Receive Share of Highway Fund

The State Highway Department has started distributing fourth quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said net receipts of the Highway Fund during October, November and December of 1962, amounted to \$46,177,670, a decrease of \$1,339,825 compared to the same period of 1961.

Major reason for the decrease was that sale of 1963 license tabs fell off considerably compared to license sales during the same period in 1961 when motorists were issued their first new license plates in three years.

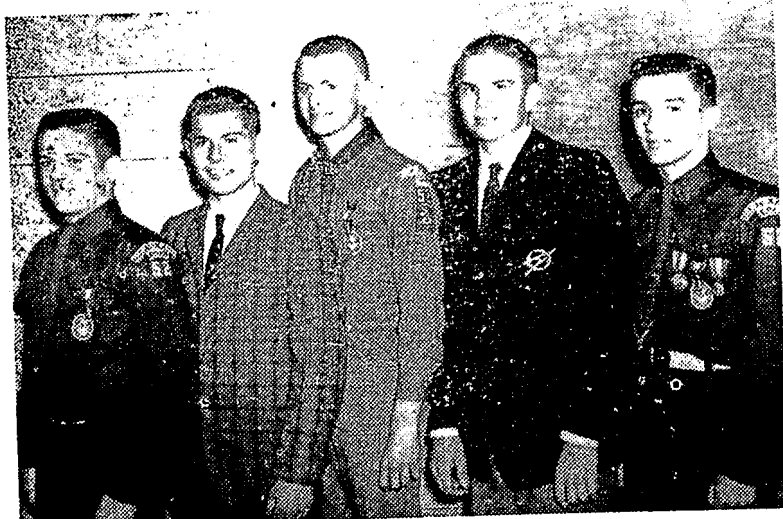
Oakland County's share totaled \$926,130 while Clarkston received \$1,155. Ortonville received \$1,461.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

ture and learning. You sense a job to be done and instinctively do it. You are persistent and efficient too. With these qualities, why don't you pursue some form of higher education?

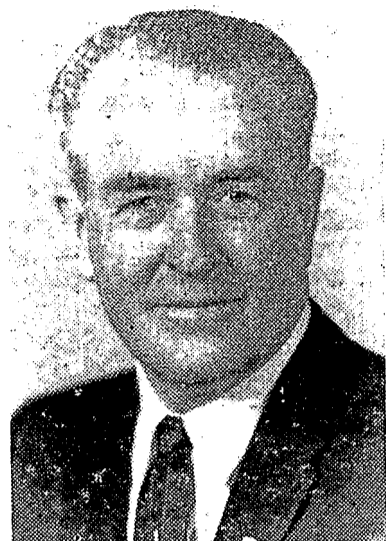
