Retired Standard Oil Dealer Dies of Cancer

Residents of Clarkston were saddened by the death of a long time resident of the village. Cancer of the lung took the life of Byron M. Nolan, age 55, of 61 E. Washington Street, early Monday morning, April 22.

Mr. Nolan was hospitalized while vacationing in Florida shortly after retiring as Standard Oil agent in Clarkston. He had been an agent here for 25 years. Mr. Nolan was recently transported by plane to Michigan where he remained a patient at Pontiac General Hospital until his death.

Born to Burt and Lillian Nolan in Toledo, Ohio, June 8, 1907, Byron, 24 years later, married the former

Myrtle Fahrner in Toledo, Ohio on February 17, 1931.

A member of the First Methodist Church of Clarkston, Mr. Nolan was also a member and past president of the Clarkston Rotary Club; Cedar Lodge No. 60 F. & AM; and Elks Lodge No. 810 of Pontiac.

Surviving besides his wife and mother, is a sister, Mrs. Earl Woolf of Terre Haute, Indiana.

A Masonic service was held at the Sharpe-Goyette Funeral Home on Tuesday.

Services were held Thursday, April 25, 11:00 A.M. with The Reverend William J. Richards officiating. Interment was in Forest Hill Cemetery, Ann Arbor.

Guard Against Molestation of Your Children

Because complaints involving the molestation of small children increase in the warm weather months, Sgt. John Amthor, commander of the Pontiac State Police post, is urging parents to warn their youngsters against going anywhere with strangers.

Sergeant Amthor emphasized that this warning should be occasionally repeated to keep children on guard against accepting gifts or other lures from persons they do not know.

He said that State Police last year investigated 571 sex offense complaints, which include child molestation, throughout the state.

While this was 22 fewer than 593 in 1961, Sgt. Amthor stressed that the records again showed that the offenses increased in the warm weather months.

High month last year was July with 68 and then in order, June, 65; Aug. 62; May, 57; October 54, April 52, and September 48, with the remaining five months having 40 or less.

Sgt. Amthor observed that reluctance by parents to report child molestation incidents to the police

for fear of embarrassing publicity is unwarranted. Names of minor children involved and their parents are not used by the press, radio or television except in situations involving abduction or murder.

He added that this reluctance conceals the actual total of molestation cases, tends to thwart preventive action by law enforcement agencies, and may even encourage the offender to strike again.

Sgt. Amthor emphasized that parents should impress their children with the importance of the following cautions:

1. Don't accept any offers of money, candy or other gifts from strangers and don't go for walks or rides with them.
2. Report to your parents, police or teacher any persons acting suspiciously near you or your group.
3. Have playmates or companions with you while outdoors at play, going to or from school and when running errands. Don't play or walk alone in alleys, deserted buildings or isolated areas.
4. Don't loiter in or near public rest rooms because these are danger spots.
5. Don't let anyone persuade you

School Schedules Vision Tests

Clarkston community school children in grades one, three, five and seven will be screened for vision defects commencing April 29 in the Andersonville School.

"These children will be taking a positive step toward guarding the gift of sight," asserts Dr. John D. Monroe, Health Director of the Oakland County Department of Health. "Experts estimate that about 85 per cent of what a child learns depends upon his sense of sight," points out Dr. Monroe, "and every child should be given the best possible chance to learn during his school experiences."

Dr. Monroe also stresses that early detection is very important so that needed eye care can be provided before vision defects seriously hamper personality and educational development.

Approximately 1,500 children are expected to take the vision test. Children who fail the test will be referred to an eye doctor for further examination. Their referrals will be sent directly to parents. No notice will be sent to parents of children who pass the tests.

Usually, about seven to ten per cent of the children in a classroom will fail the vision test. However, not all of these children will have defects requiring treatment or glasses.

This program is jointly sponsored by the Clarkston Community Schools, the Oakland County Medical Society, the Oakland County Department of Health and Michigan Department of Health.

Mrs. Martha Mann and Mrs. Dorothy Tallyday, vision technicians, will do the testing.

According to Mrs. Beckman, Spike wouldn't eat, he just laid on Warner's bad at home.

