## New Lutheran Church Building To Open



New Calvary Church Building

The Calvary Lutheran Church of Clarkston will begin holding worship services in the new church building at 6805 Bluegrass Drive, located at the S.W. intersection of M-15 and I-75, next Sunday, November 4, at 9:30 A.M., 11:00 A.M., and 3:00 P.M.

Family Worship Services will be held at 9:30 A.M. and 11:00 A.M. There will be no church school, and children are cordially invited to the worship services. A Nursery under the direction of Mrs. Allan Wickman will be provided for young children. A message from the building committee chairman, Mr. Martin J. Gustafson, and a sermon by Pastor Paul A. Johns entitled "A Structure That Summons" will be brought at both services. The choir under direction of Mrs. H. Rubert Cox will sing the appropriate anthem, "Holy, Holy, Holy."

In the afternoon a special invitation is being extended to take part in the opening festivities at 3:00 P.M. Greetings will be given by the Reverend Alexander Stewart, secretary of and representing the Independence Township Pastor's Association; Mr. Duane Hursfall, Independence Township; Mr. Jess Berg, Clarkston Rotary; Mr. Keith Hallman, Clarkston Business Men's Association; and Mr. Milford Mason, Clarkston Jaycees. Special Music

will be provided. Pastor Johns will give an informal talk on the story behind the formation of this new church and church structure. Following this there will be refreshments and an Open House. The Open House Committee is composed of Mrs. Carl Birkelo, Mrs. Richard Blasey, and Mrs. Lloyd Kirby.

The new church building sits on a beautiful 5.26 acre tract of land with glass doors opening out to rolling hills and the new Chrysler Expressway (I-75) and opening in to a simple, purposeful, and very attractive Sanctuary. Through the glass doors passers by either on the Circular Drive or on Bluegrass Dr. can look into the Sanctuary and up to the Altar. At night the radiant colors in the windows can be seen clearly from either M-15 or I-75.

The Building is an all-purpose functional First Unit in a total Building Program. The \$45,200 General Contract was submitted by Waterford Construction Co., Pontiac; Baughn Plumbing and Heating, Flint; and Shultz Electrical Service, Pontiac. Architect was T. Neel Eubank, Flint. General Contract, Architect's Fees, privately let Contracts and Furnishings bring the cost of the Building to \$53,000.00. Labor for Painting was donated by the V.J. Paint Co., Utica, and labor for

Tiling by Advance Floor Decorators, Drayton Plains. Several items and other projects were donated by members of the Congregation.

Members of the Building Committee who have been actively involved in their positions since April, 1961, are Martin Gustafson, Chairman, Mrs. William Sharpe, John R. Evans, Robert Krick, Leslie Purslow, and Charles Schlutow.

The Calvary Lutheran Church has been meeting in the Clarkston Elementary School since September, 1960. Formal organization of the Congregation took place on January 22, 1961. Adult Membership as of this date numbers 125, with 261 Baptized Members, and 117 children enrolled in the Church School. Average attendance at Worship Services for the month of October was 139 and in the Church School was 98. Estimated Budget for 1963 is \$13,284, which does not include the \$3,000 Grant-in-Aid from the Board of American Missions.

Since its inception, the Calvary Lutheran Church has tried to provide an effective witness and service of the Christian Gospel, and it is the hope and conviction of the Congregation that the new Church Building will enable that witness and service to be even more effective. With this in mind the Calvary Lutheran Church cordially invites you to the Opening Festivities this Sunday.

Mr. Ainsley, 75, of 34 N. Holcomb Street passed away on Friday, October 26, in Pontiac General Hospital where he had been for 22 days.

Mr. Ainsley was born in Clarkston, October 2, 1887 the son of Clarence and Eva Bradley Ainsley. He was wed to Irene VanHorn Boice in Vassar on September 5, 1935. He had spent his entire life in Oakland County.

Mr. Ainsley served his country in World War I and for many

## Letter To The Editor

Governor Swainson, charging Romney with leadership failure during last winter's tax debate in the legislature, stated, "The opportunity was there, the man was lacking."

This attack Romney could not answer fully for himself. We who sat through Con-Con with him can. Had Romney intervened between the legislature and the governor, CIO leader of the Democratic Con-Con delegates would have accused him on the floor of "using Con-Con as a springboard into the governorship". Swainson, no matter how great his need for Romney's help, would have echoed their words.

CIO delegates took every opportunity to twist Romney's discussion of constitution issues into political directions.
