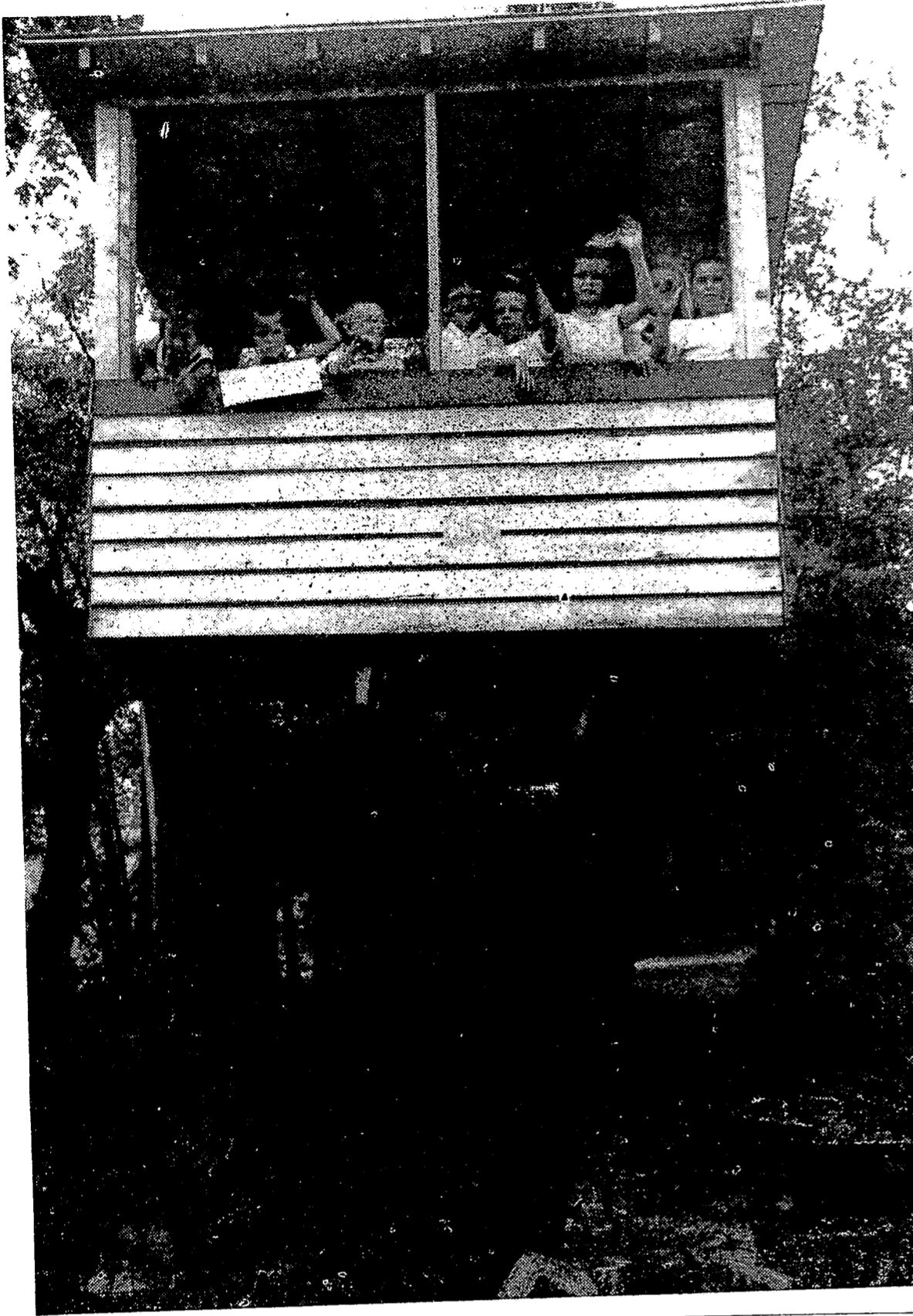

A Tree Was A Tree, Now A Hut

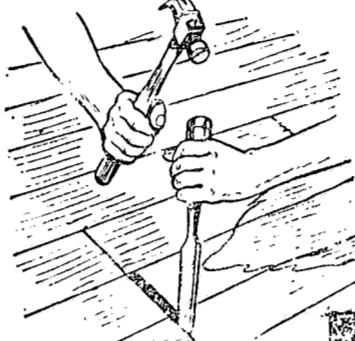

Ed Campbell of Clarkston was one of 55 candidates extended invitations for the 1962 football team at Michigan Tech. Houghton, Michigan.

