

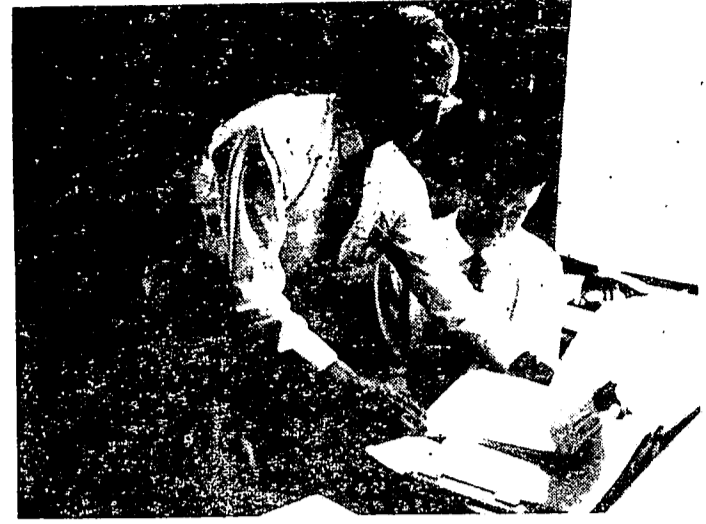

### To Attend Boys' State

Boys' State Chairman John M. Adams, 65 North Holcomb Street, Clarkston Campbell Richmond Post Number 63, announces that an outstanding Clarkston high school junior has been selected to attend The American Legion-sponsored 25th Annual Wolverine Boys' State.

The school is held annually in mid-June (June 13-20) on the Michigan State University campus at East Lansing. Enrollment this year is limited to 1141 outstanding youngsters in the state of Michigan.

### Millage Approved by Voters

A five mill operating levy was approved by the voters in the Clarkston Community School District. There were 504 yes to 240 no's.

As 15 per cent of the voters came to the polls they elected two new school board members.

Named were incumbent R. A. Weber and Melvin C. Polikotte who polled 551 and 496 respectively.

The five mills which will be about \$120,000 in local tax revenue, will

This is necessary to bring the salaries to a competitive level with other school districts.

a large berry with full red color. Robinson berries are often deeply grooved with a pale, sometimes hollow center. Its best use is for fresh eating.

Premier berries make up about 20 percent of the acreage. It is preferred by processors for it holds its shape in jam and for freezing. It is smaller than the Robinson has superior flavor, and is red throughout.

Earldawn berries total about 10 percent of the strawberry acreage. It is the first to ripen. It is bigger than the Premier and is a better shipper. Lucky the shopper who finds this berry for fresh eating or processing.

Smart shoppers know that large size strawberries are not necessarily better than medium or small size

berries. Eating quality is best during the peak harvest season. The three best things to do with fresh strawberries are strawberry shortcake, strawberry shortcake, and more strawberry shortcake. Try them with thick homemade buttered biscuits today. The season is short.

And if you are buying berries for freezing, count on about 22 pounds from a standard 16-quart crate.

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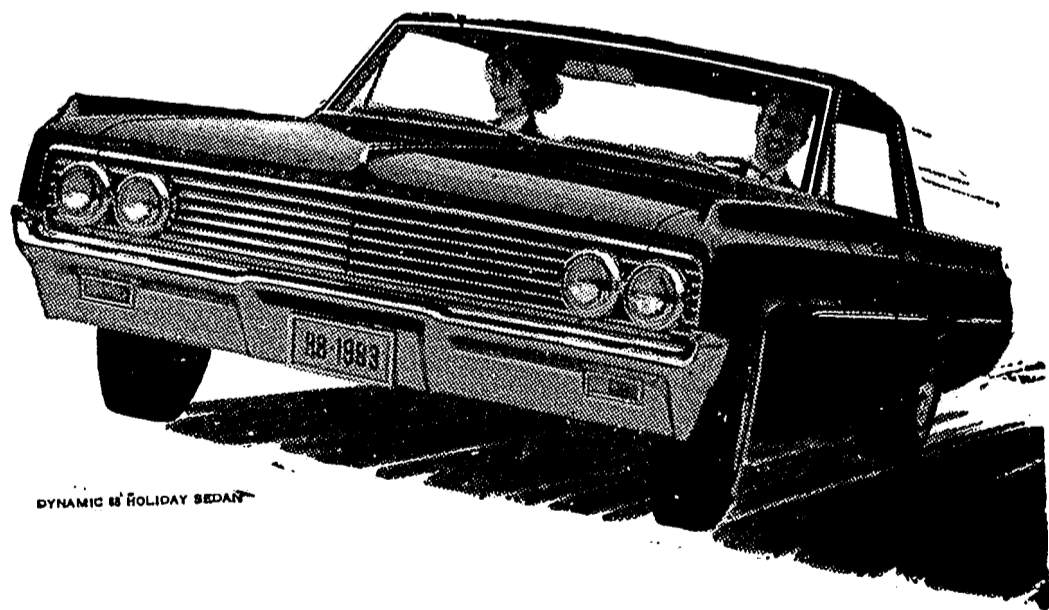

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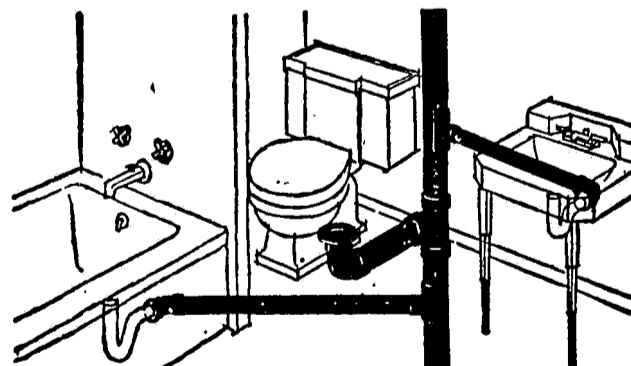
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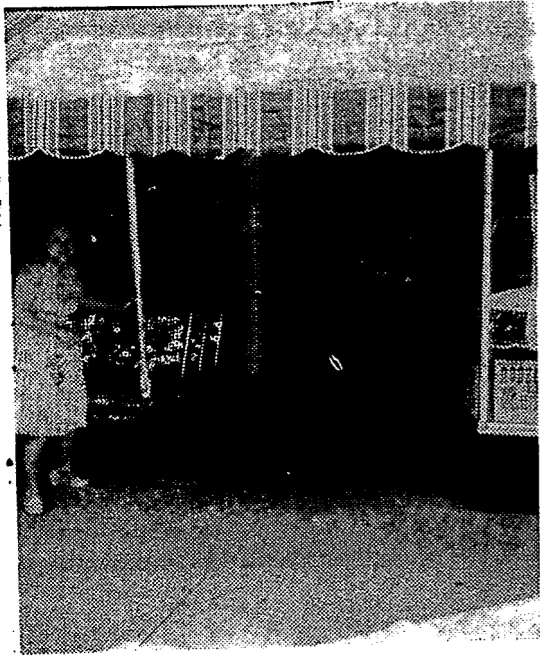

Mr. and Mrs. William Harrison have returned from Wheeling, West Virginia where they visited his mother.

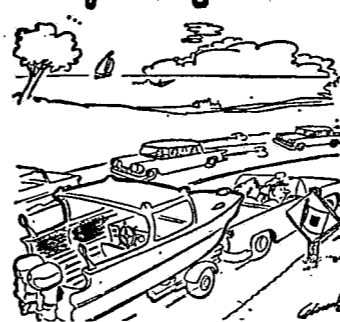
