More than \$2,200,000 will be invested in its Pontiac Division by Consumers Power Company during 1963 on projects to expand and improve the company's natural gas service, Division Manager Charles F. Brown announced.

Major projects listed by Mr. Brown include the installation of close to 70 miles of new gas mains within the division service area, and the addition of some 2,700 new gas customers during the year.

Replacement or refurbishment of some seven miles of older gas systems, affecting 1,000 existing customers, will also be completed before the arrival of cold weather next fall, Mr. Brown added.

Among gas systems improvement projects Mr. Brown listed the construction of a new gas regulator station at Howard and Stockwell streets in Pontiac, increasing the capacity of the gas distribution system in general throughout the neighboring area.

A related gas distribution system addition, also in Pontiac, is the installation of some two miles of new steel main on the new Perimeter road from the Wesson street gas regulator station to Howard and Stockwell. This will provide an entirely new gas feed to the center of Pontiac, replacing older, less-efficient facilities.

In addition to gas department projects, almost a quarter of a million dollars will be invested within the city of Pontiac on electric service expansion, Mr. Brown said. Pontiac is the only city within the immediate area where Consumers provides electric as well as natural gas service.

Electric department projects listed by Mr. Brown involve miscellaneous technical improvements to substations and distribution lines supplying electric power within the city. The Pontiac Division projects are part of Consumers Power Company's general 1963 expansion and improvement program, in which the company is investing more than \$62,000,000.

Consumers serves nearly 1,500,000 electric and natural gas customers in its 64-county service area in Michigan's Lower Peninsula.

Pontiac is division headquarters for the company's services to 43,000 natural gas customers and 14,500 electric customers, Mr. Brown said. The company's Pontiac Division encompasses some 450 square miles and serves the municipalities of Pontiac, Rochester, Clarkston, Wall Lake, Oxford, Orchard Lake, Lake Orion and, in general, the Townships located in north Oakland County.

General headquarters for the company are in Jackson.

## Governor Romney Reports

This is the first time I've been able to sit down and record some of my observations about capitol events for the weekly newspaper readers who comprise such a large segment of Michigan's population.

I intend to make this a weekly habit, and I hope that you will make reading it a weekly habit too. I believe that one of the most important ingredients of good government is effective communication between governmental leaders and the people they serve.

Of course this is a two-way street. The editor has graciously afforded me this opportunity to express my views, and the least I can do is to invite you to express yours.

The Capitol has a pretty big mailbox, but as far as I know it hasn't been filled to capacity yet. If you have opinions which you want to get off your chest, why not sit down and write a letter about them. Send your letters to your own legislator or to Governor Romney, Lansing, Michigan.

Your response will help me keep informed about what you're thinking, and that's one of the most important parts of my job.

You have been hearing a lot lately, I'm sure about the dispute over the Aid to Dependent Children of the Unemployed program which passed the Legislature with bipartisan support only to be delayed by federal officials in Washington and certain state officials.

I feel strongly about this matter and I want to make my views known as well as I can in the limited space available here.

needs of families living on reduced income because their breadwinners were unemployed.

When congress passed the law, it adopted language which made it crystal clear that the states would be able to define who should be covered under the program.

Michigan's program was designed by officials of the State Department of Social Welfare, who over the years have become experts in administering programs of this type. It was also approved by the Regional Office of Health, Education, and Welfare.

The social welfare department devised a program which would accomplish three things:

1. Save taxpayers money by using existing agencies to administer the program.
2. Retain the strength of local welfare departments.
3. Provide special help in managing costs for the needy in unstable and uncertain work areas.

This is the program that the Legislature adopted and which I signed into law. It is not a perfect program, but it is the best one that could reasonably be expected to pass through the Legislature.

I went to Washington in an attempt to discover why federal authorities appeared to believe that our program failed to meet specifications laid down by congress. I came back as mystified by their reasoning as ever.

You may have heard talk lately about my refusal to bow to the dictates of federal authority is depriving needy children from the assistance of this program.

Nothing could be further from the truth. In the first place, no children

Secondly, I have not stood in the way of this program. I have signed the law. The delay has been caused by federal officials attempting to force their will on our state, and by an attorney general in the Michigan who ruled that the bill was unconstitutional.



*Favor your Fabrics*

**Springtime Makes Us Window-Conscious** — From the moment we hear that first robin I think all of us tend to be more aware of our windows and the pretty Spring scenes they can bring into our homes. Statistics show that not only do many women have their curtains and draperies laundered or drycleaned at this time but also that large numbers take this opportunity to buy new curtains.



You may have been noticing the return to the elegant look of ruffled curtains and be considering this style for yourself. How to measure and how to order these curtains is a job that puzzles many. I'd like to share the information which I got on the matter from some of the curtain experts.

**Ordering Ruffled Curtains** — First of all you must measure your window and decide whether you want sill-length curtains, floor-length curtains, or the style that just reaches to the bottom of the lower trim on your window. All lengths are correct and this is a matter to be decided by your own preference and room requirement.

Measure the distance between the rod fixture and the length you want. Then add one inch to allow for the curtain heading above the rod. If you plan to have your curtains meet in the center you will need a minimum of 2 times the width for your fullness. For luxurious fullness you will want at least 3 times the width of the window.

If you are planning to criss-cross the curtains, using double rods, each side must be at least 1½ times the width of the window. For luxurious fullness you will want each side to be at least 2½ times the width of the window.

Sounds complicated? If you take this information step-by-step I think you will find that it leads easily to a standard curtain size.

**Standard Size or Not** — Yes, whether your curtains are ready

made in the usual sizes or specially tailored for an odd size window, your professional laundry can handle them beautifully. Professional curtain stretchers have the flexibility to take any size curtain and the gentle drying air is adapted to all fabrics.

