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IMPORTANT ISSUES ON MONDAY'S BALLOT

Community College; Yes? No? Why?

Mr. Keith L. Leak, president of the Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education, has announced his candidacy for trustee on the Oakland County Community College District.

Being Superintendent in the Pressed Metal Plant, Pontiac Motors Division, claims only a portion of Mr. Leak's time. He has been active on various boards of the First Methodist Church in Clarkston; is an honorary member of the Clarkston Rotary Club; served as treasurer of the Clarkston Board of Education for four years and president for ten years; and is a member of the Oakland County School Board Association.

A resident of Oakland County for the past 32 years, Mr. Leak is married and has three children. He and his family have lived in Clarkston for 22 years.

WHAT IS COMMUNITY COLLEGE?

The Community College issue which shall be decided June 20, 1963, at the same time and in conjunction with the annual school election, contains two items: 2—To establish a college district and sup-

port it with a one mill tax; and 2—To elect six-member Board of Trustees.

A community college provides two years of liberal arts education near the students home usually at lower costs than required in other institutions. It emphasizes vocational and technical training geared to local employment needs. Courses are designed to develop special skills to prepare students to earn a better living.

Four year colleges are overcrowded. They tend to limit admissions to students with strong academic records. For more than half of our high school graduates there is no post high school education available.

Experience in other Michigan Community Colleges shows that between a third and half of the students not now seeking further education will enroll in a community college.

Your Schools Need Your Support

The voters of the Clarkston Community School District in the past have always supported any increase in the tax rate for the purpose of building buildings and operating the school program.

The Board of Education and the administration have diligently made every effort to operate the schools as efficiently and as economically as possible.

It has been the policy of the Board of Education over the years to not ask for any increase in school revenue until it was absolutely necessary and until there was no other means available for financing school operation.

The schools are now faced with this situation and they need the support of every tax payer if they are to continue to offer the quality of program that the people in this district want and erect for their children.

Children are a civilization's most important product and children require the service of competent instructors during the process of maturation.

74.8% of all the money expended for the operation of our schools goes for the purpose of paying teachers' salaries but it still does not provide enough revenue to pay teachers salaries that are competitive with the surrounding area.

It is our hope that you will cast your vote Monday, June 10, in favor of the increase in operation millage so that sufficient funds will be available to employ and retain a large enough staff to adequately handle the teaching load and a staff that is suitably trained and qualified to provide a sound instructional program for the youth of our area.

Melissa Ann Ferkowicz of Dearborn was flower girl and her brother Mark Ferkowicz acted as ring bearer.

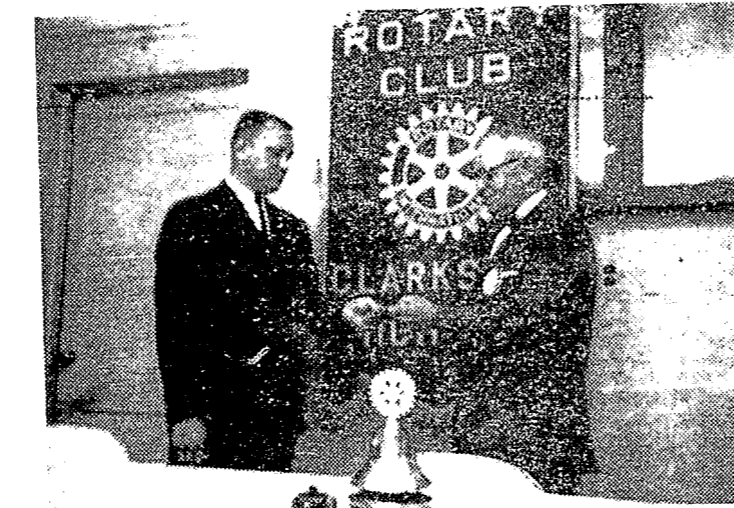

Monday, June 10th the voters of the Brandon School District will have the opportunity to decide three important issues.

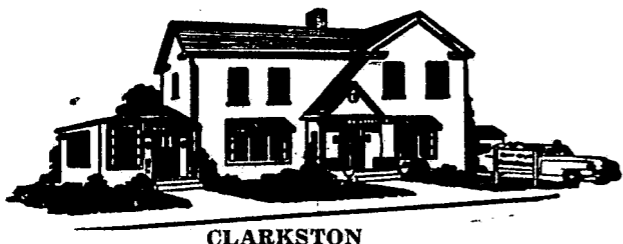
