He is a healthy boy who likes to play on the slide, is quiet, kind and friendly.

The parents have sought help toward their children's schooling and little Chan has been assigned to the Seymour Lake MYF group who will send \$10 per month towards his support.

## Kindergarten Registration

The Clarkston Community School District will register kindergarten children for the 1963-64 school term on Monday, June 3, 9:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Registration will be conducted in each Elementary School. Parents are requested to bring the child's birth certificate or other proof of age at time of registration. Kindergarten children must be five years of age on or before December 1, 1963 to be eligible for enrollment in the fall of 1963. The state law also requires kindergarten children to have the

## Increase In Operating Millage?

At the Annual Clarkston School Election in June, the question before the voters will be to increase the operation millage \$5.00 a thousand on state equalized value. Clarkston Community School District is the one District in Oakland County that

has not sought an increase in tax revenue for operation purpose since 1954. And its current operation tax levy is the lowest rate in the county.

According to Superintendent L. F. Greene, the increase in tax revenue is necessary to enable the school to satisfactorily compete with other schools in the Metropolitan Area for the limited number of qualified available teachers. With the existing shortage of teachers today you either compete salary wise or you do not hire staff. The backbone of any good education program is the teaching staff. Regardless of all other factors involved, if a school system does not continue to employ and retain a competent teaching staff, its instructional program will wither on the vine.

The 3 mill voted operation levy that was approved by the voters in 1954 is just not ample to cover today's higher cost of education. Although we enjoy the lowest per capita cost for education in the area, we still do not have sufficient funds to do the job assigned to us.

With approval of the 5 mill tax increase the total voted extra millage for operation purposes will be \$8.00 a thousand.

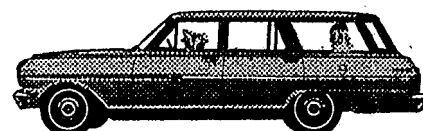
