Sunday, May 19 through Saturday, May 25 Michigan residents of all ages and all walks of life will proudly and merrily take part in the serious and the carnival sides of the tenth anniversary of Michigan Week.

What is Michigan Week? What is its purpose? Three aims for Michigan Week (hereafter referred to as M.W.) set by its sponsors, The Greater Michigan Foundation, are: (1) To give Michigan citizens greater knowledge and appreciation of their state; (2) To expound the state's assets and resources for industry, business, education and recreation, and to afford the nation and the world an inspired view of Michigan's advantages; and (3) To foster a spirit of cooperation among all communities and people to the end that all of Michigan will work together to make the state even more livable and attractive.

Each day of M.W. has special emphasis: Sunday, Spiritual Foundations Day; Monday, Our Government Day; Tuesday, Hospitality Day; Wednesday, Our Livelihood Day; Thursday, Education Day; Friday, Heritage Day, and Saturday, Our Youth Day.

Our concern lies with Monday, Government Day. While an estimated 328 communities are expected to highlight observance of this day by participating in the annual exchange of mayors and village residents, Clarkston sits back quietly and watches. What would we do with him all day?"

Q: "Why do I get spots on my forehead when the rest of my face is alright?"

**INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE No. 38A  
ITINERANT MERCHANTS ORDINANCE**

An ordinance of Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan, for the Control of Itinerant Merchants and to Provide Penalties for any Violation Thereof. The Township Board of Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan Ordains as Follows:

**Section 1. Definition**

Itinerant Merchants are defined to be any person, firm, organization or corporation who sell, offer for sale, peddle, hawk, display, canvass or solicit at or adjacent to the premises of others without the previous consent of the occupant. said premises any orders or sales for goods, publications, books, wares, merchandise, subscriptions, service or business of any kind.

**Section 2. License Required.**

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to engage in activities as an Itinerant Merchant without first having obtained a license as hereinafter required.

**Section 3. Application For License.**

Itinerant Merchants desiring to be licensed hereunder shall apply for such license in writing to the Township Clerk and provide the following information, to-wit:

- (a) Complete name, address and description.
- (b) State whether employer, employee or self-employed.
- (c) Nature of the products and or service in which he does business.
- (d) The proposed method of his operation in the Township.
- (e) Names and addresses of all manufacturers and suppliers of products and/or services with which he does business.
- (f) Evidence of good character.

**Section 4. Issuance of License.**

Any Itinerant Merchant who

has properly submitted an application for a license to the Clerk, as provided herein, who has a good character reputation and no previous convictions for crimes of fraud or moral turpitude and pays the fees provided for herein shall be issued an Itinerant Merchants license. In the event the Clerk refuses to issue a license hereunder, any Itinerant Merchant feeling himself aggrieved by such refusal may demand a public hearing before The Township Board by sending a written request to the Township Supervisor within 5 days of notification of the refusal to issue a license by the Clerk. The Township Board hereby reserves the right to reverse the decision of the Clerk as to the nonissuance of any license hereunder.

**Section 5. Fraud**

Any Itinerant Merchant who shall be guilty of any fraud, cheating or misrepresentation; whether through the licensee or through an agent, servant, or employee, while acting as an Itinerant Merchant within the said Township of Independence, or who shall barter, sell, offer to sell, solicit sales for any goods, wares, books, publications, merchandise, subscriptions, services or business other than those specified in his License shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

**Section 6. Possession of License.**

Each Licensee shall carry his Itinerant Merchant license on him at all times while acting as an Itinerant Merchant within said Township of Independence and shall exhibit same whenever requested to do so by any prospective customer or peace officer.

**Section 7. Exemptions.**

(a) This Ordinance shall not be deemed to affect or in any way restrict or prohibit any resident(s) of said Township of Independence from displaying, selling or offering for sale from his own premises any dairy, agricultural or other produce produced or raised upon any property owned, leased, rented or controlled by him or them.

(b) All Churches, Public and Non-secular Schools and religious organizations located within said Township of Independence and all recognized charities are hereby declared exempt from the provisions of this Ordinance.

**Section 8. Fees.**

Each Itinerant Merchant shall pay the sum of \$5.00 per day or \$50.00 per year for his License, at the discretion of the applicant.

Each Licensed Itinerant Merchant may license his agent, servant or employee by paying the additional sum of \$1.00 per licensed agent, servant or employee. All licenses issued to an agent servant or employee shall expire on the same day as the Itinerant Merchant's employer's license expires. No agent, servant or employee shall be issued such a license hereunder until after he has fully complied with the provisions of Sections 3 and 4, supra.

Annual Itinerant Merchant Licenses shall automatically expire on December 31st next following date of issuance.

