The highpoint of the Christmas Season at First Methodist Church Clarkston will be reached this coming Christmas Sunday, December 23rd, with the two Christmas Sunday Services. The Church School hour will be omitted so that the church families may worship together. At the 9:00 A.M. Service Associate Pastor, The Reverend Mr. Jack Giguere, will tell the story of "The Visited Planet" and at the 11:15 a.m. Service, The Reverend Mr. William Richards, will relate the story of "The Other Wiseman".

The Choral arrangement skillfully combines selections by the entire Choir with selections from the Women's Chorus and Men's Chorus.

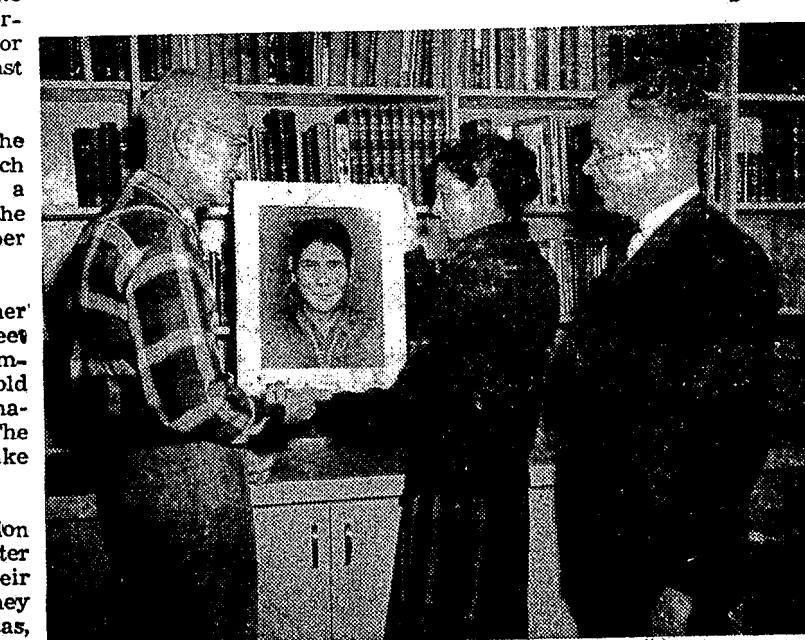
