According to a Clarkston postal employee, Mr. John Ronk, the new surface postal rates are effective as of midnight Sunday, January 6. The new rates will be 5c per ounce for first class mail, as opposed to the present 4c and 8c for air mail, as opposed to the 7c per ounce postage now in effect. Mr. Ronk informs us that all mail will be taken from the box outside the Clarkston Post Office at midnight Sunday, and will be mailed at the present rates. Any items mailed after this time must contain the correct postage as per the above new rates.



HOMES NEEDED FOR ELDERLY PEOPLE

Many elderly people, who are well enough to leave State Mental hospitals are being transferred to facilities within the community.

The goal of the Michigan Department of Mental Health, and the State Department of Social Welfare is to transfer those who are well enough to leave the hospital, to boarding homes, convalescent homes or county medical facilities so that they can be replaced by patients now on waiting lists.

Miss Ora L. Hinckley, Supervisor of the Oakland County Bureau of Social Aid, said that boarding homes are needed for those who have no families to care for them.


This tool is used by Mom to understand her family better, by teacher to discover an inhibition to learning in a student, by those who employ people, by counselors in vocational education, etc.


