

ORTONVILLE

The regular meeting of the Ortonville Village Council was held August 12, 1963. Present were: D. Barnes, L. Boutell, R. Sutton, and R. Richards.

Visors present were Russ Jencks, John Wenger, Jack Hamilton and Stacey Hoffman.

Upon request of the Council, Mr. Loomis from the Oakland County Road Commission, who was present at the meeting, agreed to investigate the problem of drainage along the county roads in the village to see what can be done. Mr. Buckingham and Mr. Loomis looked at the streets involved and Mr. Loomis promised to send Mr. Wright to make a further investigation.

The bills were read and ordered on motion of D. Barnes, supported by R. Sutton.

Mr. Hoffman asked the Council to check the wiring in his house which is owned by Don Kinney. The Council requested the Building Committee to investigate and inform Mr. Hoffman of their findings.

Mr. John Wenger requested the Council to adopt the State Electric Inspection Code. The Building Committee will investigate the possibility of doing so and report.

Mr. Jack Hamilton volunteered to be the chairman of the Zoning Committee. Dr. George Jaruga and Mr. Lavern Boutell were appointed to work with Mr. Hamilton on this Committee.

There was a motion by Mr. Boutell supported by Mr. Richards to have the police radio checked and repaired if necessary. Motion carried.

Mr. Lawrence Follis was present to discuss some of his court cases with the Council.

Mr. Jencks was present to ask the street committee to check the condition of his sidewalk.

Mr. Borst read a letter from the State Highway Department stating that they would consider installing signs on I-75 designating Ortonville.

We have examined the balance sheets of CLARKSTON COMMUNITY SCHOOLS as of June 30, 1963, and the related statements of revenue and expenditures for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In accordance with the recommendations by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction we have prepared our audit report on the basis of the "modified accrual basis of accounting". This method was chosen as the accounting method to be used after discussion with your school administrators. The "modified accrual basis of accounting" provides that services and materials purchased and used for any given fiscal year are charged as an expense for that year. However, receivables owing to Clarkston Community Schools at June 30, 1963 and inventories on hand are not reflected on the enclosed balance sheets.

Accounts payable at June 30, 1962 for services and materials purchased are included in the attached statements as expenditures for the year ended June 30, 1963. In subsequent years, current year expenditures will not include amounts owing at the end of the preceding school year for services and materials used in the preceding year.

The scope of our examination was not extended to include the child accounting records of the school system. However, State aid payments which were based on such child accounting records were confirmed directly by us from the State authorities. We also inspected a letter from the County Superintendent of schools which stated that they had audited the child accounting records during the period and found that they were "correct and comply with the laws of the State of Michigan."

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheets and statements of revenue and expenditures prepared on the "modified accrual basis of accounting" present fairly the financial position of Clarkston Community Schools at June 30, 1963 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, except for the treatment of receivables, inventories and payables at June 30, 1962 and June 30, 1963 as commented in the foregoing paragraphs.

Mrs. William Sutton has returned home after a stay at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital for observation and treatment.

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
