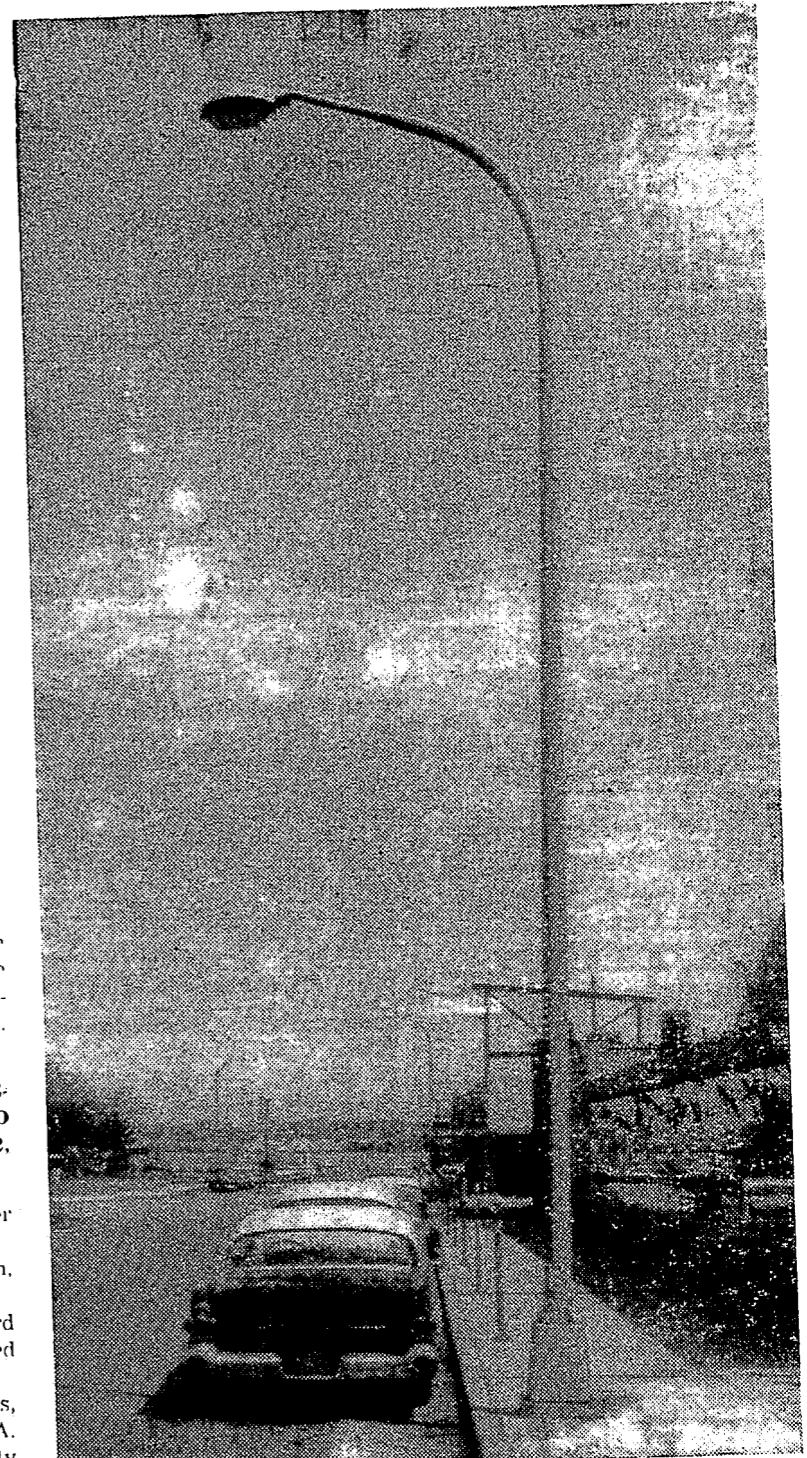

## TO INSTALL NEW STREETLIGHTS



CLARKSTON TO SHINE — These attractive mercury vapor street lights will be installed later this fall in the business district of Clarkston.

