Youth Protective Service Program

This is the second in a series of articles to be released regarding the Clarkston Area Youth Protective Service Program, which was briefly explained in last week's Clarkston News.

The hope and intention of these summary notices is to inform and bring forth the knowledge and existence of this service program, that it is operating here and now very successfully in our area; 2nd, the people who are responsible and have dedicated themselves to this tremendous task of "properly directing" and assisting our youth wish to generate more enthusiasm and participation from the parents of our youngsters. After all, the duty becomes pleasure when you actually assist the troubled youth of our own community to a happier life.

Our program offers no immediate solution to the problem of delinquency; however, your participation assures our community and our youth that your interest reflects your concern for the youngsters that are neglected, underprivileged, delinquent, as well as innocent.

The Committee which carries out this work within the Clarkston School Area, functions to detect, diagnose and treat situations within this district which might develop into neglect or delinquency. The Committee itself does not investigate or assist in the investigation of referrals to be handled under the Protective Service Program. However, this Committee acts as a resource body to assist the professional caseworker who is assigned by the Juvenile Court, to provide the various needs of youngsters and families, which, if left unmet might quite well necessitate official court action.

The Committee, its members likewise appointed by the Juvenile Court, has a policy which calls for cooperation with all community agencies, groups or individuals in determining the needs of our youth and attempting to fill these needs. For example, the Committee might well review the recreational program for our area; what has been past practice, what are present plans and what can be done to insure future recreational needs. This sort of committee interest could be directed toward any situation other than recreational and all such efforts can lead only to community improvement, and needless to say, a better home and family environment.

The next release will deal further with the local committee work and how you as John Doe citizen can lend your assistance.

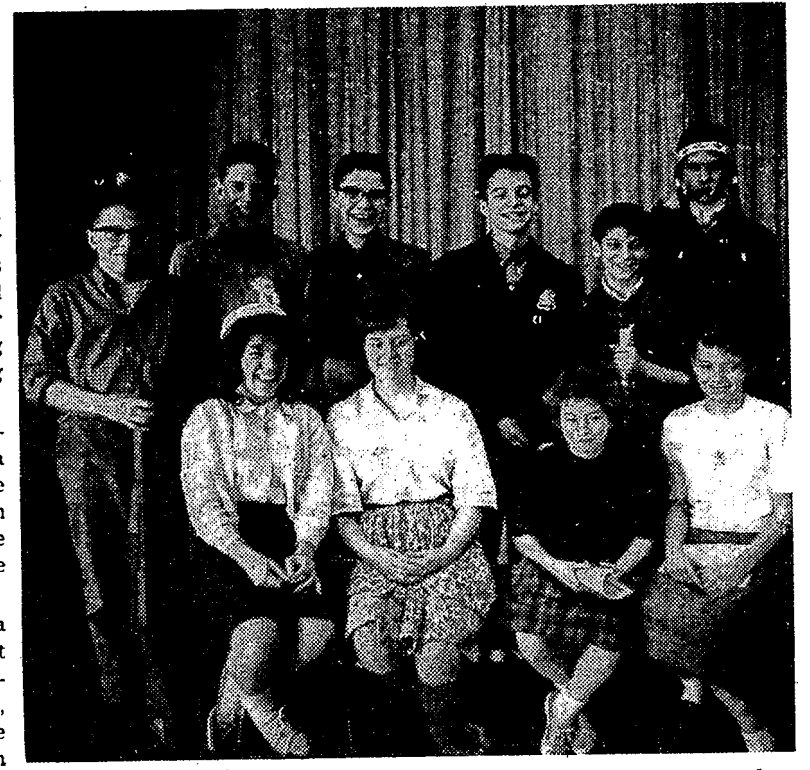
Wednesday night sessions are also being held at the C.A.I. building in Waterford from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. during March and April.

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Why No Light at School Crossing?

What is to be done about children walking to and from school on Waldon Road? Must a child be killed or critically injured before action is taken? The hills on this road as you approach the Clarkston Elementary and Junior High School Buildings add to the already hazardous conditions.

A few months ago a local mother offered to alternate with other mothers in patrolling the Waldon Road crossing between the Junior and Elementary Schools. Not one mother offered to help with this much needed service. In our opinion, a light, which would operate during heavy traffic flow at the schools, is a must. But, until this is done, or like action taken, adult supervision is essential on Waldon Road.

Children are waiting sometimes as long as 10 minutes to cross Waldon between the two school buildings. Safety patrols can not let the children cross as long as there's a car in sight.

In order to help minimize the fantastic amount of traffic flow to and from the Elementary school by parents transporting their children, Ruth Purslow, Elementary Principal, has asked that parents allow children to walk to and from school whenever possible. It has been pointed out that children are crossing mid-block when leaving and

entering the parents' cars, ignoring established crossing points. The children and parent drivers lives are often endangered by the unpredictable parking habits of some parents. Heavy traffic tends to obscure the vision of safety patrol members, thus holding up the long line of children waiting to cross Waldon Road. Often times children become impatient and cross at their own risk. School buses are finding it difficult to get in the driveway to pick up and deliver children.

So It Rains!

Today, walking in the rain with adequate clothing is recognized as a good esthetic experience for children. Parents are urged to allow their children to walk to school and experience the satisfaction of braving the elements. Traffic congestion at school during rainy days creates a much greater hazard for the child and parent than all other conditions affecting them while walking.

If it is necessary for parents to pick up children, possibly a spot other than in front of the school could be arranged between the parent and child.

It is a well known fact that students, especially Junior and Senior High, generally walk on both sides of Waldon Road, refusing to move off the road for oncoming traffic. These certain 'few' sneaker when an on-

coming car must come to a halt to let an oncoming car pass between their 'semi-barricade'. Fortunately only a few students have been observed carrying on such 'shenanigans', but that is all it takes to cause a serious accident.

Do you have an answer? A solution? A comment? If so, please contact the Clarkston News, preferably by letter, to show the proper officials we are interested in, and worried about the problem on Waldon Road.

A Bible lesson on the subject of "Matter" will be read this Sunday.

Among the many Scriptural selections, will be this citation from II Corinthians (5:8): "We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord."

Other passages will bring out the Christian Science teaching that all matter is a "graven image," a temporary, limited, delusive sense of things that must finally give way before the consciousness of ultimate, spiritual reality created by God. Included is this sentence from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy (p. 14): "Become conscious for a single moment that Life and intelligence are purely spiritual,—neither in nor of matter,—and the body will then utter no complaints."
