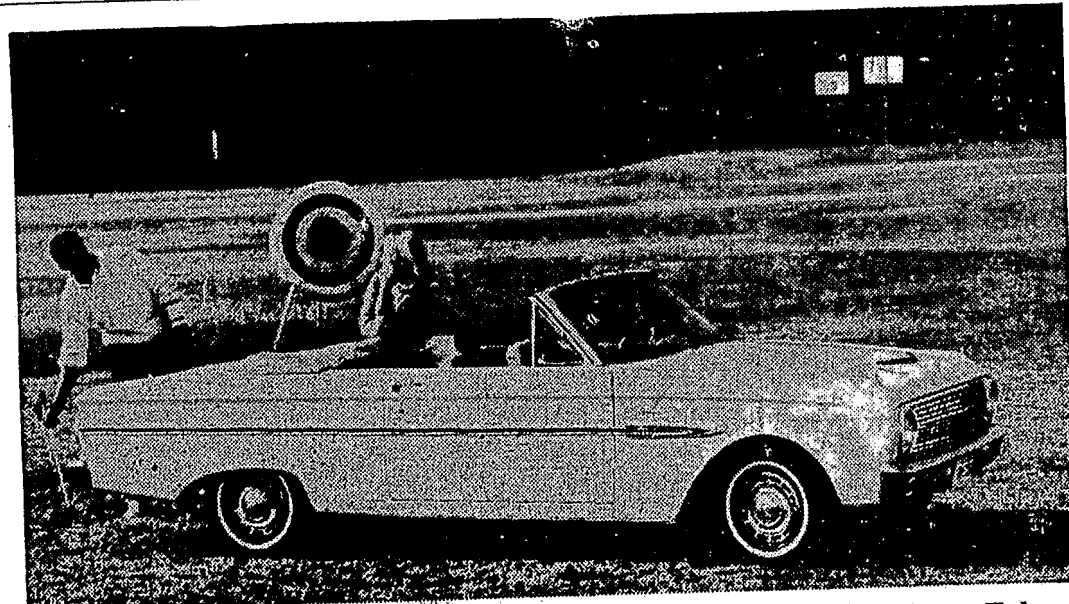

ORDINANCE No. 42 AMENDMENT TO INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP ZONING ORDINANCE No. 42

ADOPTED: August 28, 1962
EFFECTIVE: October 6, 1962

TITLE: AN ORDINANCE, to amend the Zoning District Map of Ordinance No. 2, as amended, of the Township of Independence.

THE BOARD OF INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP OF THE COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

Section 1. The Zoning District Map of Ordinance No. 2, The Independence Township Zoning Ordinance, as amended, is hereby amended as follows:
