### Millage Distributed From State Highway Fund

The State Highway Department has started distributing second quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages. State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said net receipts of the Highway Fund during April, May and June of 1963, amounted to \$47,265,540, an increase of \$2,487,060, or 5.5 per cent, compared to the same period of 1962.

Oakland County's share totaled \$973,679 while Clarkston received \$1,169. All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

After deduction of collection costs and the Waterways Commission's share, the money is distributed under provisions of state laws which provide that 47 per cent goes to the State's 83 counties for use on county roads and 18 per cent to 515 incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

Under this formula, the State Highway Department will receive \$22,214,804 as its share of the second quarter collections, while the counties will receive \$16,542,939 and the incorporated cities and villages will get \$8,507,797.

Nearly one-sixth of Oakland University's Spring Term students made the honors list, Dean Donald O'Dowd announced today. Of the 98 students achieving B averages or better, ten made straight A, and 22 others half A, half B or better. The other 66 had averages of at least B. One of these is from Clarkston. ### Dr. Heatley To Operate New Waterford Village Clinic

Waterford Village has become the location for the general practice of William F. Heatley, D.O. Dr. Heatley is a Physician and Surgeon with particular interest in Internal medicine. He will occupy the space left vacant by Morrison's Drug Store at 5807 Dixie Highway.

The former Drug Store space has been completely renovated by its owner, Thomas Corbin and will be known as The Waterford Village Clinic. The Clinic contains four treatment rooms, lab, x-ray, two rest rooms, business and Doctors offices, in addition to a large waiting room. The Clinic features a large parking lot immediately behind the building. There are two approaches, one from Andersonville Rd., and the other from Dixie Highway adjacent to the building, which provides a private service entrance for ambulance service.

Dr. Heatley received his undergraduate training at the University of Toledo. This was interrupted for a four year term in the Air Force during the Korean conflict. He returned to the U. of T., spent one year at Assumption University, Windsor, Ontario. Dr. Heatley graduated from the U. of T. in 1958. His professional degree was obtained in May 1962 following a four year study of medicine and Osteopathy at Kirksville, Mo. school of Osteopathy and Surgery. He recently completed one year of internship at the newly constructed and renovated Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital.

Does it mean that the O.C.S.C.R.R.A. is already trying to right the wrongs they may have done, peacefully and without bitterness or force?

### Clarkston Locals

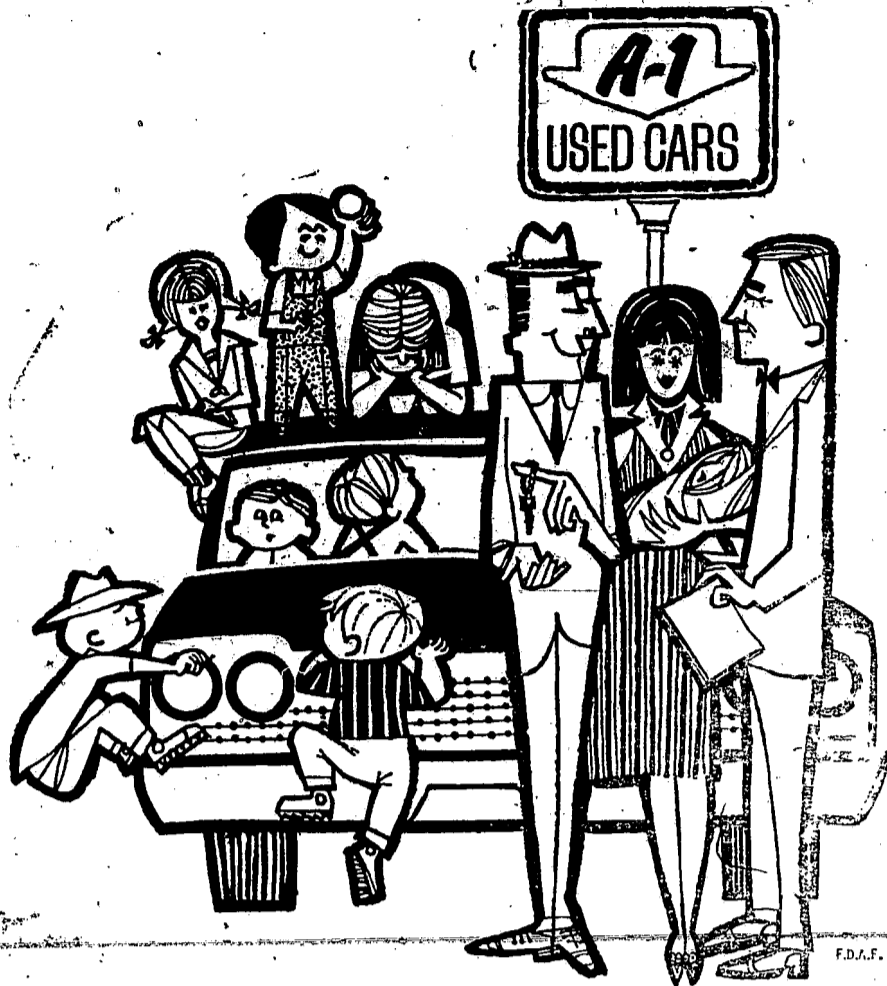
