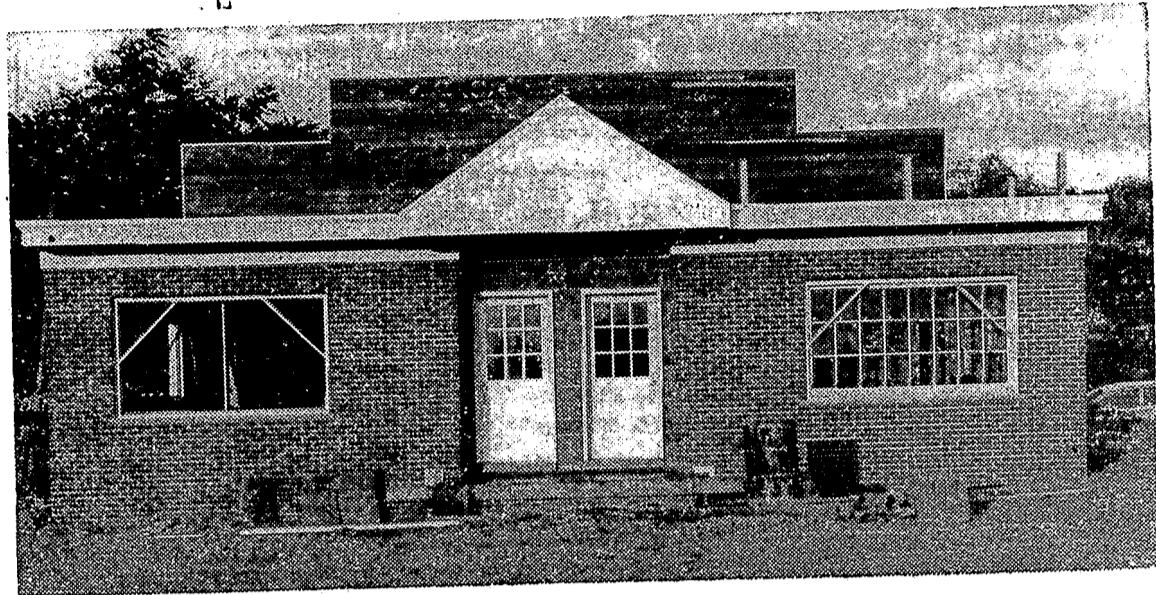

Local CAP Group Participating In Michigan Fact Finder

Fifteen members of the Clarkston Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol (CAP), an auxiliary of the United States Air Force, are participating in the Michigan Aviation Fact Finder program which is being sponsored by the Michigan Department of Aeronautics July 28 through August 3.

The group is interviewing pilots and passengers at Pontiac Municipal Airport daily from 6:30 A.M. till after 10:00 P.M. Pilots are asked to answer a Flight Operations Questionnaire for each arrival and departure. Each arriving passenger is given a post card questionnaire to fill out before departure.

Another Day

When William VanBuskirk Vliet settled in Clarkston in 1833, he brought with him from New Jersey his wife Patty and a family of seven children. And it took all the hard work and ingenuity he had to keep them housed and fed, especially during the first few years when so much of their time was taken up with the job of clearing the land to make a farm. Fortunately, the surrounding streams and woods teemed with wild life, deer, bear, squirrels, rabbits, ducks and geese. And twice a year, when the birds migrated, passenger pigeons provided a source of food that seemed unlimited. These were considered a delicacy and afforded a change in diet for the pioneers. At one time passenger pigeon were so plentiful that when they made their journey from the sources to their nesting places in Northern Michigan, the sky was literally darkened with them. They could actually be measured in square miles. The last of these birds died in 1914, in captivity, and today we have only the stuffed, mounted displays found in museums to tell us how they looked, larger than the still existing mourning dove, these wild pigeons resembled them in color and form.

Clarence Vliet, grandson of the original settler, recalls his father telling him how these birds were captured and preserved for winter use for the pioneer families. Shot and powder were too costly and too scarce so another method had to be devised to bring these birds into the larder. A small cleared spot was selected that contained at least one tall timber tree, generally an oak. Grass was spread on the ground and over this was placed a net woven from fine strong flax fiber cord with two inch mesh that had weights on the outer edges. The sapling tree was bent over and one edge of the net was attached. A pigeon that had been captured previously was used as a decoy, and was tethered near the net. Hidden in blinds, the hunters waited until a cloud of pigeons appeared over Waterford Hill. Then the decoy was released and slowly pulled back to the ground. The leaders of the flock, seeing the captured bird, tried to light in the clearing. At this moment, the sapling was released as the trigger of the net was pulled, throwing the net over the grounded birds. As the pigeons tried to rise, they became entangled in the mesh. The hunters rushed out and rolled stones over the edges of the net, keeping the birds from regaining the air. The birds were then killed by breaking their necks. Some were left alive for future use. The slain birds were de-feathered and the thick muscular breasts were cut off with a sharp knife and put out to sun-dry. Later these pieces were stuck on thorn brush wedged between the crevices of the shake shingles in the log house attic, where they were kept for winter use, since glass cans had not been invented and salt was too expensive to use as a preservative. Clarence Vliet recalls that these nets were so in-

Million Dollar Ski And Summer Resort Near Here

Michigan is really going big time -- not only in skiing, but also in summer recreational activities.

A group of business men-sportsmen, headed by Leonard W. Jarosz, of Construction Lease Corporation, Birmingham, Mich., has acquired and is developing, barely 32 miles north of Detroit a 435 acre area called Pine Knob, into a combination ski and summer resort area.

The development which will represent better than a \$1,000,000 investment this year alone, will include facilities which may compare to those of Sun Valley, Idaho. It will be the largest development of its kind in the state.

Ski run construction activities on an accelerated basis have already begun on the site, which is 7 miles north of Pontiac, near Clarkston.

Within five minutes after a person is bitten by a rattler, swelling will take place and also a darkening of the bitten area. Go to a doctor immediately. If possible catch and kill the snake so it can be identified.

When people advocate such a government as this, they do not take into consideration the human factor. What personal achievement or goal could man set in such a government? If he earned any money, it would have to be put in the community pot, so he could not become rich. He could not become famous because he would have to share his ideas with others. The only ones who could really benefit are those running the government. Being human, they could easily become tyrants, and this form of government could become a travesty on what was supposed to be a pure form of government. It could become a travesty such as the despicable kind that now rules Russia with an iron hand.

We do not appreciate having someone sell our children ideas on any kind of government other than our own. While ours is not perfect due to the human factor, we do have checks and balances, and it is right for this time, this people AND BLESS AMERICA!
