These were mailed to you December 1st.

## "BOBBINS" FROM BOB

It has been brought to my attention that an alarming amount of dog poisoning has been reported in the Oakhill, Reese and Allen Roads area. Approximately 9 dogs have been poisoned to date.

According to Mrs. Martin Davis of the Michigan Animal Rescue League in Pontiac, the rat poisoning that is being used on the dogs, is also very harmful to children. If rat poisoning must be used for rats, place it in a sheltered place where pets and children cannot reach it.

It has been pointed out that if a rat were put to the shooting of the hawks in the dump on M-15 north of Clarkston, these birds would kill the rats that are in that area.

Do you want the death of a pet or possibly a child on your conscience? A \$50 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone found poisoning or shooting a domestic animal is being offered by the Michigan Animal Rescue League in Pontiac. It is against the law to shoot a domestic animal whether on your property or not.

It is only permissible to use firearms at the dump for practice purposes upon the consent of the custodian. Should anyone have a complaint concerning shooting at the dump, they may, in person or by letter, bring such complaint to one of the three townships owning this dump, Independence, Groveland and Brandon.

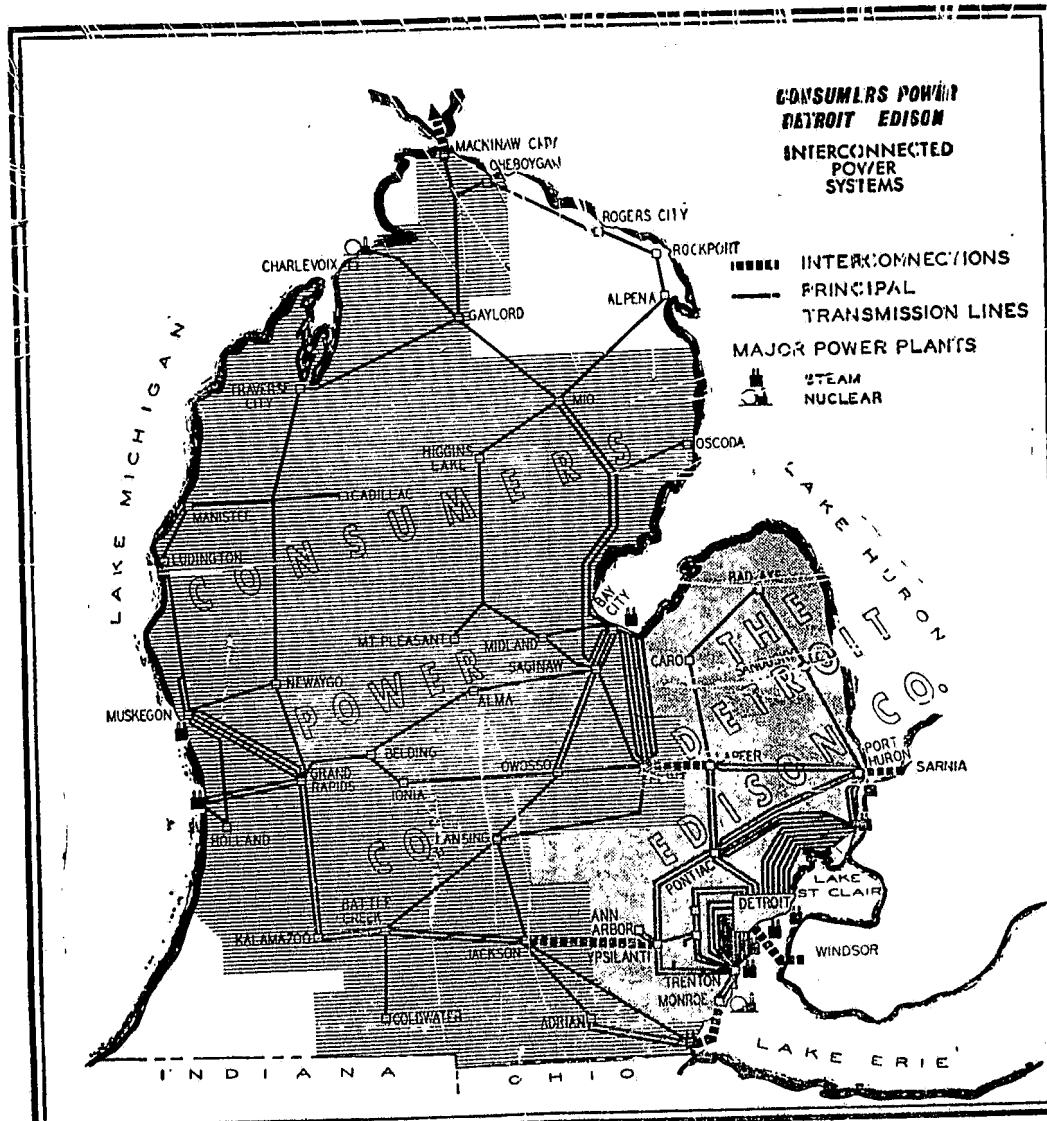

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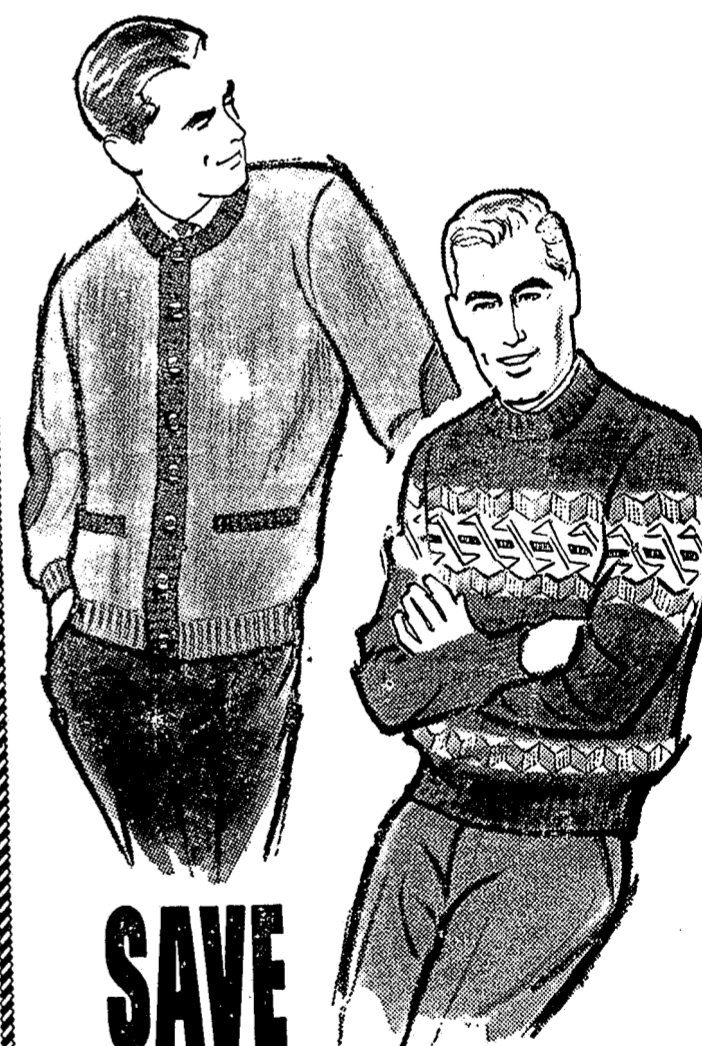

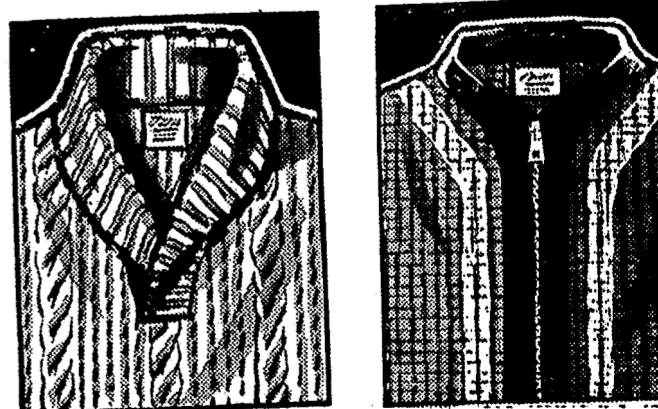
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