Late October or November has been set by the Detroit-Edison Company as the installation date for 30 new street lights in the Clarkston Village business district. According to Harold Goyette, in charge of Village properties, the new lights will afford three times greater illumination than the present lights.

Jack Zeunen, Pontiac branch manager of the Detroit-Edison Company, following approval by the Clarkston Village Council, reported that twenty 20,000 lumen mercury vapor ornamental lights and ten 10,000 lumen post-top ornamental lights will replace 16 of the lights now in the business district.

The lights, mounted on 25 foot steel poles painted aluminum will be set at the edge of the sidewalk and overhang the street. Edison will remove six 6,000 and ten 10,000 lumen overhead lights to make way for the thirty new lamps.

According to Mr. Zeunen, the lights will be maintained by the Detroit-Edison Company and replaced by them in the case of vandalism.

THEN out of a clear 'night' sky, the paper press jumped a foot off the floor and back down to a dead halt. A quick, long distance call to 'Pa' Wilson, owner of the Concord News, near Jackson, proved to be of little help in diagnosing the press's illness. With nurse Sonja, I as the 'Doc' and Pa as 'long distance instructor,' the operation began. As any 'Doc' hates to do, I must report we lost our patient. Its final words were nothing but squeaks and groans!

Pa, out of suggestions, and the 'nurse' and I out of patience, (or should I say patient) the phone call was brought to an end.

Moments later about 2:30, the phone broke the silence with you guessed it, Pa on the other end. "Throw your last two pages, papers, mailing machine and kids in the car. We'll meet you at our shop at 4:15 ready to make that last run!"

Fifteen minutes later we were on our way, sure we couldn't make it back here in time to mail the papers, but more than willing to try.

Scene II — Concord News — With me at the press, Ma and the wife folding, and Pa mailing, we were able to leave the Concord News at 6:25. With me at the wheel till I could no longer see, then the wife driving the remainder of the trip, our destination, the Clarkston Post Office, was reached at 7:50 a.m. Sympathetic postal employees were the final say on whether the papers go or no! Even though we were 50 minutes late, the word was GO, so to them we say thanks.

To Ma and Pa goes a THANK YOU too great to express in writing. We will be forever grateful to you!

## GOVERNOR ROMNEY REPORTS

One of the blessings of our system of government is the extent to which people have access to their leaders, and the extent to which leaders have access to the people.

This idea may be hard to accept for many of you who have not seen me since the campaign, or who did not even see me then.

Certainly in a state as large as ours, with a population of eight-million people, many people will never come into contact with their governor.

Yet from my point of view, the number of people that I see on an average day is a continual source of amazement.

This came home to me again a few days ago in Flint, where I was appearing at one of the 16 regional meetings I have held around the state to hear views on taxation and fiscal reform.

As I was leaving the meeting, I was surrounded by a group of 30 women from nearby Flushing who asked my help in solving a critical water shortage in their community. This informal meeting served a double purpose: It allowed the women to air their immediate problem and it reminded me of a long-range problem — the specter of water shortage in the Water Wonderland.

Chance meetings with individuals or groups in the course of my travels around the state are only one way in which I can better inform myself on what people are thinking, and improve their understanding of what I am thinking.

Every day in the course of normal office business I see dozens, sometimes hundreds, of people who have made appointments with me to discuss a wide range of problems.

Since I took office last January, I have devoted Thursday mornings to citizens' sessions, in which any citizen can have a five-minute talk with me about any subject that concerns him.

I have also been to every corner of the state on speaking engagements. Since January 1, I have given more than 200 speeches, and requests for appearances continue to pour in.

I am flattered and amazed at the number of these requests and sincerely wish that I could accept every invitation.

But when I took office, and even before that, I decided to be a working governor instead of a continually campaigning governor.

If I were to accept all of the invitations which come into the office for my appearance, I would be on the road all of the time. That would mean that none of the pressing problems that confront our state — fiscal reform, conservation, education, civil rights — could receive the attention which I was elected to give them.

