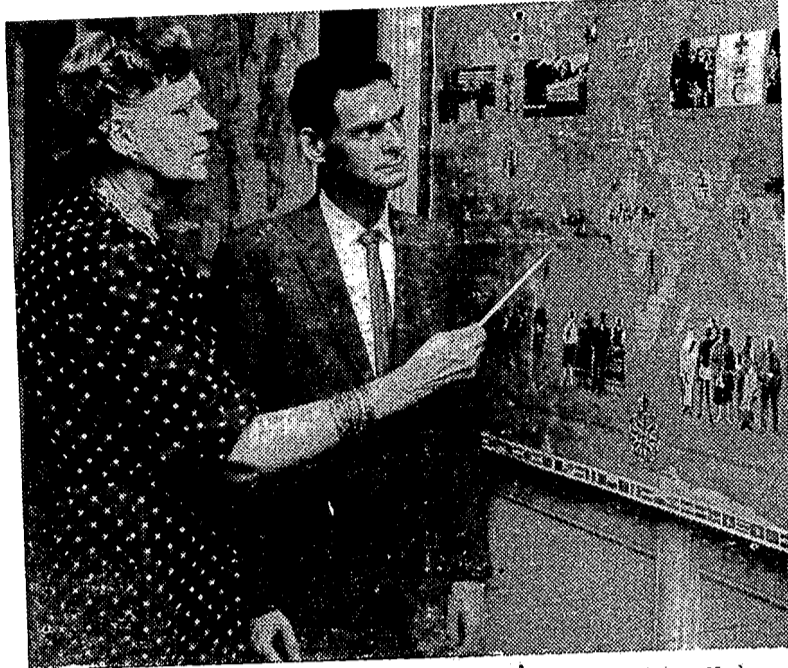

Swainson Shows Savings Of Millions

Governor Swainson has announced that in the first full fiscal year of his term in office, programs of efficiency and economy have resulted in at least a \$2.5 million saving of taxpayers' dollars.

He said: "A report by State Controller Ira Polley shows that Michigan state officials and employees are alert to all possible methods of saving money. This means a full measure of service for each tax dollar.

"Efficiency and economy are not innovations of this administration, but when I took office I insisted that they be continued and pursued vigorously. The fact that more than \$2.5 million a year have been saved is proof that this directive was given much more than lip service.

"Michigan has far fewer state employees than the national average. The national average is 5.9 per 1,000 population, while Michigan has only 4.3 per 1,000 population. In addition, the report shows that Michigan was 43rd of all states in the percentage of increase in state expenditures during the five year period, 1957-1961."

Governor Swainson pointed out that some of the savings included such amounts as: \$125,000 annual savings for gasoline purchases through special purchases and discount arrangements; \$750,000 savings in improvements in records management; \$200,000 savings in total purchases; \$72,000 in transportation costs; \$45,000 savings through improved filing systems; and some \$25,000 saved through eliminating

Medical Authorities Prove Hot Water Value

Safety from bacteria and viruses on dishes is related to the temperature of the hot water used in washing them, according to a newspaper statement of Dr. Joseph G. Molner, nationally known health columnist and Director of the Wayne County Health Department.

Dr. Molner reported on tests conducted by the University of Louisville which compared hand washing of dishes to machine washing. He pointed out that dishwashers give strikingly better sanitation mainly because they could use hotter water than is possible in washing by hand, but whatever way dishes are washed they should be washed hot to be

washed clean. When doing dishes by hand water as hot as possible should be used "as it begins to cool off its effectiveness cools off too."

Commenting on the doctor's statement, Jack Zeunen, local Edison manager, said the temperature of water in dishwashers is at least 150 degrees—hot enough to rapidly kill germs of all kinds.

He said this is one of the advantages of an electric water heater—it provides plenty of hot water at temperatures up to 165 degrees continually over a period of many years without shortening the life of the tank. The water is still hot enough for efficient use in a dishwasher even after a long pipe run.

For bathing and tasks that require only warm water, it takes less hot water mixed with cold water to reach the desired temperature.

"Whether the homemaker has an automatic dishwasher or not, the hot water available from an electric water heater for rinsing dishes, for washing clothes and

doing other household chores is a most important ingredient in providing her family with cleaner, more germ-free surroundings," he added.

In the Louisville tests forty families were asked to wash their dishes in the usual way and either dry them with a towel or let them stand until dry, whichever was their normal custom. When one complete place setting was dry, it was placed in a sterile bag and delivered to the laboratory of the University's Department of Microbiology.

Bacterial contamination was measured according to American Public Health Association standards and methods.

These tests showed that in only one of the forty homes did all the handwashed dishes meet the 100-or-less bacteria per utensil accepted public health standard—only one family's dishes were as free of bacteria as you would expect dishes to be in a public restaurant. Only three out of 359 dishes washed were completely sanitized.

Similar tests were made on dishes washed in a mechanical dishwasher. Every one of the 4,210 utensils sampled from 301 separate mechanical dishwashers met the accepted standard for public restaurants, and 74 per cent of the dishes had no bacterial count whatsoever.

