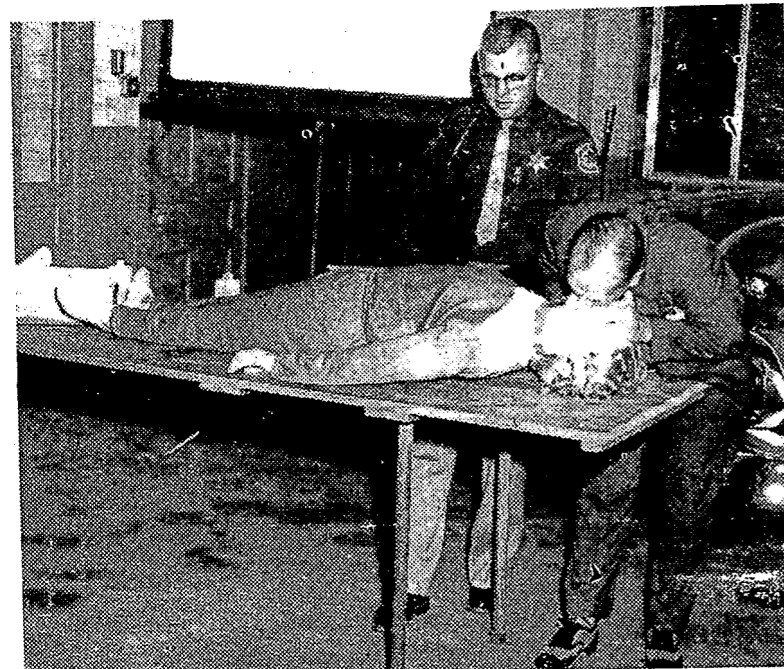

George Romney will spend all day this Saturday (August 11) on a whirlwind campaign junket in his home county of Oakland, and the day will start off as most of his days do on the golf course.

The Republican candidate for governor, who gets his daily exercise with a fast few holes of golf early in the morning on a course near his home, will start his campaign tour at 8 a.m. Saturday visiting the golfers teeing off at the Rockham Golf Course in Huntington Woods.