I continue to be concerned about the number of invitations from worthy groups and individuals that I am forced to decline.

I hope you will understand how sincerely I want to see all of you from time to time, and appreciate how this is impossible if I am to fulfill the duties of my office.

The afternoon was filled with a carnival complete with eight booths of games such as the Coke Tip Up and Pound the Nail. Following the games, races were held for all age groups and each winner was presented with 50 cent pieces which had been donated for the day's activities by the Fire Department.

There was an overall attendance on the playgrounds this week of 3600. Everyone busied themselves with such things as scavenger hunts, stories, fairy tales, and skits, along with other activities based on the Fantasy Week theme which was chosen for this week.

Things to look forward to in the future are the Teen Dances held each Thursday when as many as four albums are given away each night as door prizes. All adults should keep in mind that the first Adult Dance will be held one week from Friday night, on July 12th at 8:00 on the Senior High Tennis Courts, so bring your friends and come out for an evening of enjoyment.

The Recreation Baseball is becoming one of the major points of interest in the summer Recreation Program and the season will be topped off with all the boys going to the August 21 game between the Detroit Tigers and Minnesota Twins.

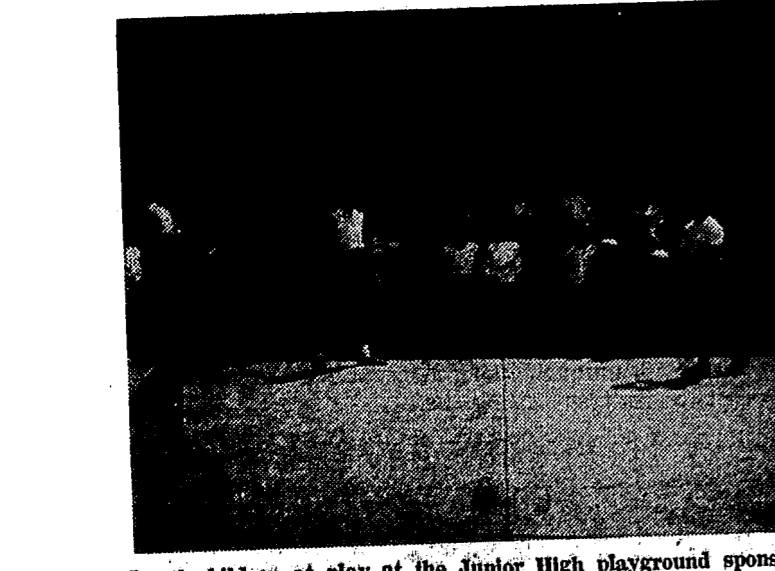

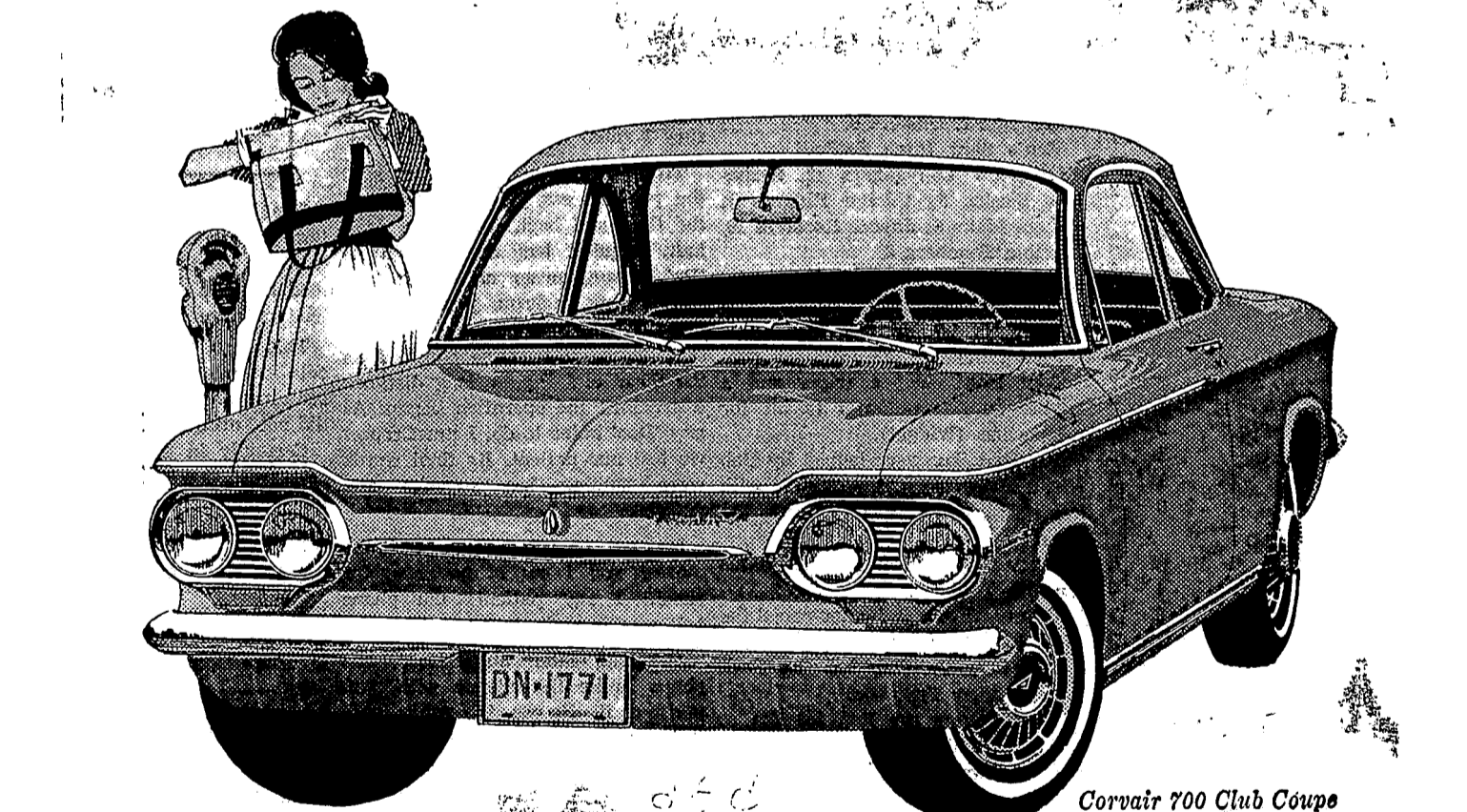

