## Help!

Do you have a Civil War Veteran relative who was buried in Oakland County after 1925? If so, Mrs. Roy V. Barnes, 813 Catalpa Drive, Royal Oak (tel: Lincoln 4-2487) needs your help. She is the Oakland County chairman of the Committee on Registration of Graves, one of many committees formed by the Civil War Centennial Commission.

In 1925 the General Richardson Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, of Pontiac, recorded all burials in all the ninety cemeteries in Oakland County. Using their records, and the 1894 Census of Michigan Soldiers, Sailors and Marines, and the 1817-1877 History of Oakland County, Mrs. Barnes is preparing her part in "The Graves Register 1925 to give her the information.

The veteran's rank, Company and Regiment, and the birth and death dates when known, is desired, as well as the name and location of the cemetery in which he is interred. Also, is there a G.A.R. or Government marker on the grave? This kind of information from all counties in the state is to be published this year; therefore, the work needs to be completed soon.

The Civil War Centennial Observance has been taking place since 1961. This is in no way a celebration but a recognition of what the veterans of that day did for a cause in which they believed. The Civil War Centennial Commission in Michigan has many volunteers who have done research and prepared papers on the effect of the Civil War on Communications, Farming, Labor, Manufacturing, Medicine, Music, Education, Women and other subjects.

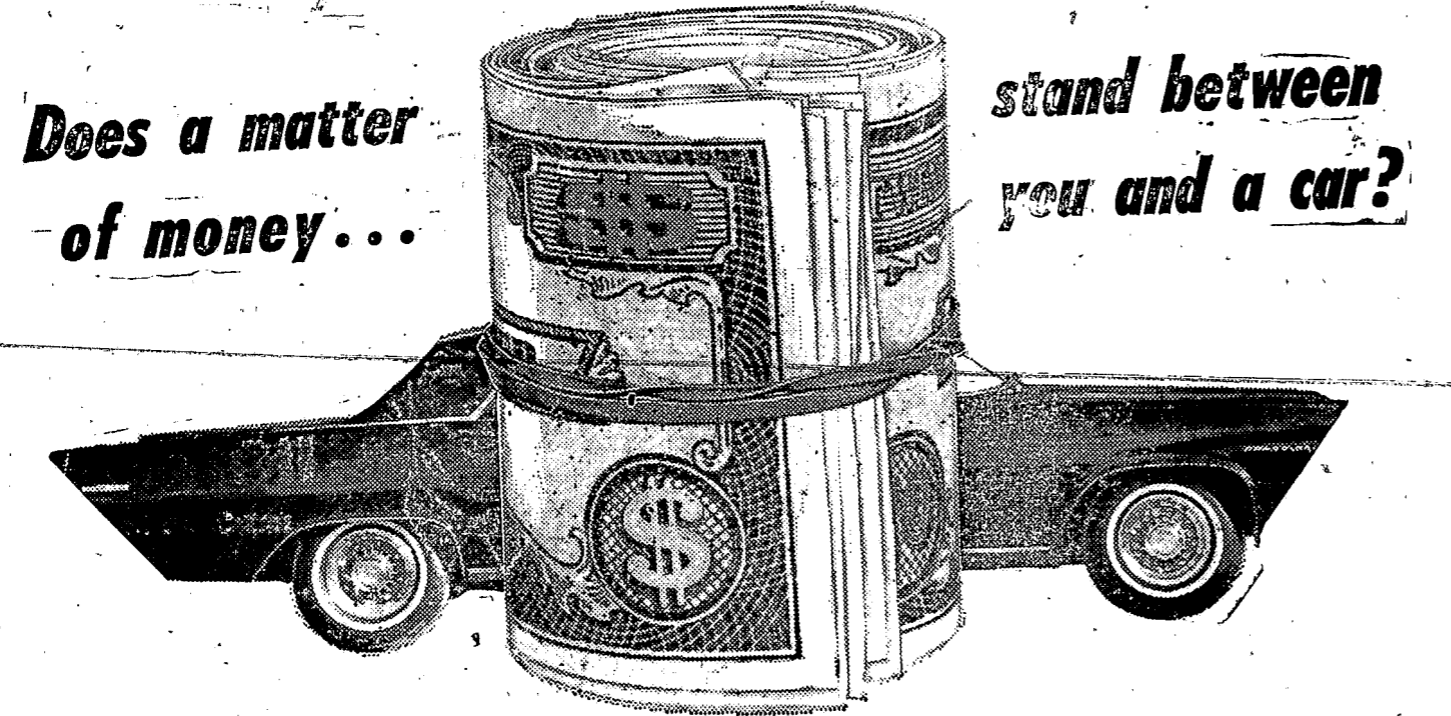

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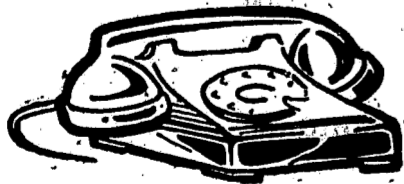
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## Reports on Area Service Personnel

Marine Private First Class Michael R. Wood, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard G. Nicholson of 6600 Nadette Dr., Clarkston, is serving with the Third Marine Aircraft Wing at the El Toro Marine Corps Air Station, Santa Ana, California.
