Guidance Corner

PLANNING FOR COLLEGE AND SCHOLARSHIPS DURING HIGH SCHOOL

Let us begin with each grade

starting with the 8th and 9th, and see if we can formulate a practical method of college and scholarship planning. From grades 1-8 the subject matter in our elementary and junior high school is set. The student usually doesn't have much choice regarding the subjects he will take.

In the second semester of the 8th grade, however, the student registers for high school. Here is

the first big step in college and scholarship planning.

It is here he usually makes a decision as to the type of high school program he is going to study. Clarkston High School has three choices:

1. The General
2. The Commercial of Business Curriculum
3. The College Preparatory Program.

We organized a registration committee composed of faculty members and the counselors who meet with the 8th grade students to discuss these curricula. We are planning a high school orientation program again in March for parents. If you miss this program, visit the counselor and have him explain the curriculum to you. You and your son or daughter, together, should plan a proposed four year high school program so you will be able to get a comprehensive view of the

academic preparation your child will have when he graduates. Discuss your child's program not in view of what college entrance requirements are, but what they might be in four years.

Scholarship
Information regarding various scholarships is posted on the school bulletin board as it is received by the counselors and an announcement is usually made over the public address system regarding this information.

Here are some guides for parents to follow in regard to the education of their children. It is hoped these will enable you to help your child make wiser decisions regarding college admission and scholarships.

1. Begin planning early, don't wait until the senior year.
2. Visit the high school - Discuss with the counselor your child's high school program relative to his abilities.

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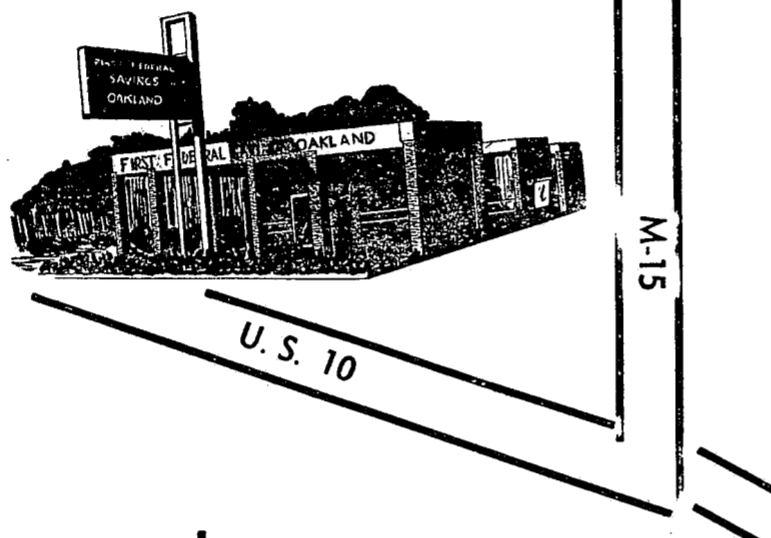

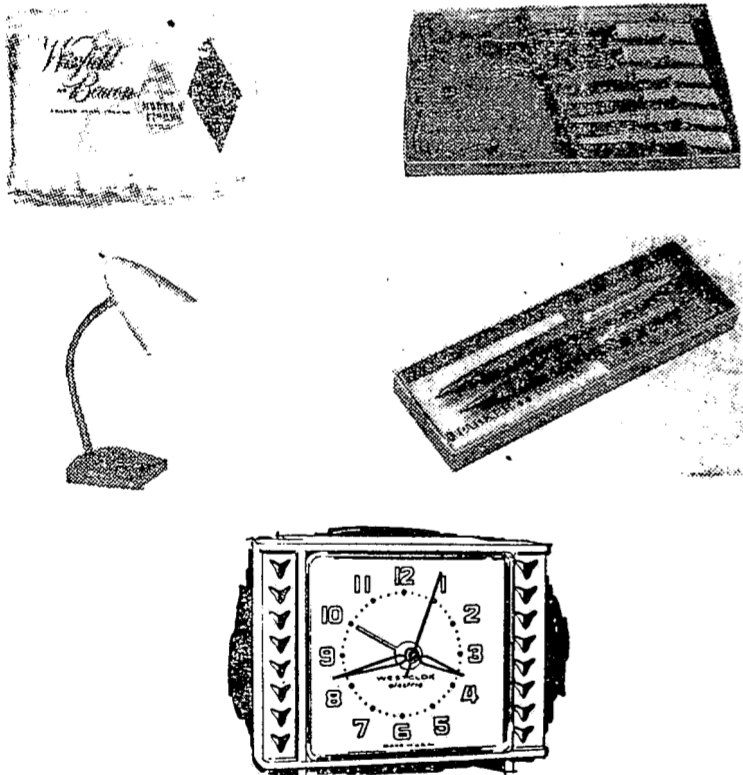

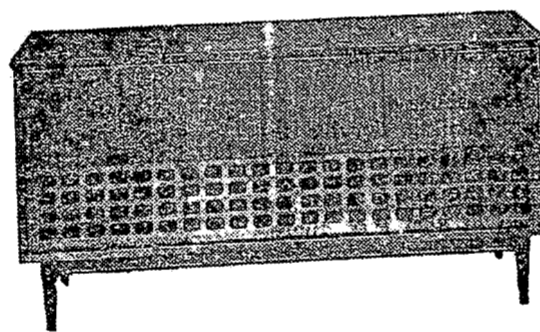

3. Discuss with your child the family's financial situation. They could be wasting their time trying for some scholarships if the family income is too high, unless there has been an unusual circumstance like high medical expenses, etc.

4. Urge the student in need of financial assistance to work during the summer and perhaps during college as well. 26% of the funds used by students to pay for college expenses come from part-time and summer work.

5. Encourage your youngster, whatever the financial circumstances, to continue his education beyond high school. Supply him with information concerning all types of financial aid.

6. Check with the counselors in regard to the scholarship file, they will provide you with suggestions as to where you may seek additional information, such as the school library college catalogs, and various industrial firms.

7. Check with the teachers if your youngster has special talents.

8. Don't plan on scholarships alone. It's very rare if a student gets his education paid for by a single scholarship agency. A scholarship, in nearly all cases, is an aid to finding education -- not a complete free ride. Many scholarship administrators will want to know when you apply, just what your plans are for taking care of the rest of your expenses.

To The Student
Remember that getting into college is just half the battle. Sometimes you'll be better off accepting a smaller scholarship -- or even none at all -- at a school where scholarship and loan money is available on generous terms after the freshmen year. Some colleges may specialize in an area where you have a special talent. If your interests lie in, say, music, check the universities for scholarship possibilities. Bear in mind too, that most scholarship students have part-time jobs -- make sure the college of your choice can supply you with a job as well as a grant.

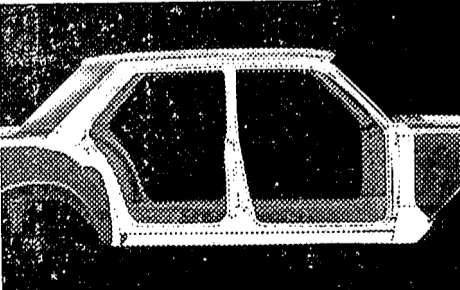
