There will be refreshments for everyone and lots of gay, colorful balloons for the young people and it is hoped that the whole family will come in for a visit.

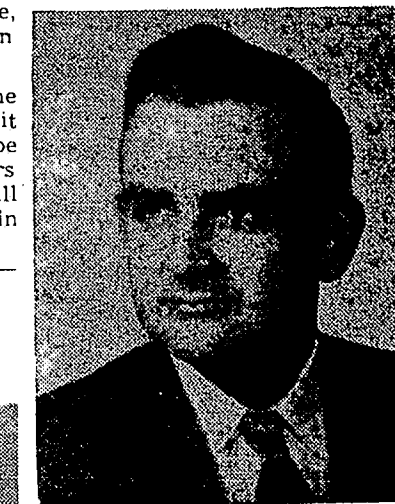

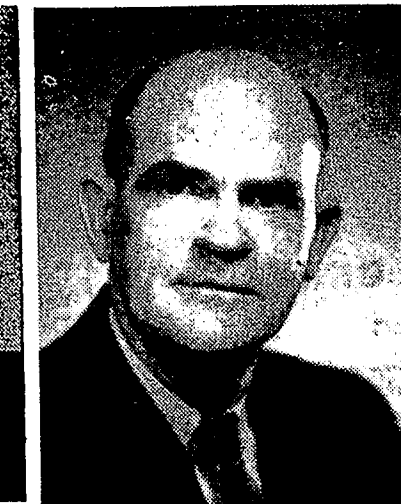

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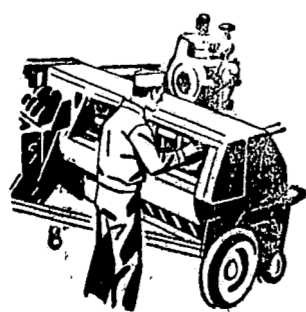
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Pack 199 met, Tuesday, October 9th for a Halloween Party. The boys wore costumes and played games.

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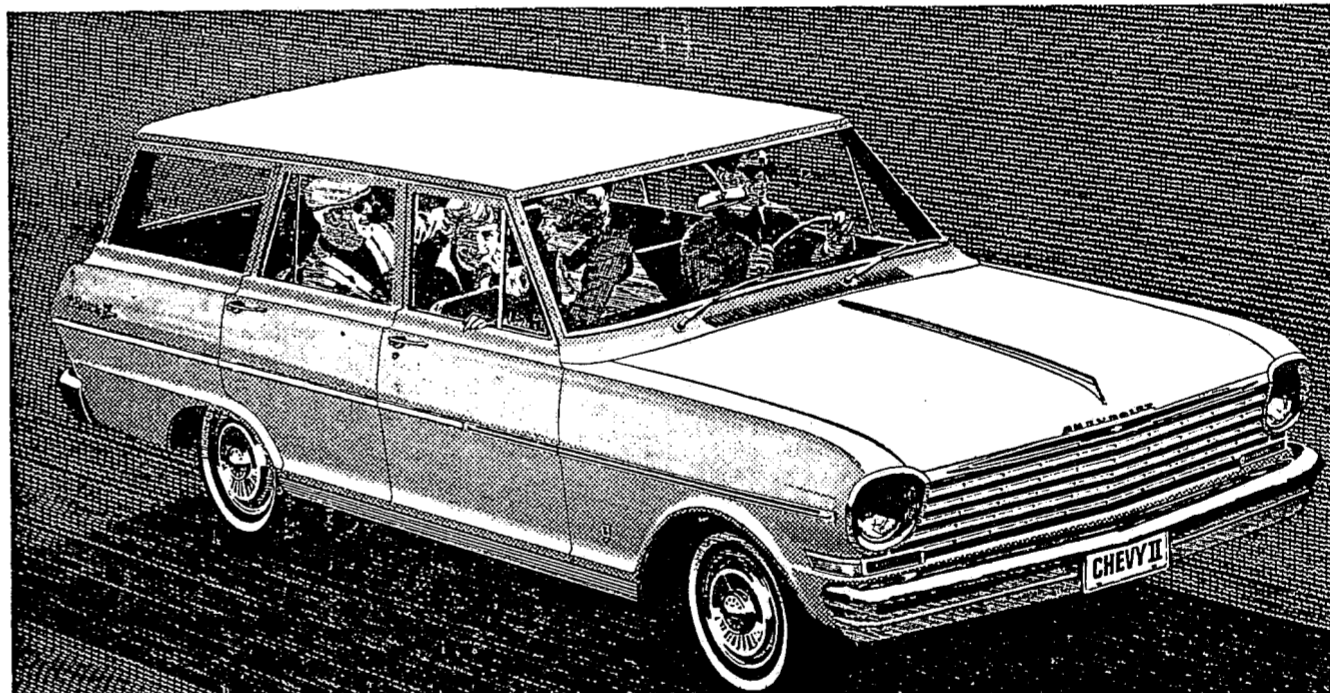

