





New Fashioned Old Fashioned Cooking



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Put your toys away

"Our house is always cluttered," says a young Detroit mother of a two year old girl. "Her playroom is wherever I am, and she scatters her toys all over."


It's quite normal for a little child to want to be where other people are, and it is not normal for her to automatically pick up her toys after she's finished with them. Not that she delights in making extra work, she simply has no concern for the appearance of the house.

Start early to teach the child the habit of putting things away. It''s more fun to do things together than to do them alone, so make a game of helping her put her toys away and she'll gradually learn.

You can make it easier for a child to put things away if you have a special place top ut them. Low open shelves are better than drawers or boxes, because she can cee at a glance what she wants, and she can get it without dumping a whole

Having too many toys makes housekeeping more difficult. Leave only a few favorite toys out and store the others. The toys you put away will be doubly wercomed when you bring them out again.