**New For Spring** — Chiffon shorts, flattering chiffon lined with silk is the newest look in shorts. Rough on the pocketbook, (about \$45 a pair) but mighty pretty to wear. . . . New-angle lipstick for a perfect job every time. The angle is 45 degrees and can be achieved with your old lipstick by snipping it with scissors or cutting it with a thin wire. Try it sometime, for a beautiful paint job. . . . Look for children's clothes in dramatic batik prints. Long a favorite for adults, now children's sportswear will be coming in these attractive bright color prints. . . . New for home decorating is black patent leather coverings for chairs, bucket seats. . . . and the old-fashioned clothes press to add a dignified note to period homes.

Other public libraries belonging to the co-operative are the townships of Highland, Holly, Independence, Milford, Oxford, as well as the city library of Pontiac. Member libraries can borrow from the N.O.L.O. collection of over 11,000 books to supplement their local book collections. Each member library shares the cost on a pro-rated basis.

The Michigan State Board for libraries recently notified the Ortonville library that it had met the financial qualifications for a grant from the general library fund. This grant is based on four cents per capita according to the 1960 Federal population census and the payment amounted to \$127.48.

Money received from the General Library Fund is to be used to increase and extend public library service and does not relieve the local community from providing adequate tax support. The Library Board plans to use these funds for the specific purpose of purchasing new books.

An added service is the borrowing of books from the Michigan State Library in Lansing. When material is needed that is not in the local library, a request by mail will get it from the state library in just a few days, free of charge.

## Liver -- How To Cook It

Everybody knows that liver is good for you, but not if you never eat it because you don't like it. Try the cooking tricks if your family objects to the flavor of liver.

1. Serve lamb or veal liver which is milder in flavor than beef or pork liver.

2. Cook liver in bacon drippings and chopped onions to enhance the flavor of liver.

3. Avoid over-cooking liver which makes it tough. Use a low to moderate heat, never a high heat. Be sure to remove all membranes before cooking.

Braising is a good method for cooking liver. To braise liver, dip slices in flour and brown in fat. Season with salt and pepper. Add chopped onion and 1/4 cup water and cover and cook over moderate heat for 20 minutes.

### Liver and Sausage Loaf

- 2 pounds sliced liver
- 2 tablespoons fat
- 1 small onion
- 1/2 cup pork sausage
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup milk
- 1 3/4 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon salt

Cook liver in fat until browned on each side. Grind liver and onion in food chopper. Combine with sausage, eggs, milk, bread crumbs and salt. Place in a greased 9 x 5 inch loaf pan. Bake in a 300 degree oven for 1 hour. 6 to 8 servings.

Did you know that liver is an excellent source of Vitamin C as well as iron. Iron is necessary to prevent anemia, and liver is our highest food source of iron.

## Is Bottle Warming Needed

The time-honored tradition of heating baby's bottle may soon be out of date.

Dr. John P. Gibson of Abilene, Texas first suggested the revolutionary concept of cold-formula feeding. He suggested that mothers warm bottles less and less each feeding time. Soon babies were enjoying them cool or right from the refrigerator.

Studies were also done in Bellevue Hospital in New York City. A New York University pediatrician, Dr. L. E. Holt, Jr., says, "The experiences in this study fail to demonstrate that the traditional procedure of warming the feeding is in any way advantageous to the infant."

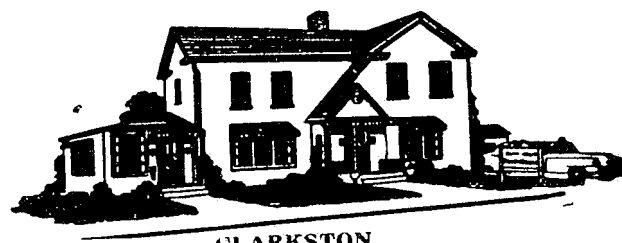

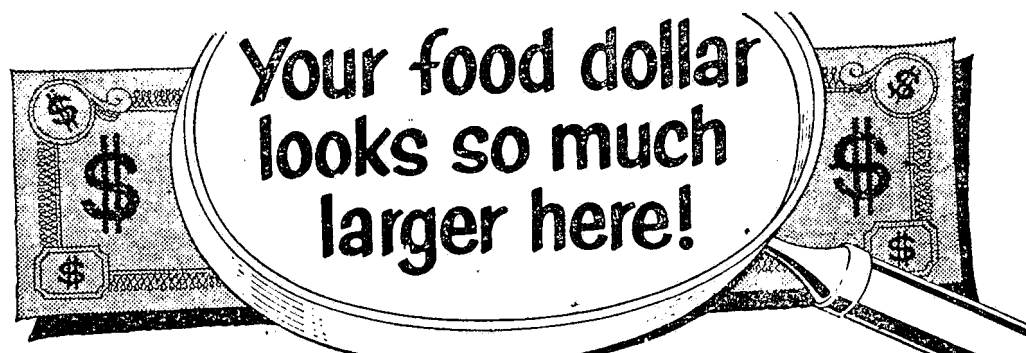

Basic purpose of vocational rehabilitation is to provide every handicapped person of working age with the services and opportunities necessary to achieve, to the fullest extent possible, the satisfaction of becoming a useful and productive member of society.

The effectiveness of a vocational rehabilitation program is dependent upon an organized and coordinated approach involving the state, community, and the federal government, according to the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation of the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. The state contributes funds, personnel, administrative direction, and actual operation of the program; the local community, through its facilities and resources, contributes opportunities for the handicapped to utilize the various rehabilitation services, and the federal government contributes financial support on a matching basis, technical assistance, and personal leadership.
