Mr. Treais drowned last Friday, August 10, at Deer Lake in 2 feet of water. He was at the lake giving swimming lessons to members of the Clarkston Recreation Department, when he apparently blacked-out. Students,

unaware of what had happened, thought at first that Mr. Treais was swimming. Upon realizing he was unconscious, they called for help. A passerby pulled Mr. Treais to land.

A teacher at Clarkston Junior High, Mr. Treais was recently named Head Baseball Coach at Clarkston Senior High School. He was a graduate of Pontiac Central High and Eastern Michigan University.

A member of the 300 Lounge Champion Class A City Basketball League in Pontiac, Mr. Treais was also Player-Manager of the Howes' Lanes City Class A Softball League.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Treais, and a brother, Douglas C. Treais of Pontiac.

Blue - Gray Shoot This Week-end



The object of the North-South Skirmish Association, Inc. is to preserve the history and spirit of the Civil War and to promote muzzle loading the rifle shooting through the use of Civil War type weapons fired in the crig-manner. To encourage their preservation of Civil War material and to fire the weapons and display equipment for the entertainment and education of spectators are other objects.

It is a non-profit association and was started in 1950 with a meeting between the Washington Blue Rifles and the First Regiment Virginia Volunteers. The first rules and regulations were set down in 1951, and the association incorporated in 1958.

All member organizations use original Civil War Company designation and names. Their uniforms are authentic reproductions. They perform the loading

manual and manual of arms as it was done during the War. The highest rank held in the NSSA is that of Sergeant. Rules and regulations discourage any commissioned rank.

There are no individual memberships. Memberships are only granted to any organized group or club of not less than eight members, uniformed and equipped in accordance with NSSA rules. Each eight man group is designated as a "Company".

Honorary memberships may be granted to certain groups who add to the pageantry of the Association. Such are only granted by the Board of Directors.

Skirmishes are held nationally once a year and locally or regionally at the option of the organization concerned.

The Association will hold a skirmish or shoot at Davisburg August 18 and 19. The public is invited to attend.
