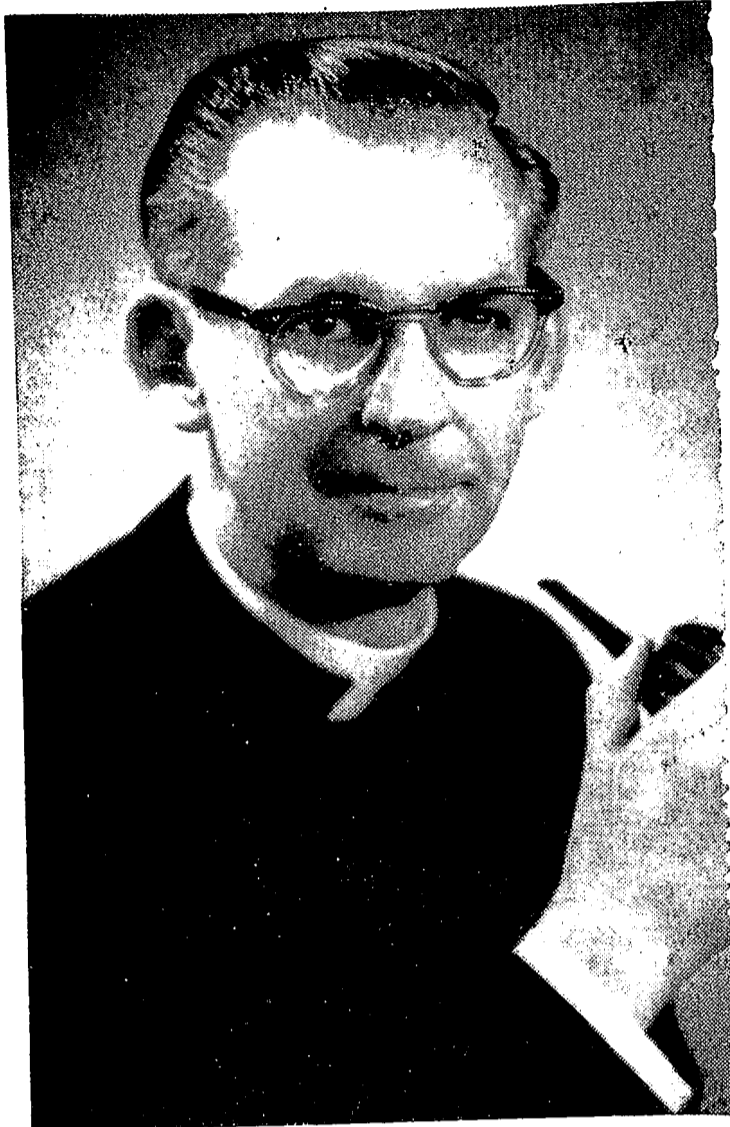

## Guest Editorial . . .

To some, a position of civic responsibility means a way of advancing ones personal and social status.

To some, it means another obligation to detract from their personal time.

To others, it presents a challenge . . . an opportunity to exercise their civil and God given rights . . . to represent a cause, not a case . . . to act on the strength of conviction, not of guilt.

I stand with those in the third case; but, this is not the purpose of this writing

We as citizens of America have many rights and privileges. Among these is the privilege of education to all. But, we take the support of such a system for granted.

Several methods of finance or education are:

1. Federal aide,
2. State aide, and
3. Local taxation in business and personal property.

We of Independence Township are unfortunate in that the percentage of business establishments to residences is small.

This does not, however, qualify us for additional State and Federal aide.

We, the taxpayer, the home owner, must bear a larger portion of the educational load than other communities who have a heavy industrial penetration.

Is this wrong? Is it a privilege to live in a highly residential community, or is it a penalty? Is your children's education and mental growth worth an additional \$5.00 per \$1,000.00 per year.

Between now and Monday, June 10, 1963 let's take time to weigh this matter. Consider it seriously, and evaluate the repercussions of non-support.

The School Board, P-TA organizations, Teachers organization can recommend, discuss, evaluate, study, consider and hope, but only you and I, the voter can make a decision.

Vote as you choose on June 10, but let your voice speak the convictions of your heart and decide for the future of Clarkston and its children.