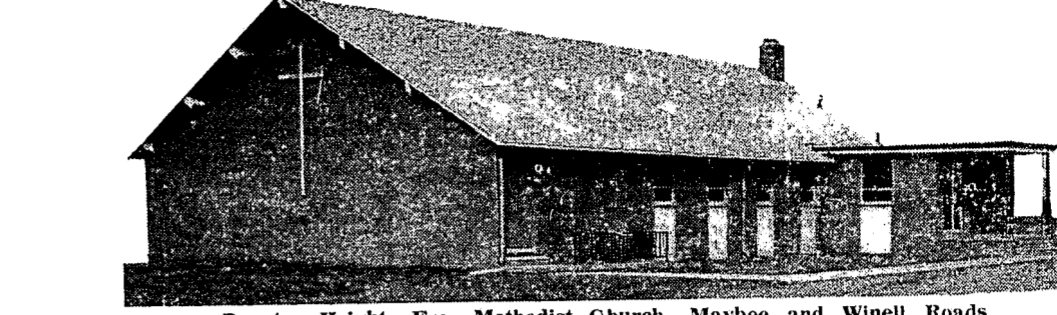

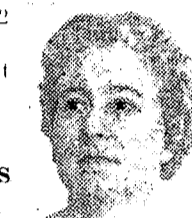
Groveland Recount Ends In Tie Vote