## REPORT OF CONDITION OF Clarkston State Bank

of Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan, at the close of business June 29th, 1963, a State banking institution organized and operating under the banking laws of this State and a member of the Federal Reserve System. 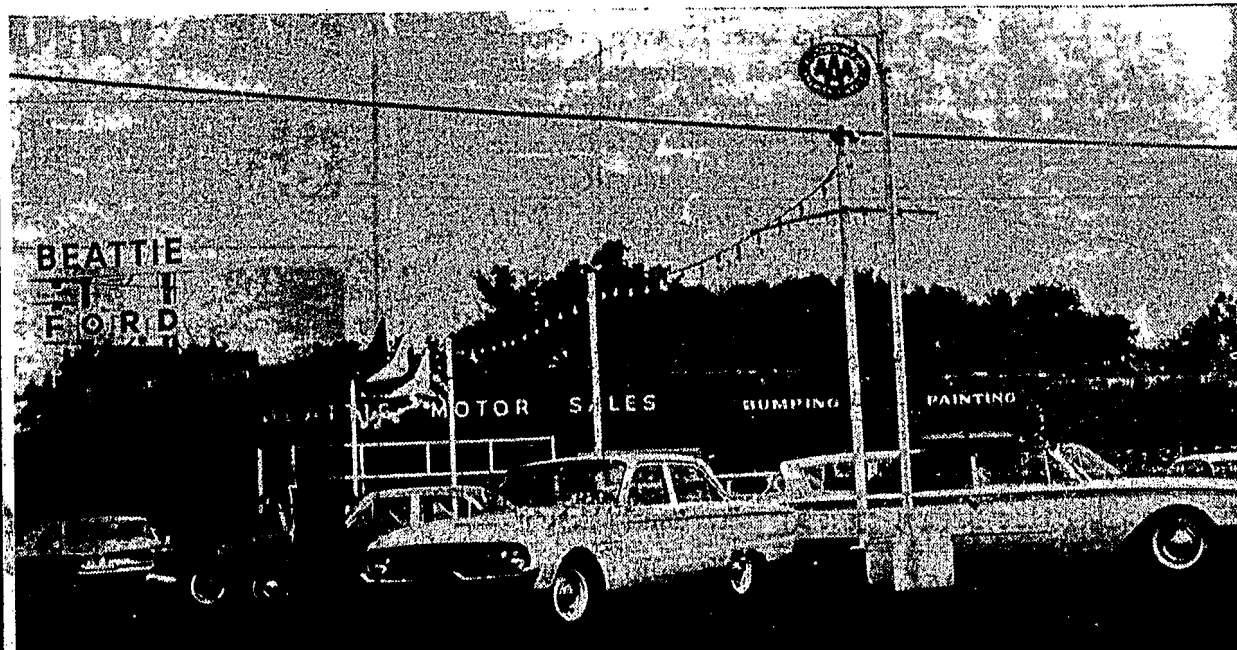

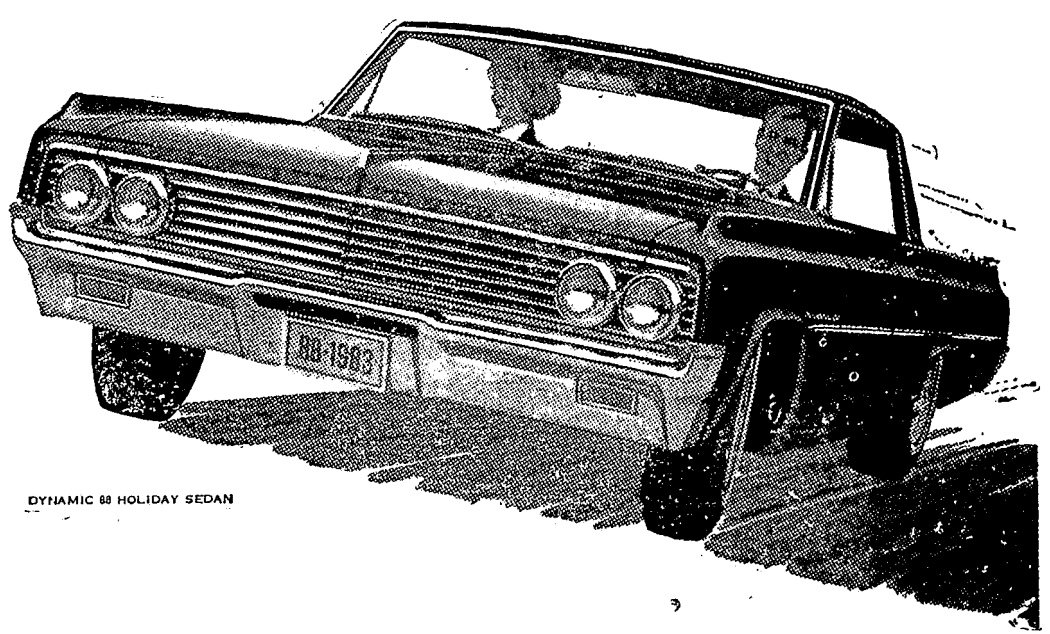

If beef steak is your meat choice, remember that quality and thickness are important for tender eating satisfaction. Select U. S. Choice grade, or comparable quality, and have the steak cut at least one inch thick. If the crowd is large, a thick sirloin is one of the better choices. Sirloin yields more meat in relation to bone than other steaks and it's easy to carve into serving size pieces.