**Section 9. Penalty.**

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by fine not exceeding the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

**Section 10. Severance Clause.**

The sentences, sections, provisions and phrases of this Ordinance are declared to be severable and if any such portion is declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such finding shall in no way affect or invalidate the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

**Section 11. Hours.**

Itinerant Merchants licensed hereunder shall engage in the activities for which he is licensed only between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. or sunset, whichever occurs last.

**Section 12.**

Ordinance No. 38 of Independence Township is rescinded upon the effective date of this Ordinance.

**Section 13.**

This Ordinance, Hereafter to be known as Independence Township Ordinance No. 38A, Having been adopted on this 7th day of May 1963, shall take effect 30 days from date of publication.

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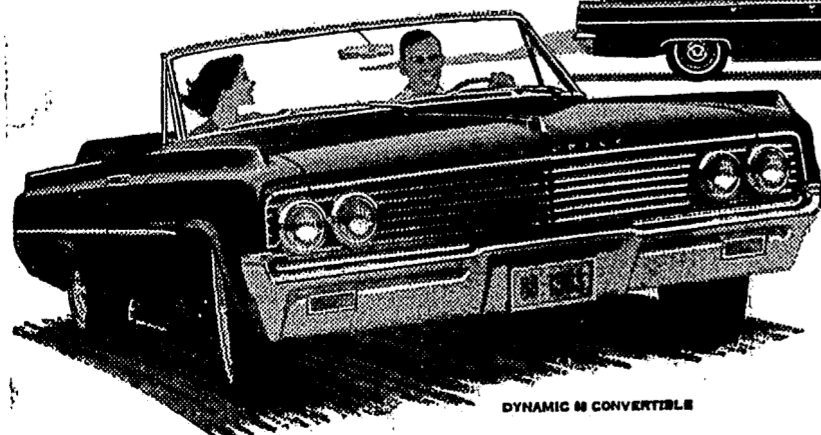

founded upon reason, well-supported by fact, and aimed directly at the issues of greatest public concern.

But there is another brand of criticism, a species which Michigan residents have become all too familiar with.

This is the kind of criticism that with in the recent history of their consists of personal slander. It is fashioned from the raw materials of emotion, upon jealousy between economic classes, upon the unfair analogy and the crass generalization.

This kind of criticism is often easily recognized because it is built upon phrases that are relics of the past — "big business," "moneeyed interest," "union goon," etc.

These were some of the phrases that were thrown back and forth by the labor and business protagonists who kept Michigan's state government in turmoil for more than a decade.

The broadsides which both sides exchanged during this long political battle had one thing in common they dealt importantly with personalities and economic groups instead of the issues.

During my first few months in office, I detected a new spirit in the Lansing air—a spirit of cooperation in which spokesmen for both parties appeared willing to limit the debate to facts and issues and forego personal attacks.

Some of the language used recently by my critics—language that is intemperate, personal, and in bad taste—makes me wonder whether some are capable of that spirit. I believe most are. I believe the people of Michigan are fed up with criticism for the pure sake of criticism, with false accusation that damage the state and everyone in it.

Let me emphasize that I am not personally concerned about this language; I learned a long time ago that it is senseless to take it seriously.

What I am concerned about is that these immoderate attacks could revive the bitter feuding that kept our state government in a state of stagnation for years—feuding that ended in deadlock and financial chaos.

Michigan citizens need desperately to preserve and increase their historically-proven capacity to subdue their separate interest to the common interests of their state.

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

Mr. Scramlin was sworn to office immediately after the election and will continue to serve until the question is resolved.