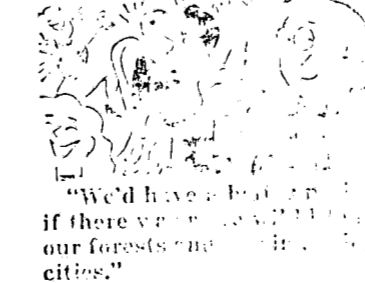

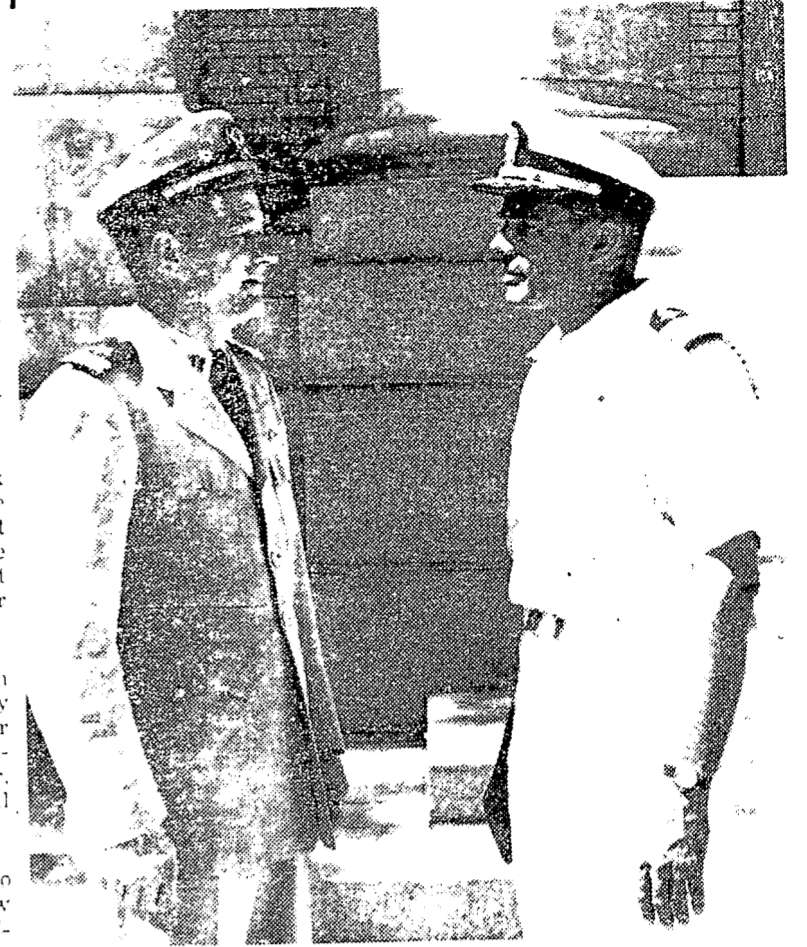

WILL YOUR CHILD DROP OUT OF SCHOOL?

Nearly one million boys and girls 16 and 17 years of age, who should be in high school, are not. They have left their books behind and hang out in gangs on street corners, or work casually from time to time at low paid jobs. Few are equipped for regular employment. Many of them are habitués of the juvenile courts.

These are high-school dropouts.

They are a big problem now, and in a few years will be an even bigger problem. The U. S. Labor Department has estimated that within the next 10 years 7,500,000 youths will quit school before finishing high school. Educators are concerned about this prospect, unless the schools are able to provide courses that will keep these young people in school and train them for useful lives.

The number of jobs available for unskilled workers is decreasing year by year, because of advances of technology. But the number of people who will be seeking such jobs is increasing rapidly.

Why are large numbers of young people leaving high school before graduation and why is this problem considered so serious by educators and other civic leaders? Will your child be a high-school dropout?

The following members were awarded white ribbons on their auto workbooks, Victor Bentley, Cecil Caverly and Jon Foster. This is the clubs first year in the Auto Project.

Another new project this year is the Dog Husbandry project which is taught by project leader Mrs. James Casper who also is the Auto project leader. Red ribbons were awarded to Barbara Taylor, Cleo Caverly and Sue Ann Bear. White ribbons were awarded to Cecil Caverly, Janet Casper, Kerry Caverly and Alan Caverly. New Maps All Gone
The Michigan State Highway Department ran out of 1962 highway maps July 31. Public Information Officer Tom Farrell said the demand for this year's map was greater than any previous year.

