**Drying Flowers For Winter Bouquets**

Colorful flower arrangements can be made of dried materials. The original form and beauty of many flowering and foliage plants can be retained indefinitely by using drying techniques. When you plan your garden this year, include arrangements that can be dried for winter arrangements. Remember the wild-flowers and grasses of field and wayside; their buds, leaves, and seed pods provide a wealth of excellent material for drying. In making your first attempt, try the single or semi-double types of flowers.

**By pressing:** flat material can be dried between heavy magazine pages or between heavy blotting paper. Allow to remain between magazine pages until thoroughly dry.

**Hanging Method:** Plants such as goldenrod, bittersweet, celosia, yarrow, strawflower, grasses, seed pods and chinese lanterns, tie in small bunches in a way so the heads do not touch each other. Hang upside down in a dry, dark, airy place until dry.

**Borax, sand, or cornmeal method:** Zinnias, roses, daffodils, pansies, coral bells, cosmos, small marigolds, Queen Anne's Lace, dogwood, delphinium, columbine may be dried by this method. Pour borax, sand or cornmeal into box 2" to 3" deep. Whenever possible, remove stems from flower head and replace with wire, thin wire for delicate flowers and heavy wire for larger flowers. The wire can be bent and wrapped with green or brown floral

Put 1/2 glycerine and 2/3 water in days to 2 weeks. wide mouth jar, stir. Wash material. In drying and preserving leaves and flowers allow more flowers etc. material upright in solution. If you have loose leaves you may emerge flowers do not always dry they may be stored in large suit boxes in a until the solution has thoroughly dry place until ready for winter saturated the leaves, takes from 4 arrangements.