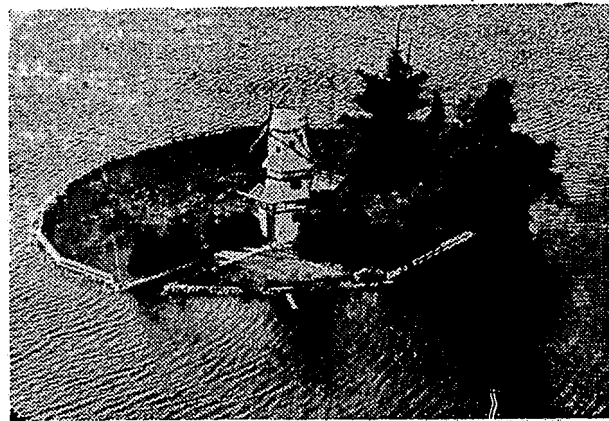
Beef rib steaks are a popular barbecue choice. These cost less than tenderloin, T-Bone, and club steaks. They're cut from the rib section of the animal.

Blade steaks, cut from the same area of the shoulder as blade chuck roast, are less tender than other beef steaks but they are even lower in cost. You may wish to tenderize blade steak before cooking time. You can also broil a whole chuck roast if you choose U.S. Choice grade or comparable quality. The arm chuck roast is best for the grill because there is less bone and waste... only the small arm bone.

Pork ribs, fresh or smoked ham, pork steak, ham steak or a boneless roll of loin or shoulder are excellent choices. Inexpensive lamb breast makes tasty riblets too, or select a boned lamb shoulder roast. Steaks cut from lamb leg are favorites for those who like lamb and lots of it.

Kabobs made with cubes of lamb, beef or pork cubes alternated with vegetables or fruits. These are favorites with most folks.

Perhaps chicken is your family choice for the grill. Look for fryers that give the right size eating pieces when cut into halves or quarters. These range from 1½ to 2½ pounds in size. Allow ¼ to ½ a fryer per person when grilling.

The Ortonville, Oakhill and Seymour Lake 4-H members keep their suitcases packed. They have been going and coming in so many different directions that it is difficult to keep track of all their travels.

At the Seney Wild Life Refuge near Seney, the visitors toured the refuge area, seeing deer and some of the few remaining bald eagles in Michigan.

One of the highlights of an evening meeting was the presentation of awards by the Michigan Conservation Department to nine of the leaders including Mrs. Leon Hutchings, An Ortonville 4-Her, Tim Stayton, was chosen by his group to help plan and lead next year's Camp.

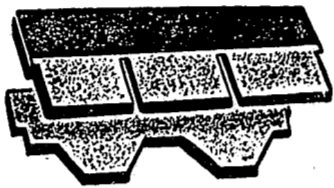
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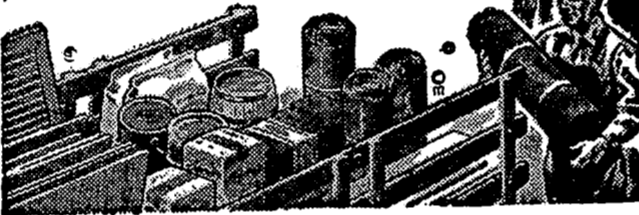

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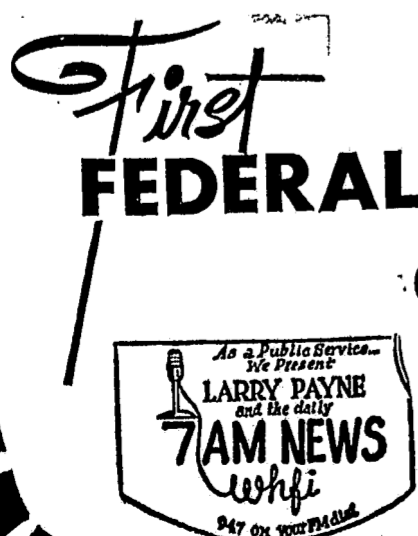
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
