New School Site Purchased By Board Of Education

The Board of Education completed a population projection survey in 1961 and determined from its findings that three additional school sites should be purchased in the near future for the purpose of having available land on which to erect school buildings as the need arises to house the increasing enrollments.

The most immediate need was determined to be in the area North of Clarkston-Orion Road and East of Sashabaw Road. Several sites in this area were inspected by the Board of Education and negotiations were conducted with owners of three of the sites.

The location that was determined to most nearly meet the previously established criteria and to be best suited for a building site is a 20 acre tract on the George Miller farm North of Clarkston-Orion Road and bounded on the East by Pine Knob Road.

The site was subsequently purchased with Building and Site Funds in the amount of \$17,797.50.

Legal description of the property is as follows:

Part of Northeast 1/4 of Section 15, described as: Beginning at East 1/4 corner of Sec-

tion 15; thence South 89 degrees 47 minutes 00 seconds West 1341.94 feet along East and West 1/4 line of Section 15; thence North 01 degrees 14 minutes 40 seconds East 528.54 feet; thence North 80 degrees 00 minutes 40 seconds East 1350.88 feet to East line of Section 15; thence South 757.75 feet along the East section line to point of beginning, containing 19.797 acres.

The Board of Education is currently interviewing several architectural firms prior to selecting an architect to design an elementary school tentatively scheduled for erection on this site before the fall of 1964. The new elementary located in the North-east portion of the school district will temporarily relieve the pressure on the Junior High School, the Clarkston Elementary and the Pine Knob Elementary Schools by transferring some of the children now being transported to the existing buildings to the new elementary and by moving the sixth grades from the Junior High Building back to the elementary schools.

Special Election Next Monday

All registered voters of the Brandon School District are urged by the Board of Education to vote December 17, 1962 upon the question of renewing the eight mills special operation tax which has been in effect for the past four years. It is not necessary to be a property owner in order to be eligible to vote.

The polls will be open in the High School Gymnasium from 7:00 A.M. until 8:00 P.M. Absentee ballots are available at the school superintendent's office.

Failure to renew the millage would cost the district about one-fourth of its income. For each dollar collected from local taxes for the special eight mills, the district would receive approximately eighty-three cents in the form of state hardship money. Hardship money is based on a formula for each mill above 20 levied by a school district.

Approval of the millage would permit the district to retain its present curriculum without an increase in school taxes. School officials point out that there are many areas in the curriculum that need improvement and any curtailment would mean an inferior education for the youth of the district.

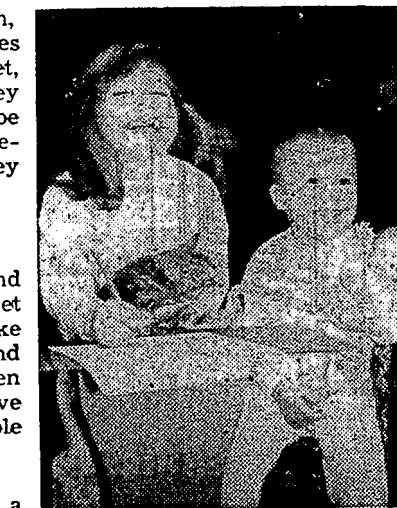

Christmas Program On The Agenda

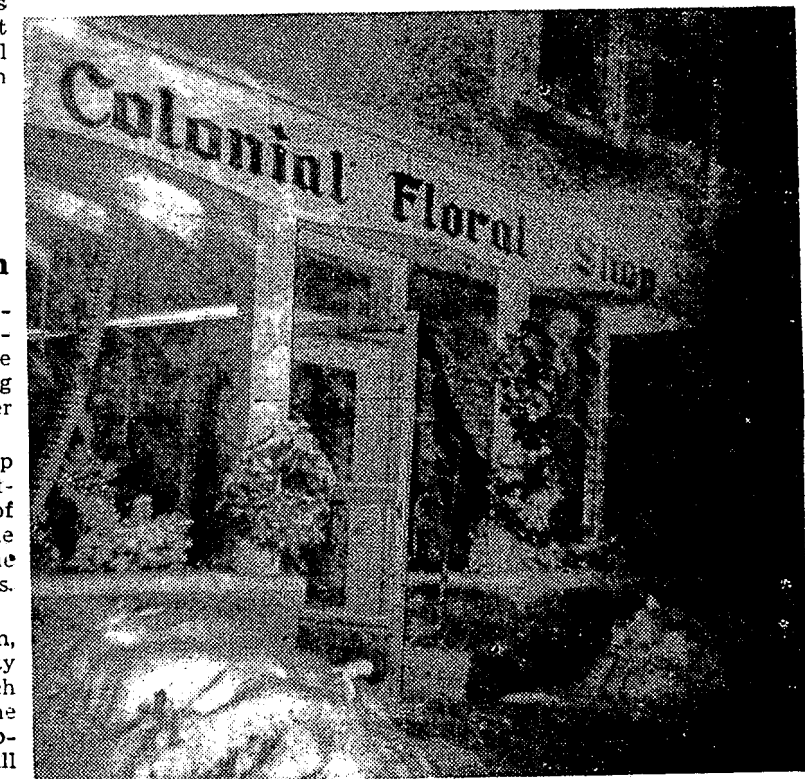
A gala Christmas concert will be presented by the entire music department of the Brandon Schools on December 18th in the gymnasium.
