Springfield Township Election Results

Eight hundred and fifty-one people out of eleven hundred and ninety-nine registered voters cast votes in the November 6 election.

On the state question 243 voted yes and 184 voted no. There were 278 yes votes and 151 no votes on the county question.

MSUO Begins Work On Co-Ed Student House

Construction began today on a \$345,000 co-educational residence which will house 48 men and 48 women students at Michigan State University Oakland.

Similar in design to MSUO's other student residences which house 96 students each. The new building is L-shaped, two storied, and has 12 double rooms on each floor of each of the two wings.

The wings, one for men and one for women, are joined by a resident advisor's apartment. There is a community lounge, as well as separate lounges in each wing.

MSUO selected this design in preference to the large, impersonal, multistoried building campuses.

Named Pryale House in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Harry M. Pryale, of Bloomfield Hills, the new residence is part of a total gift of \$450,000 from the Pryale Foundation. The balance of the gift will be used for a major nuclear physics teaching and research project, and a high-speed digital computer. Pryale is the former president and board chairman of Baldwin Rubber Co. of Pontiac.

Jaycees Seek Ideal Teen Girl

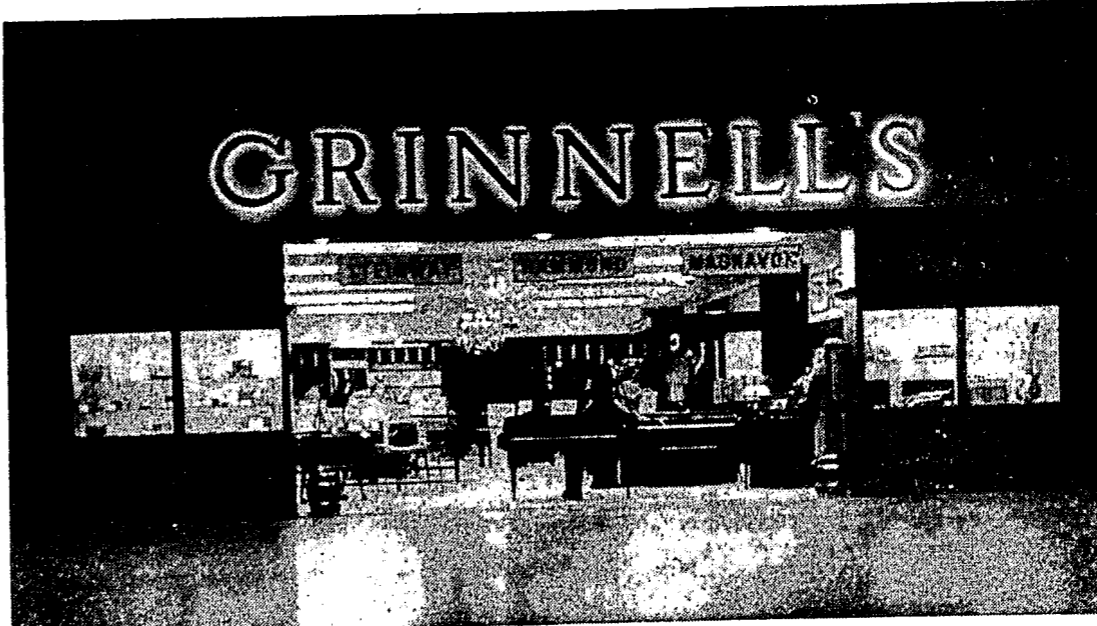
Somewhere in the Clarkston area is the ideal teen-ager. say the Clarkston Area Jaycees.