The laboratory also conducted extensive tests to study the removal of disease producing viruses from highly contaminated dishes. These virus tests showed that the dishwasher readily removed such viruses from dishes, although after hand dishwashing live virus was frequently found on the dishes.

Local Teachers Study Language

Sixty high school teachers of French and Spanish from Ohio and 12 other states are currently enrolled in a Summer Language Institute at Ohio State University.

Selected from a large number of applicants from all parts of the United States, the teachers receive a stipend from the government while attending the institute, conducted under the National Defense Education Act.

The 7-week program, which continues through Aug. 23, provides training in the audio-lingual approach to language teaching and a study of new methods, textbooks and materials.

Director of the institute is Dr. Edward D. Allen, associate professor of foreign language education at Ohio State.

GOD WILL MEET YOUR NEEDS
I was deeply impressed by the story of a little boy who wanted to buy his mother a birthday gift. The present that he liked cost exactly \$9.98. So he saved and saved until he had 998 pennies in his piggy bank. When he started to piggy bank upside down and 998 pennies came tumbling out. All the pennies that the little boy had were poured out in one single act.
To receive what you need from God, your faith has to come pouring out of your heart in one single act of faith. Do you want to be healed? Then all your faith must be loosed in one single act of believing God for the healing of your body.
In Mark 9:14-29 we read of a man who had a dreadfully afflicted son. We might diagnose his condition today as epilepsy. But it was something that would seize the boy and throw him violently into fire and water. The father brought his son to Jesus to be healed. But when he arrived, Jesus was on the Mount of Transfiguration.
When Jesus came down from the mount, He found a sorry state of affairs. The apostles had prayed for the boy, but he still was not healed. The father of the boy was very discouraged. When Jesus came, this man was ready to give up and go home.
The father said to Jesus, "I brought my son to Your disciples that they should cast out the evil spirit, but they could not." Then he cried in desperation, "Lord, if You can do anything, have compassion on me and help us." He was so discouraged that he wondered if even Christ could do anything.
Jesus said to him, "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth."
The answer of this man was most significant: "Lord, I believe. Help Thou mine unbelief."
Jesus reached out His hand and touched the boy, commanding the evil spirit to leave his body. As Jesus touched the boy, the father released his faith. The foul spirit left immediately. The young boy was completely healed!

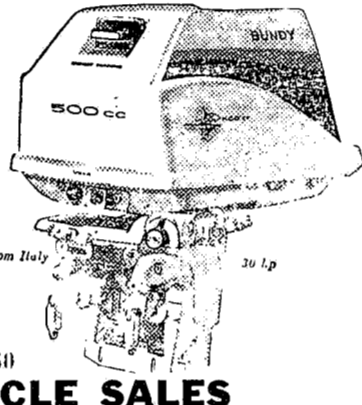

Caution On Mail Order Nurses Training

The Board of Nursing, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the Attorney General issued a joint statement today cautioning Michigan citizens against mail order nurses' training courses offered by Nurses Training Schools, Inc., a Philadelphia, Pennsylvania corporation now soliciting Michigan residents.

This mail order training program is not accepted by the Michigan Board of Nursing as qualifications for licensing; it is not approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction of Michigan for license of solicitors under the Private Trade School Law; its activities in Michigan are in violation of the laws of this state.

Representations being made by the school that legal qualifying demands of the state have been met and that graduates of the course can be employed as nurses in Michigan are false. Michigan citizens are requested to check with the Board of Nursing before signing up for any nursing course. Any contact with this or similar

These two teachers will have their tuition and expenses paid for by U. of D., and the credit that they earn in either biology chemistry, or physics may be used towards a masters degree.