## GOVERNOR ROMNEY REPORTS



Three Michigan businessmen have just returned from a three-week trip to Europe which produced evidence that Michigan's economic future could well have a foreign - tinted silver lining.

L. William Seidman, Richard M. Gillett and Herbert G. Davenport all from Grand Rapids conducted a whirlwind reconnaissance of the European Economic Community that took them to Switzerland, Belgium, the Netherlands, West Germany, France, England and Portugal.

With the built-in advantage of a small group, they cut through red tape to squeeze more than 50 frank and informal discussions into their packed itinerary.

They talked to mayors, economic ministers, financiers, importers, exporters, foreign service offices, manufacturers, brokers and professional men.

In their report to me, these forward-looking businessmen outlined the history of the Common Market and the steps Michigan should be taking to capitalize upon the enormous trade potential which it affords.

Created in 1957 by the Treaty of Rome, the European Economic Community (more often called the Common Market) includes West Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

It is a loosely-knit union which resembles in some respects the original American colonies. Although its base is an economic one, it has developed a political and social superstructure.

The underlying theory of the common market embodies a philosophy to which I have long adhered: That individuals, groups and nations can achieve the greatest progress by subordinating their separate interests to the purposes they hold in common.

The expression of this ideal in the reality of the Common Market has worked well - so well, in fact, that within the market's boundaries there is little unemployment, the

market has a greater annual growth rate than the United States, and the 170 million people who comprise it are tasting prosperity for the first time in generations.

Although the Common Market has had its difficulties, there seems to be little doubt in the minds of Michigan's economic scouts that its future is bright.

What can Michigan do to extract full advantage from the opportunities of the Common Market? Here are their suggestions:

1. Michigan businessmen must recognize the European market as part of their sales territory. But to succeed, they must bring something special to the market.
2. Michigan communities might explore the possibility of attracting capital investment by Common Market industrialists, emphasizing the advantage of low interest costs on loans for industrial expansion.
3. Encourage investment by Michigan industrialists abroad. This need not necessarily deprive Michigan citizens of jobs, since foreign-based Michigan firms often import parts made in Michigan for assembly overseas.
4. Michigan can and should apply more thought and energy to attracting European tourists, capitalizing on the increasing pressures which Europe's population is exerting on its limited recreational space.

Seidman, Gillett and Davenport outlined ways in which the state could assist businessmen in capitalizing on the Common Market and I am giving these recommendations careful study.

Some of the possibilities they suggested were formation of a small but enthusiastic corps of Michigan foreign trade ambassadors, the improvement of Michigan's seaway ports, the investment of state money to attract European tourists, making the soon-to-be revamped Economic Development Department especially responsive to the needs and inquiries of European businessmen.

### DAVID SKILLMAN

Mr. David Skillman, Clarkston High School Mathematics Teacher, has been selected as one of fifty teachers throughout the United States to attend the National Science Foundation Summer Institute at Lafayette College in Easton, Pennsylvania.

He will be taking six hours of graduate credit in mathematics. The classes are Fundamental Concepts of Modern Mathematics and Introduction to Analysis.

### JANET GABIER

Miss Janet Gabier, Clarkston High School English Teacher, has been chosen as one of twenty-five selected high school teachers of English, History, and Social Studies to attend the Institute of American Studies. The Institute will be held on the campus of Ohio Northern University under the joint sponsorship of the Coe Foundation of New York and Ohio Northern University. The duration of the Institute is five weeks, June 10 to July 12, 1963.

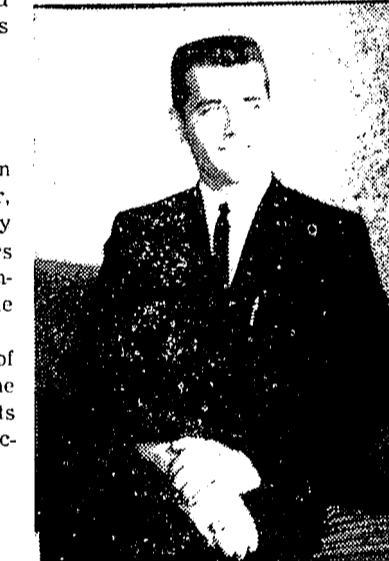
The program has been arranged specifically for the 25 Fellows of the Institute of American Studies. The emphasis will be on lectures, discussion, wide reading in the university library, and intellectual stimulation to be derived from association with fellow teachers and the professors who conduct the Institute and the courses.

