early one million boys and girls 16 and 17 years of age, who should be in high school, are not. They have left their books behind and hang out in gnags on street concers, or work casually from time to time at low paid jobs. Few are equipped for regular employment. Many of them are habitues of the juvenile courts.

These are high-school dropouts.

They are a big problem now, and in a few years will be an even bigger problem. The U. S. Labor Department has estimated that within the next 10 years 7,500,000 youths will quit school before finishing high school. Educators are concerned about this prospect, unless the schools are able to provide courses that will keep these young people in school and train them for useful lives.

The number of jobs available for unskilled workers is decreasing year by year, because of advances of technology. But the number of people who will be seeking such jobs is increasing rapidly.

Why are large numbers of young people leaving high school before graduation and why is this problem considered so serious by educators and other civic leaders? Will your child be a high-school dropout?