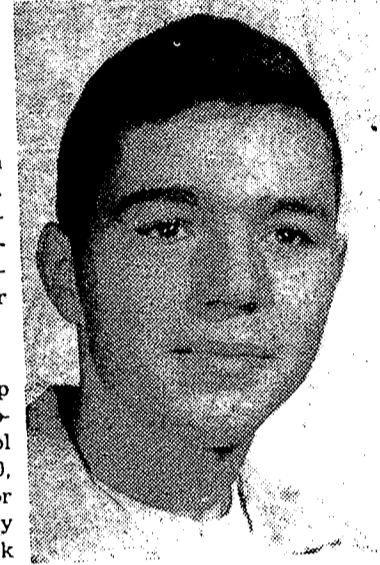
## Two Awarded Music Scholarships

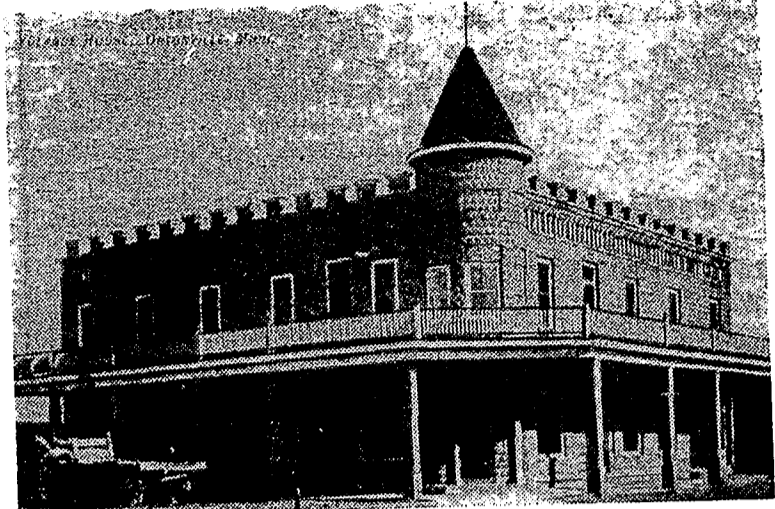


Lloyd O. Davis

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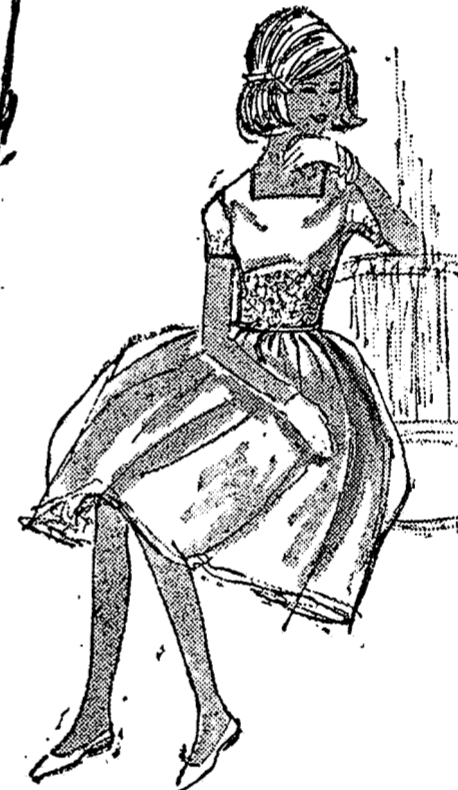

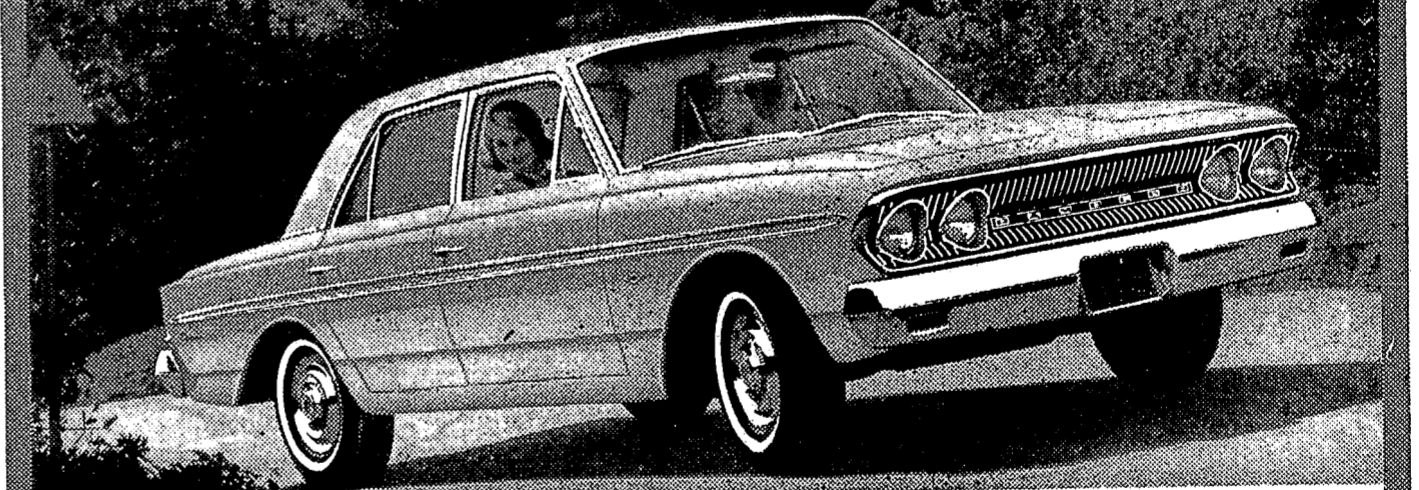

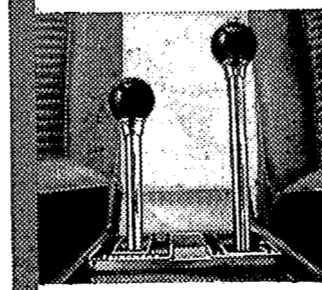
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