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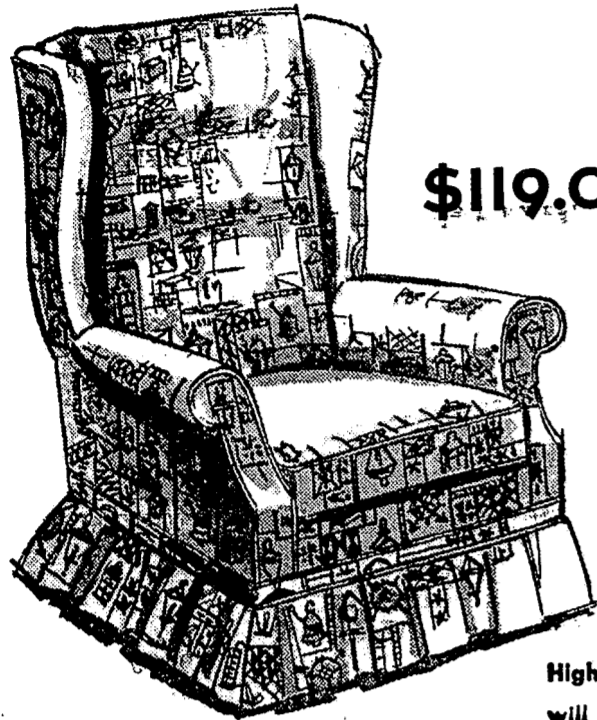
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Guidance Corner

This article was written with the cooperation of elementary and junior high school teachers from the Clarkston Community School system.

How Parents Can Help Children With Their Elementary Education.

1. Encourage and enforce regular school attendance.
2. Insist that your child bring his papers home from school. Check these papers and help him strengthen the areas in which he exhibits a weakness. Constantly check his academic progress.
3. Listen to your child read and help him understand the words.
4. Instill the proper attitudes and values toward education and school. Teach your child respect for school authorities.
5. If homework is required, help your child to understand the work. Be sure he has a well lighted and quiet area in which to do his work.
6. Be aware of the new methods of education and see that any home instruction in methods agrees with school procedures. If in doubt, consult with the teacher.
7. Have your child maintain good health habits and acquire the necessary rest. Be sure the clothing he wears is appropriate for prevailing weather conditions.
8. Provide good reading material at home to supplement the reading programs at school.
9. If you are in doubt about school policies or any part of the schools educational program, consult with the teacher or principal.
10. Let your child do his own work. Help and encourage your child to be neat in all his work

- and to do his best at all times.
11. Encourage your child to do more than is expected of him.
 12. Develop proper study habits beginning with the early grades. Poor habits are not changed overnight. A close home-school relationship will aid in establishing good work habits in the lower grades.
 13. Each child should be taught responsibility for his own personal behavior in the classroom and in conjunction with other children.
 14. Participate in school programs such as the P.T.A., etc.

How Parents Can Help Children With Their Junior High Education

1. Provide for a minimum of one hour study time every day at home.
2. Parents should check to see if homework is being completed. If your child says he does not have homework, then the time should be used for concentrated study.
3. Instill in your child the importance and the value of acquiring a good education.
4. See that your child attends school regularly and maintains respect for school authorities.
5. If you do not understand the methods by which your child is being taught, then a conference with his teachers should be held.
6. Have your child get plenty of rest. Some students either fall asleep in class or are too tired to pay attention in class.
7. Supervise the television schedule. Is the amount of time spent watching television at the expense of school studies?
8. Provide for a home library. Surround your youngster with good magazines and books. If your child has difficulty reading, have him read orally at home. There are many remedial courses offered during the summer. If you have not done so, visit the local library with your child.
9. Parents should acquaint themselves with the textbooks their youngsters bring home. Demonstrate an interest in your

youngster's school work. Ask your child questions which deal with his school work.

Each parent, if possible should meet with the teachers at the beginning of each school year. It is also your responsibility as parents to visit with teachers later during the school year and discuss your child in terms of academic weaknesses and strength.

11. Parents of eighth grade stu-

dents should attend the high school orientation program which will be held in the spring. Each parent will receive a written invitation to this program.