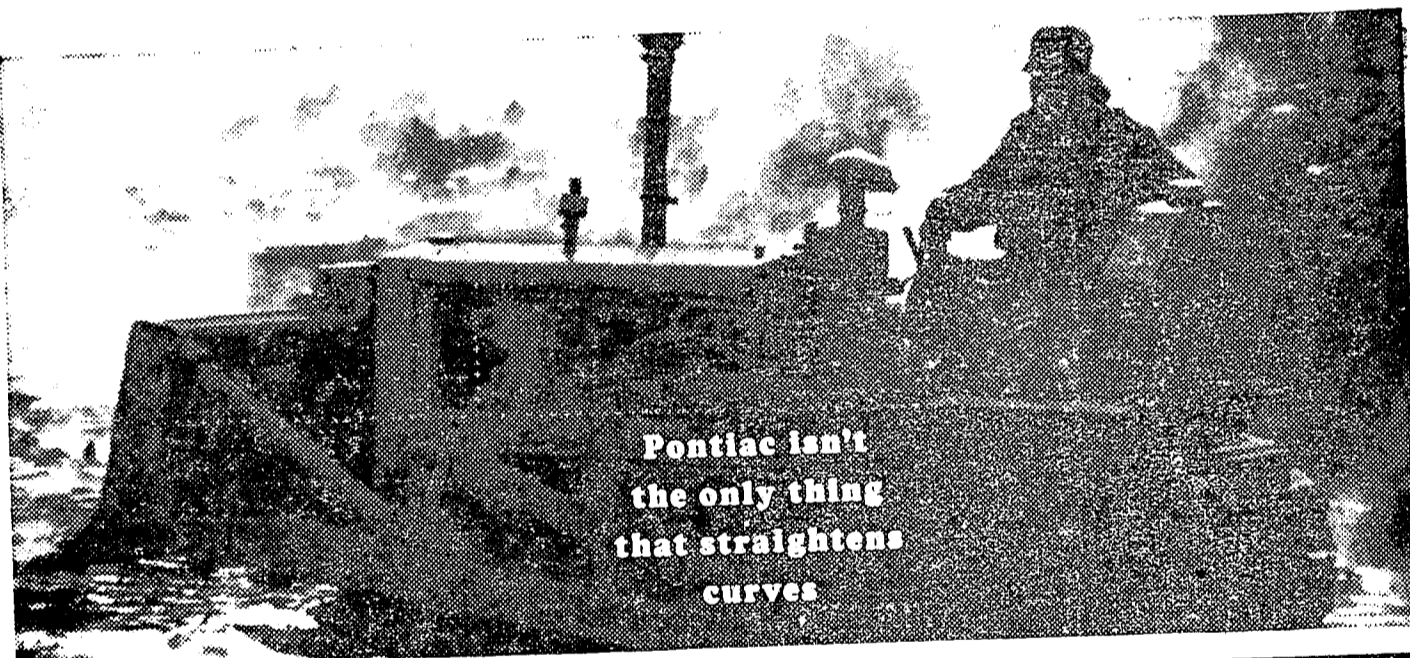

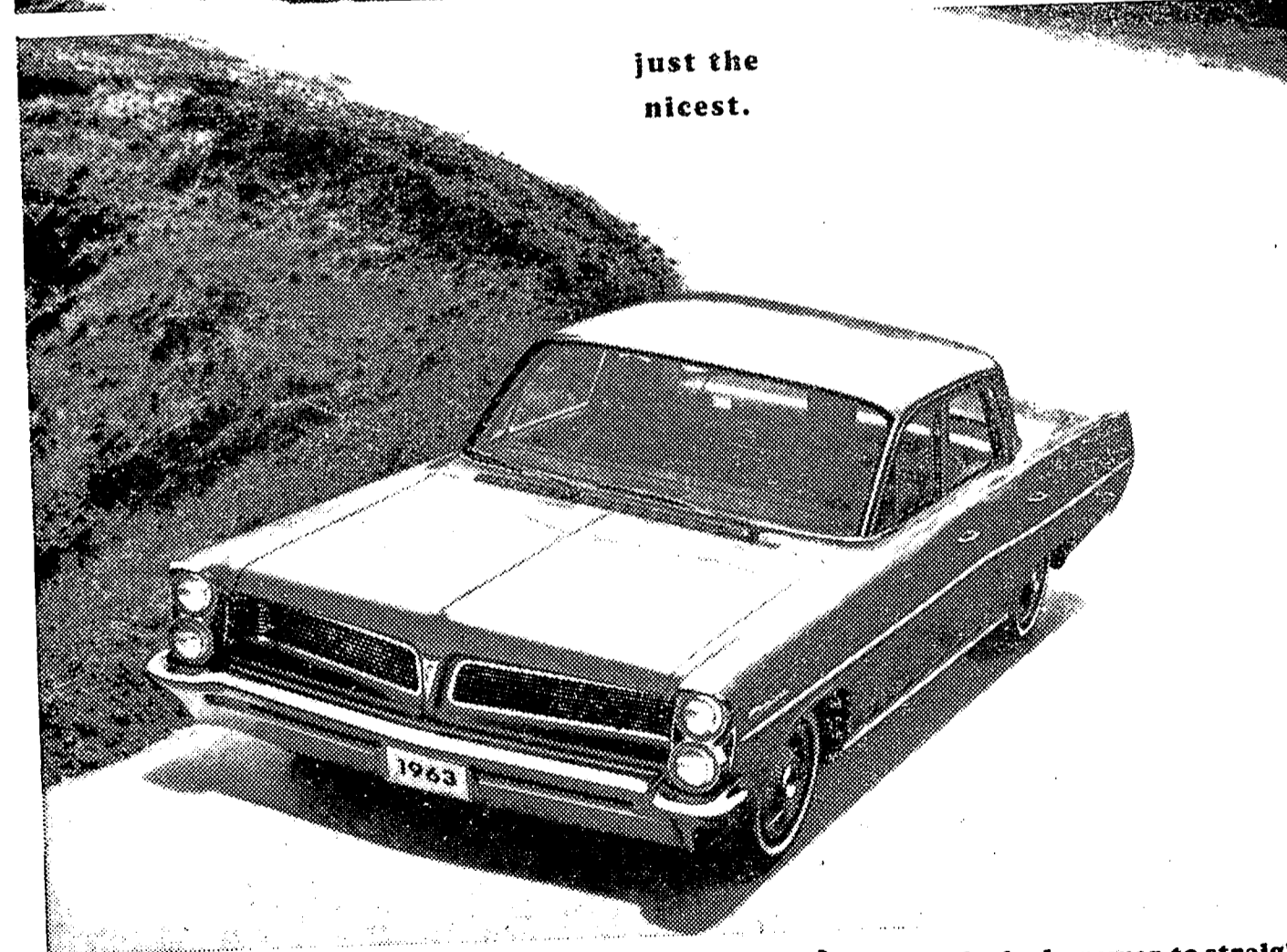

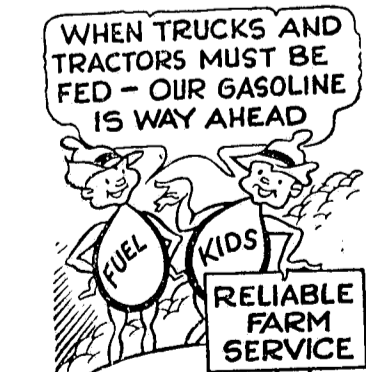
