INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE No. 43

BURNING ORDINANCE

An ordinance to prohibit the starting of fires, to provide for the issuance of permits for the starting of fires and to provide for penalties for the violation thereof.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. VIOLATIONS

To protect persons and property it shall be unlawful, when the ground is not snow covered, to start or have an open fire without first obtaining a permit therefor from the Fire Chief of Independence Township Fire Department or his authorized representative as hereinafter provided except for domestic purposes or to protect persons or property in case of fire.

Section 2. APPLICATION

Any person desirous of obtaining a permit to start a fire shall make application therefor in person to the said Independence Township Fire Department and supply the following information to-wit:

(a) Name, address and age of applicant.

(b) Location of premises where fire is to be started.

(c) Purpose of starting fire.

(d) Time and date for starting fire.

(e) Expected time of duration of fire.

(f) Name of person(s) who will supervise the fire.

(g) Name and address of owner of premises where fire is to be started.

(h) Type of fire prevention equipment available on the premises.

Section 3. PERMIT

After reviewing the application for a permit, the Fire Chief or his authorized representative shall issue a permit to the applicant if he is satisfied that the starting of said property or others and that the owner of the premises where the fire will be started has consented thereon. Permits issued shall be valid only on the date and time specified thereon.

Section 4. SEVERANCE CLAUSE

The sentences, sections, provisions and phrases of this ordinance are declared to be severable and if any such portion is declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such findings shall in no way affect or invalidate the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5.

Any person, firm or corporation, who wilfully, negligently, or carelessly sets a fire which injures or endangers the property of another, may, upon conviction, be assessed a fine of not more than \$100.00 and costs of prosecution or imprisonment for 90 days or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 6.

Any person, firm or corporation, who maliciously sets a fire which endangers human life or destroys the property of another may, upon conviction, be assessed a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor over \$500.00 or imprisonment for a term of not over 10 years or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7.

Any person, firm or corporation, who negligently allows a fire to escape is liable for all expenses incurred by the State of Michigan in the suppression of such fire except for Department of Conservation personnel and equipment.

Burning Ordinance.

Independence Township Ordinance No. 43 adopted on the 26th day of March, 1963 to become effective on the 4th day of May 1963.

1/4 line approximately 1320 feet to the SW corner of 'Clarkston Estates No. 1', thence N'ly and W'ly along the W'ly line of Clarkston Estates No. 1 and Clarkston Estates to the South limit line of the Village of Clarkston, thence South limit line of the Village of Clarkston, thence E'ly along said limits to the N. and S. 1/4 line of Sec. 29, thence S'ly along said line to beginning."

WHEREAS the said municipalities are desirous of agreeing upon the population between the area annexed and the remainder if said township as of September 10, 1962, that being the effective date of said annexation.

WHEREAS the statutes of the State of Michigan (Statutes Annotated 5.1520) provide that the affected municipalities may agree by joint resolution upon the said ratio, in the absence of a federal census and in lieu of taking an official special census, and that such agreed ratio shall thereafter be controlling with respect to the division of future distribution of state sales tax receipts, gasoline and motor vehicle weight tax revenues, intangibles tax revenues, state alcohol

lic liquor tax revenues, or any other state funds, moneys or grants which, by law, are required to be distributed among cities, villages, townships and/or counties of the state.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, jointly, by and between Independence Township and the Village of Clarkston both being Michigan Municipal Corporations, as follows:

1. That as of September 10, 1962, the population in the whole of Independence Township, including the detached area, bore the same ratio to the population within the area annexed, as 1,000 bears to .01294; or in other words, the population within the annexed area was 1.294 per cent of the total population within the whole of said township including the area annexed.

2. That this resolution shall not be binding or effective for any purpose unless and until it is adopted by the governing body of each of said municipalities.

3. That the aforesaid agreed ratio shall be governing only until the next Federal census or official special census is taken.

Motion seconded by Witherup. Roll: Goyette, yea; Beach, yea; Witherup, yea; Terry, yea; Radoye, yea; 5 yeas, 0 nays. Motion carried.

Moved by Radoye that the meeting be adjourned. Motion seconded by Witherup. Motion carried.