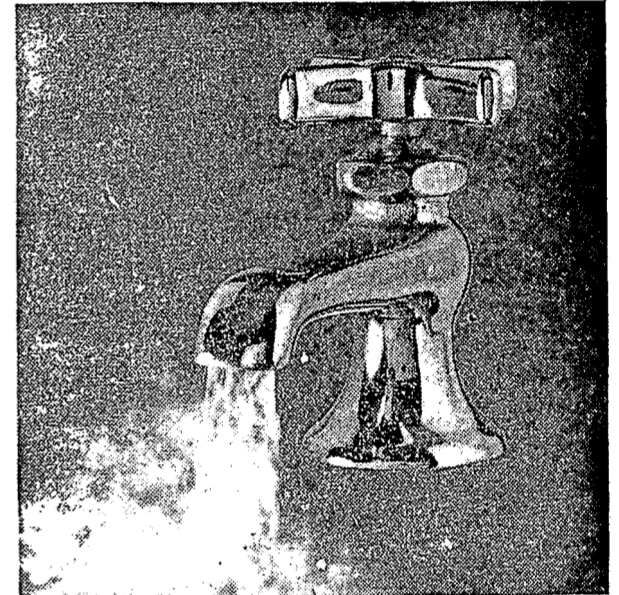

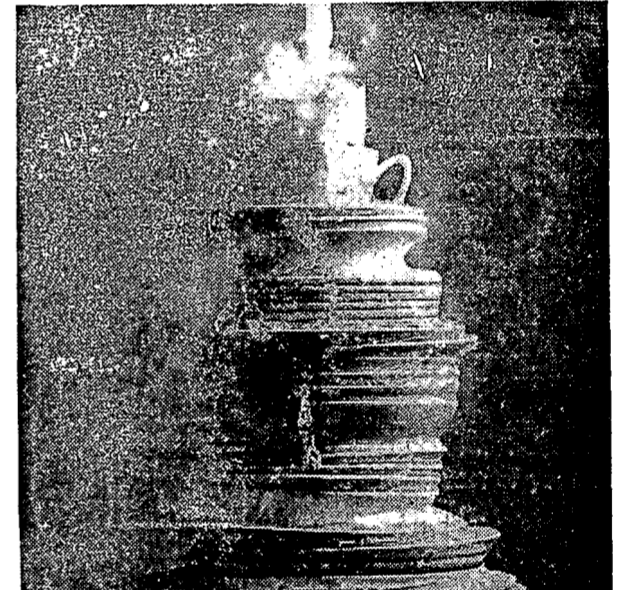
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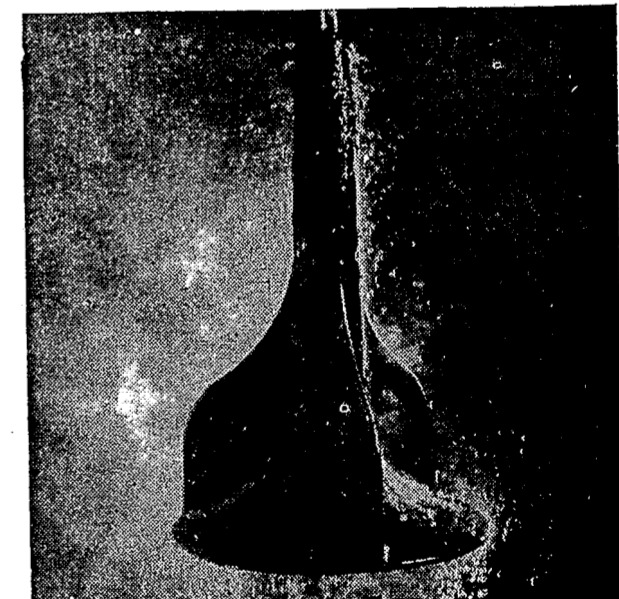

reports. Stating that Michigan state government has been a leader in the field of centralized budgetary, purchasing and accounting systems for many years in terms of policies, procedures and services, Governor Swainson said that the Department of Administration has served as a model for other states.

He said that such states as Kansas, Wisconsin, North Carolina and most recently, Indiana, have modeled their administrative programs after Michigan's. Representatives from many foreign countries, through the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID), have also sought out the Department of Administration for information and guidance in central management operations. Some of these include Turkey, Philippines, Thailand and Lebanon.

"In this sizable saying in state expenditures, Michigan can take pride. To all state agencies and departments, I express my sincere appreciation for their great efforts in carrying out my directive for continuing efficiency and economy in state government," Governor Swainson said.

Localite Graduates From General Motors Institute

James E. Goodman, Executive Vice President, General Motors Corporation, will make the commencement address at General Motors Institute's graduation exercises Friday evening, July 27, at the IMA Auditorium. Goodman served as a member of the GMI Board of Regents for almost twelve years and was Chairman of the Board for more than three years.

Edward N. Cole, GMI Class of '33 Vice President and Group Executive of General Motors and Chairman of the GMI Board of Regents, will introduce Mr. Goodman. More than 900 graduates will receive recognition at the exercises.

Among those receiving degrees will be a local man, Walter J. Catten of 8150 Holcomb Rd., Clarkston, an employee of GMC's Pontiac Motor Division.

Dr. Harold P. Rodes, Institute President, will present degrees and diplomas.

The ceremonies will mark the 35th Commencement for General Motors Institute, an accredited engineering college which provides General Motors with about 25% of its engineers. The student body of 2,400 is made of topflight high school graduates selected by GM plants for appointment to Cooperative Programs in either Mechanical, Industrial, or Electrical Engineering. Students alternate between periods of academic education in the classrooms and laboratories at the Institute and coordinated work experience at their plants. Successful completion of the four year program leads to a diploma. Qualification for a Bachelor's Degree requires successful completion of a fifth-year phase of the program provided to meet the varying needs and situations of the students and the sponsoring units. Of the more than 6,000 graduates of GMI, nearly 70% have remained with General Motors.

Degrees will be granted to 420 graduates. In addition, diplomas are to be awarded to 310 four year cooperative engineering and business administration graduates. Others to be recognized with certificates of graduation include four liberal arts graduates of other colleges and universities who are completing a one-year cooperative program at the Institute; and 28 General Motors Overseas Operations Scholarship graduates.

Approximately 140 graduates of 1952 and earlier classes, whose performance on the job has warranted recommendations by their Divisions for the honor, will be