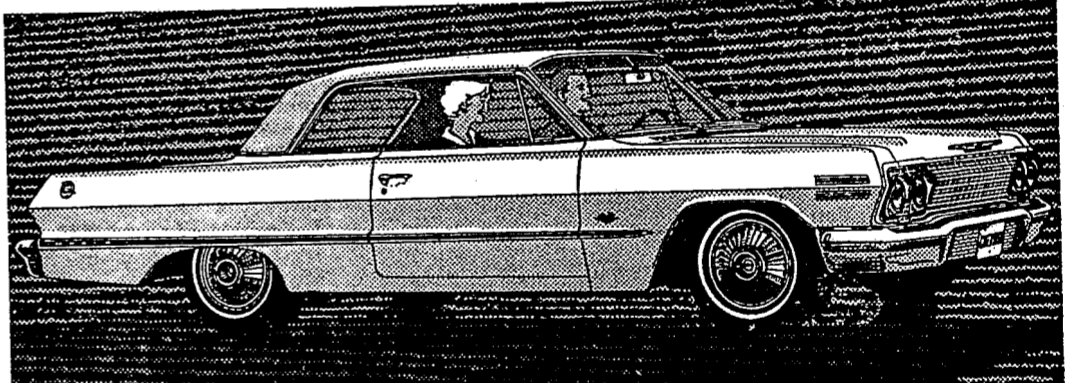

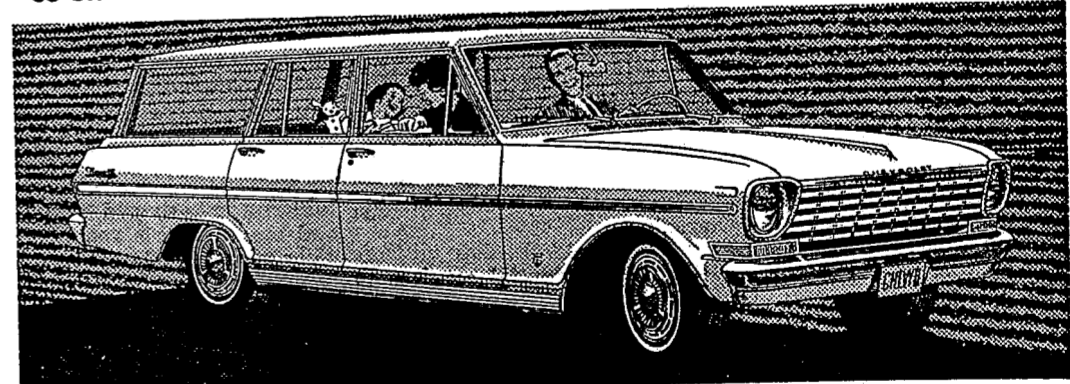

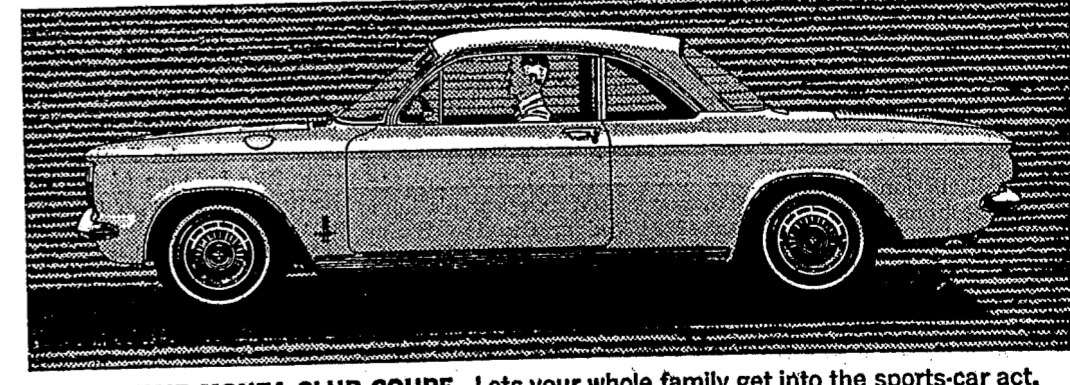

Rather I shall briefly present some reasons why teenagers go steady and some of the problems that are associated with this practice. Even though I have personal feelings in regard to going steady by teenagers I shall try to be unbiased as possible and present to you the situation as teenagers themselves view **Going Steady**. Almost all of the information presented has been received through interviews with present high school students, graduates, and parents. Bold face comments are my own.

REASONS GIVEN FOR GOING STEADY

1. When one goes steady you are assured of a date. You are never left out of an activity.
2. There is just one person I like. I don't like anyone else as well.
3. You don't have to put on "airs": You can just be yourself.
4. It's the thing to do. Everyone is doing it and if you don't you are not one of the crowd. It becomes a status symbol.
5. The boys do not have the problem of asking a girl for a date and being refused.

REASONS GIVEN FOR NOT GOING STEADY

1. When one begins to go steady at an early age they do not have the opportunity to compare different men or women in regard to certain qualities. This should be done in preparation for making a wise decision in regard to

choosing a marriage mate.

2. It's extremely difficult to break up. If you do sometimes you are looked down upon by other students. Many young people tell us they would like to break up but everyone will call them mean or as they say "I really played a dirty trick on him or her."
3. There is always a hurt feeling on the part of one of the partners. Especially the jilted one.
4. The longer you go steady the closer you get in your relationships. First its holding hands and kissing and eventually this leads into a petting situation. We find many of the youngsters are not emotionally ready to handle some of the situations they find themselves in.
5. Some girls are afraid if they break up the boy will tell lies about them in regard to their relationship.
6. On many occasions one of

the partners usually the girl cuts herself off from a great many of her friends.

7. When the break up does occur two things may happen. (1) Many boys will not date the girl assuming she is still going steady. (2) Many boys will not date the girl because they believe the girl still belongs to one particular boy.
8. When I was going steady my boy friend thought he owned me. I had to tell him where I was going all the time and more or less explain all my actions. (1) I couldn't walk down the school halls with another boy. (2) I couldn't dance with another boy. (3) I couldn't even talk to another boy.
9. After about five weeks of going steady we had arguments all the time, but social pressure kept us going steady.
10. After going steady for a year the social pressure placed on us by other kids and our

families kept us from breaking up. One girl told us that she went through with a wedding because she was sure she had chosen the right partner, but because the families had become so involved and everybody expected them to get married. The social pressure became so great she was unable to cope with it and she went through with the wedding.
