## Clarkston Adds 42 Acres

September 10, the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, by a vote of 43 to 36, authorized the annexation of 42 Independence Township acres to the Village of Clarkston.

Included in the annexed land, valued at \$179,000, are Clarkston Ranch Homesites, Clarkston Estates and Clarkston Estates No. 1. Clarkston being older than the 1909 Home Rule Act of Michigan.

## Another Day

As word went back East that Michigan was not the vast fever ridden swamp as was once claimed, but a land good for farms and homes, the trickle of settlers grew larger. People of every walk of life trekked westward, farmers mostly, but there were a goodly number of other trades of that day represented: coopers, wagoners, blacksmiths, weavers, but very few doctors came. One reason was that even in the eastern states there were not a great many physicians. Most of those felt that their patients needed them right where they were, and so for the most part, pioneers found themselves relying upon women who had a home spun knowledge of medicines and midwifery, and were expert at gathering and brewing the many herbs used in healing. As time went on, a few doctors made their way to this vicinity, but many of our earliest practitioners were children of the settlers who saw a need for doctors and took up the practice with what education and facilities were available to them. One such a person came to this country with his parents when he was less than a year old, Jo-

sephus Goodenough. The father of the family built a log shanty on the shores of Straight's Lake in West Bloomfield Township for his wife and seven children, and the first schooling Josephus received was in an old stable that had been fitted up for a school-room. The opportunities for book knowledge was extremely limited, & after working for his father until he was 18, (something which was expected of children in those days) Josephus went to live with an uncle. While he was there, in Macomb county, he attended a village school for two years.

It was after these two years of schooling that he began his training for a doctor and there does not seem to be any similarity between the training he got and the training required today for a doctor's degree. For four years he read medicine with a doctor in Almont, watching the doctor as he cared for his patients, helping with some of the cases, storing up in his mind all the physical had to tell him.

His next step was to enter the Eclectic Medical College in Cincinnati, Ohio. This method followed the belief that nature is the best restorer and the doctor's

job was to aid nature by placing his patients in proper condition. It's been a long time since anyone earned the right to be called "Doctor" by following this line of study. Later Doctor Goodenough took one term of lectures at Ann Arbor. While today, much more is required in the way of studies, he had a large and loyal following of patients both in Waterford, where he practiced from about 1864 to 1872, and in Clarkston. It was in 1872, following the death of his first wife,

## Survival Courses Available Soon

The Township of Independence in cooperation with the Oakland County Office of Civil Defense and Oakland County Health Department, announces a Medical Emergency Course in Survival and Disaster Training available to all interested adults in the Clarkston and Independence area, beginning Tuesday, September 18, 1962, at Clarkston Elementary School, Clarkston. The course will be held from 8 - 10 p.m. each Tuesday for 13 weeks and will include instruction and practice in the following subject areas: Casualty Care Plans; Basic Medical Disaster Plans; First Aid; Shock and Burns; Emergency Birth or Disaster Born Baby; Radiation and Fallout, Decontamination, home, person; Medical and Nursing Aspects of Radiation Sickness; Hypodermic Technique, Use of Syrettes; Blood Pressure Technique; Intravenous Techniques; Parental Therapy; Contagion or Isolation Techniques; Emergency Sanitation; Psychological Warfare; and Field Exercise. The conversion of a school to Emergency Hospital, Mrs. Herminio Rodriguez, Jr., R.N. of the Oakland County Health Department and the Oakland County Civil Defense Office, is the Director of Training for the course and will teach some of the classes. Qualified instructors from the area and local doctors will teach sections of the course.

## Davisburg CAA Completes Successful Summer Program

The Community Activities Association, co-sponsored by the Davisburg Jaycees has just completed a very successful summer program. This included the organization and operation of the Little League, Babe Ruth League and Girls' Softball Teams.

The Assistant is now planning a winter bowling program, among other things, which will start Saturday, October 6 and continue every Saturday until March, 1963.

To be eligible for the program, boys and girls in the ten through sixteen age group must reside in the Holly Area School District and attend, have attended or live in the area served by the Davisburg Elementary School.

A cost of \$1.25 per week will be divided and used as follows: one dollar, bowling fee; ten cents, shoe rental; fifteen cents, banquet and trophies.

## Conservatory Begins Fourth Year

The Clarkston Conservatory of Music began its fourth year on September 10 with private instruction offered in piano, violin, guitar, percussion, wind instruments and group instruction in ballet arts and music appreciation.

New members of the Conservatory staff this year are James Waring, violinist, William Howarth, cellist and James Herring pianist.

Mr. Warring and Mr. Howarth are both members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and Mr. Herring is a staff accompanist at the University of Michigan School of Music.

Louis Golden, owner of the Redford Steel Corporation and spokesman for the group, has said that a final decision by the ARA may not be reached for about two months.

Plans for this project have been studied for about eight months, and Mr. Golden believes that they are standing on solid financial ground.

The proposed plant and property needed will cost \$1,251,650. The plant would be constructed on a fifteen acre site and contain about sixty thousand square feet of floor space. To begin with, the firm would employ seventy-seven people at an annual payroll of \$355,512.00. Within a year the firm should employ one hundred and nineteen area persons at an annual payroll of \$496,704.

Mr. Golden said that his group would assist the new firm with a \$316,000 loan for purchase of the land with the money being repaid at a six per cent interest.

## Davisburg Factory Plans In Progress

Everything has been set into motion for Davisburg to realize a new manufacturing firm. All that can be done to reach this goal has been done. Further developments await the decision of the Area Redevelopment Agency, which assists in establishing new firms in depressed areas.

The Michigan Economic Development Department has endorsed plans for a \$813,572.00 plan to help establish a new manufacturing firm in the community.

The firm if established, will be called the Columbia Steel Corntainer Corporation. It will manufacture large drums for chemicals.

The Davisburg Industrial Development Corporation, which was incorporated by a group of investors, was organized by Mrs. Clyde Nelsey. The organization stands solidly behind this project.