"We stopped filling requests for bulk shipments of maps less than a month after they arrived from the printer," Farrell said. "We've been filling only requests for single copies since July 15." Farrell said requests for quantity shipments totaling more than 50,000 maps have been unfulfilled and the individuals, companies and chambers of commerce requesting bulk shipments have been notified that the Highway Department is out of maps.

The Highway Department has distributed more than 600,000 maps since mid-June. The biggest increase in demand for maps was in individual requests. Up to 2000 letters and post cards arrived daily during the peak demand. The most popular feature of this year's map, Farrell said, are the strip maps of Michigan's 825 mile freeway system showing all points of entrance and exit.

"We've had more favorable comment on the strip maps than anything else on the map and they are one of the principal reasons for the increase in individual requests," Farrell said. Copies of the map are still available from travel agencies, chambers of commerce, and regional tourist centers and similar outlets but they are going rapidly. Whether the map order can be increased next year is a budgetary problem now being studied, Farrell said.

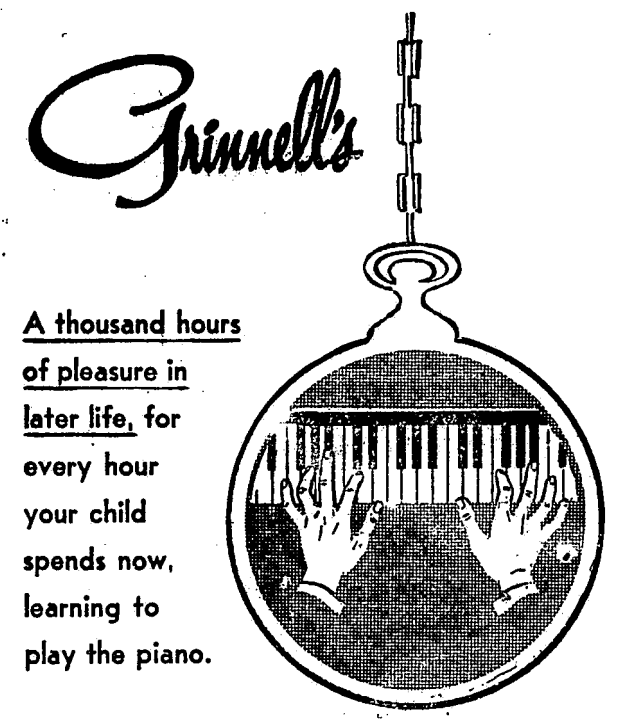

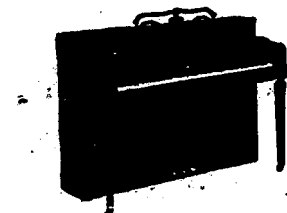

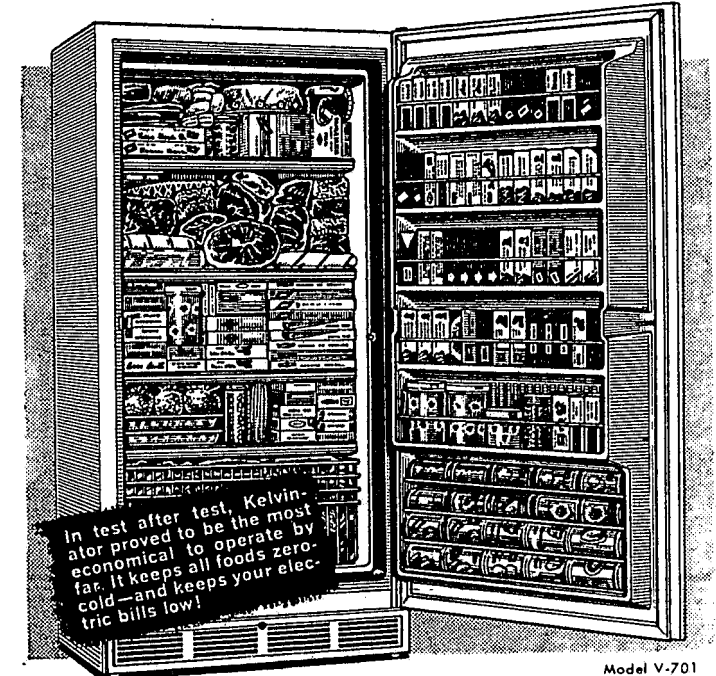
