## Cancer Survey Slated for Clarkston

Mrs. Maynard J. Kizer, Cancer Crusade Chairman for the Clarkston area, is asking for your cooperation when a volunteer rings your door bell seeking information about cancer. This information will prove of great value to the overall program of cancer control.

The Michigan Cancer Foundation is conducting this house-to-house survey during the period of March 24 through April 6th and hopes to accomplish three important things:

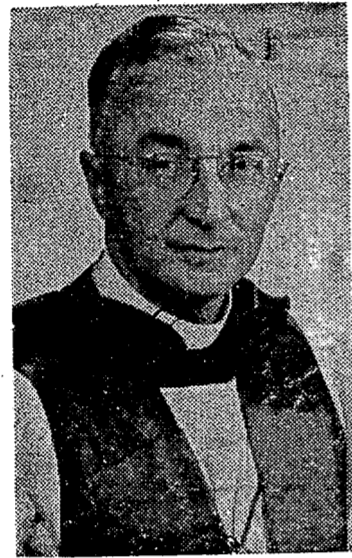
- (1) to determine the current attitude of the public toward cancer,
- (2) to ascertain the extent of personal knowledge of the disease, and
- (3) to evaluate the effectiveness of its cancer control program so that it may be improved where improvement is indicated.

It is in the homes where an individual comes in direct contact with

cancer and where people may best be motivated to observe cancer's warning signals and to protect themselves and their loved ones with regular physical check-ups.

Mrs. Kizer advises that in addition to the survey, life-saving facts about cancer and information regarding the services of the Michigan Cancer Foundation will also be distributed.

Unless continued progress is made in cancer control 260,000 Americans will die this year. In Southeastern Michigan alone, more than 10,000 new cases will be diagnosed before the end of the year. Of this number, more than 1,77 of these persons will die needlessly. They die - not because the cancer itself is incurable but because they are among the unfortunate ones not reached in time with facts that could save their lives.

## Rotary Club Taking Fellowship Applications

Applications for Rotary Foundation Fellowship for one year of study abroad are now being accepted by the local Rotary club, it was announced today by Jesse Berg, club president. Rotary Fellowship awards are for graduate study and include all transportation, education, and living expenses, in addition to a limited allowance for travel within the country of temporary residence.

The awards for which applications are now being accepted are for the 1964-65 academic year. The deadline for applications is April 15. Forms may be obtained at The Clarkston State Bank.

There are two types of Rotary Foundation Fellowships: regular and additional. Regular Rotary Fellowships are available to unmarried men, aged 20 to 28, inclusive, who hold a college degree or will hold one by the time the Fellowship is to begin. They must be able to read, write, and speak the language of the

country in which they will study. The purpose of the Fellowship Program is for the advancement of International understanding.

Additional Rotary Fellowships are available to men and women with a college degree, though this requirement may be waived in certain circumstances. There is no maximum age limit for this type of Rotary Fellowship and the language requirements are less stringent. This grant is awarded for study only in certain countries.

The applicant sponsored by the Rotary Club of Clarkston, Michigan will be considered along with candidates sponsored by other Rotary clubs in this district, which includes 48 clubs. The local Rotary club can sponsor two applicants for a regular Fellowship and two for an additional Fellowship.

Winners of Rotary Foundation Fellowships are regarded as am-

bassadors of good will to the countries in which they study, and through their association with Rotary clubs abroad they increase their opportunities to meet people and become better acquainted with their way of life and their institutions.

Begun in 1947, the Rotary Foundation Fellowship program has awarded more than 1,700 Fellowships to students in 70 countries. Awards average \$2,600 and total grants have been in excess of \$4,500,000.

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:  
With reference to your article in the March 21 Clarkston News, I agree we have a safety problem at the Elementary School.

Perhaps a stop light at Waldon Road is our answer. It would give the children a chance to get across the road safely, and would also slow down the traffic.

However, I think our greatest problem is caused from a lack of cooperation from parents. If, on a very cold or rainy day we feel we must pick up our children, why can't we cooperate a little with the School? We could do any of the following things.

1. Tell our children that we will be parked on a street adjacent to the Junior High School.

2. Pool drivers from a given neighborhood, I know of instances where 5 cars arrive at school in a one-block radius, and 2 cars would be sufficient.

3. Let our children walk whenever possible. Much of the problem of getting across Waldon Road is caused by too many cars coming to pick up children.

4. Take some time at home to show our children the proper way to cross a street. This is our responsibility as parents.

If we will do our part as parents in cooperating with the schools, I'm sure we will have no serious accidents. What is to stop some of our drivers from stopping at the intersection and letting the children cross? Let's be a little bit interested in someone else's child, too.

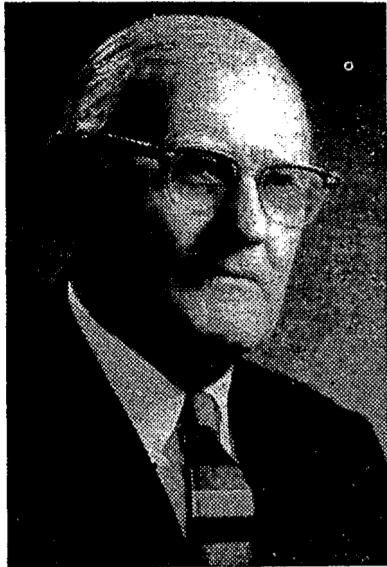

## New Subdivision Planned

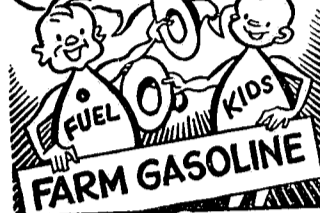