All the teachers will take advanced college courses conducted so as to stimulate in them as teachers greater appreciation and understanding of the American Heritage, insights into new interpretations, and provide essential bibliography.

The courses will be integrated around common topics and seminar sessions will facilitate coordination of the general weekly theme of the courses. Regular daily class sessions will be scheduled for morning hours Monday through Friday with afternoons free for reading, study, discussion and recreation.

Mr. Ralph Kenyon, Clarkston High School Biology Teacher, has been selected as one of sixty teachers throughout The United States to attend the National Science Foundation Summer Institute at Eastern Michigan University.

Text of the propositions follows:

### ROAD EASEMENT PROPOSITION

"Shall the Board of Education of Brandon School District, Oakland and Lapeer Counties, Michigan, be authorized to grant to the Village of Ortonville as easement or road right of way, or to deed the same for a public street across the school district high school site, running generally from the present north end of Edward street northward across the East side of the high school site, and northward across the Northeast corner of the former Mill Pond site to connect with and in the Community College District

of Parts of the Counties of Oakland, Washtenaw, Livingston and Lapeer, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased as provided by Section 21, Article X of the State Constitution of Michigan by one-tenth of one percent (\$1.00 per \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, for a period of twenty (20) years from 1963 to 1982, both inclusive.

### COMMUNITY COLLEGE QUESTION

The purposes of the Community College Proposition and the Tax Rate Limitation Increase Proposition and operation of a Community College to provide instruction in collegiate and non-collegiate courses of study embracing not more than two years of collegiate work, and the acquisition, construction, ownership development and maintenance of facilities of the Community College and to provide funds therefor, and to elect a first Board of Trustees of the Community College District, all as provided by Act No. 188 of Public Acts of 1955, as amended.

Shall Act No. 188 of the Public Acts of 1955, as amended, being sections 390.871 to 390.882 of the Compiled Laws of 1918, be adopted and effective in a Community College District of Parts of the Counties of Oakland, Washtenaw, Livingston and Lapeer.

Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the Community College District

be attached to the present south end of Church street in said village?"

And to vote for the Six (6) members of the first Board of Trustees of the Community College District of Parts of the Counties of Oakland, Washtenaw, Livingston and Lapeer, to be elected at large from the territory of the proposed Community College District as designated by the Board of Education of the Intermediate School District of the County of Oakland in the Community College Resolution, on a non-partisan basis.

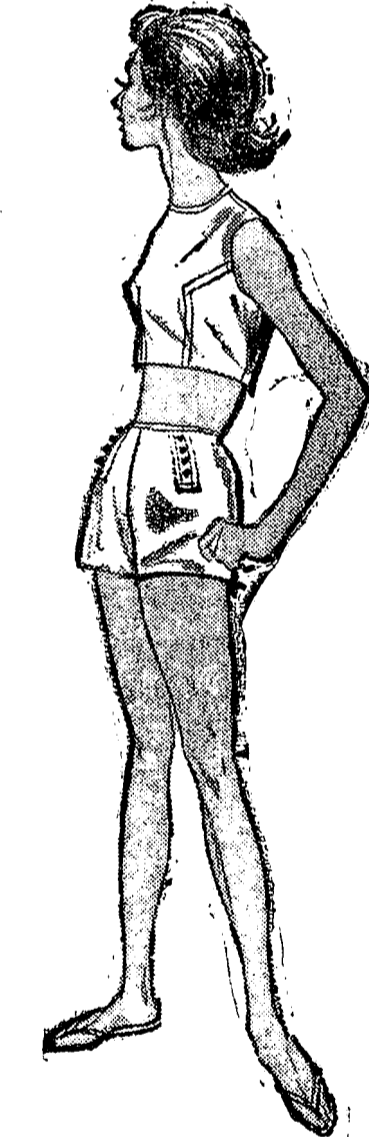
