Initial School Registrations Exceed Expectations

The Clarkston Community Schools anticipated an enrollment of approximately 4500 students for the 1963-64 school year. Some 4620 students have already registered and this figure is expected to be increased slightly by the fourth Friday of September, (the date deadline for

computing initial enrollments and subsequent gross state aid allowances). The enrollment of 4620 students represents an increase of 6.8% or a gain of 297 pupils over the 1962-63 enrollment.

The breakdown of enrollment by grades, as of September 10, is as follows:

Kindergarten, 437; First Grade, 467; Second Grade, 461; Third Grade, 394; Fourth Grade, 414; Fifth Grade, 378; Sixth Grade, 331; Special Education, 10; Junior High, 703; Senior High, 1,025.

School Bus Law Passed

A new law, which became effective Friday, September 6, requires school buses to pull off the pavement whenever possible to load or unload children.

Erwin Hendershott, director of bus transportation for Oakland Schools, said the new regulation will permit a motorist to pass a school bus which has pulled off the road after the red light has stopped flashing. The motorist is required to stop first and then proceed past the bus no faster than ten miles per hour.

The purpose of the law, Hendershott explained, is to maintain the flow of traffic as well as to provide for the safety of school children.

The law is stated in Section 682, paragraph B, of the Motor Vehicle Code.

Roll Call Needed to Decide Issue

A roll call vote of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors defeated the proposal to annex a portion of Brandon Township to the Village of Ortonville 59-20 after the Boundaries Committee returned a split 2-2 decision.

Mr. Murphy, Oakland County Clerk read the proposal for annexation and also stated that petitions signed by four hundred persons and thirteen individual letters were on file opposing the annexation.

Attorney Ray Paul, representing Mr. and Mrs. George Kruchko, owners of a farm on M-15, objected to the resolution on the grounds that of the twenty persons who signed the original annexation petition, fourteen have now changed their minds and do not wish to be annexed to the Village.

Mr. Paul further said that Ortonville does not need more land for growth as his observation showed that 50% of the property within the village limits is now vacant. He said "The Village Council is confusing geographic growth with real growth."

Brandon Township Supervisor, Alex Solley, who has been actively opposing the annexation addressed the supervisor's meeting and called upon several of the Brandon township residents in the audience who were present to say whether they

wished to be annexed to the Village. All those questioned answered, "No". Mrs. Fellows of Granger Road then arose and spoke in favor of the annexation.

Solley further said that the main supporters of the annexation were persons (meaning Mr. Glenn) who did not live in the area and wanted the annexation in order to profit from a subdivision in which the streets would not have to be paved. According to Mr. Solley, the village does not require the paving of streets in a new subdivision, whereas Brandon township does.

Mr. Charles Sherman, Ortonville Village president, presented the position of the Village. Mr. Sherman said that the Village was not the instigator of the original annexation proposition. A petition was presented to the Council in their regular order of business, where upon they appointed a committee to handle the matter.

President Sherman said that the mile-square area of the village has not been expanded in the 114 years of its existence. Now that the annexation had been brought to the Village by the petitioners, the Village would like to increase its boundaries in order to provide better facilities and services for the residents and to create more property for new building.

According to Mr. Sherman, the fear that annexation would create ruinous taxation is unfounded. Ortonville with a population of 740 persons has been able to black top all of its streets, provide lighting and other public services and at the present time has only a \$4000 indebtedness. He said that the highest tax in the Village is \$66.00. When the Boundaries Committee reported their split verdict, Case and Taft for and Moore and Lessiter against the proposition, a roll call vote of the supervisors showed a response of 59 no and 20 yes votes.

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Racing Ordinance Adopted

INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NO. 48 REGULATIONS OF SPEED EXHIBITIONS

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND LICENSE RACING AND SPEED EXHIBITIONS OF POWERED AND MOTORED VEHICLES AND ANIMALS AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS HEREOF.

THE TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. OPERATION

No person, firm, individual, corporation, association, partnership, or society shall, after the effective date hereof, set up, promote, publish, advertise, or otherwise aid and/or assist in the operation, promotion, holding, setting up of, or participating in any racing or speed exhibition or powered or motored vehicles or animals to which admission is obtained on the payment of money within the limits of the Township of Independence without first having obtained a license from the Independence Township Board authorizing said race or speed exhibit of powered or motored vehicles or animals.

SECTION II. APPLICATION FOR LICENSE

Before any license, as required by Section I, is granted, an application shall be made to the Independence Township Clerk, upon forms to be provided by said Clerk, by the applicant. Said application shall be in writing and under oath which shall include among other things, the following information, to-wit:

- A. A drawing, diagram, blueprint, and/or sketch of the premises involved showing the proposed track and/or racing site, all buildings on the premises, and proposed buildings on the premises and all adjacent structures to the premises. Said drawing, sketch, diagram and/or blueprint shall be drawn to scale.
- B. The seating arrangement, if any, for spectators, including engineering and building plans therefor.
- C. The means of ingress and egress for such spectators which shall consist of at least two (2) aisles not less than six (6) feet in width and it shall provide one such aisle for each Five Hundred (500) seats provided for spectators.
- D. The size and location and construction specifications of guard rails, and abutments and embankments.
- E. The location and construction of off-street parking facilities.
- F. The location and type of fencing on the property.
- G. The location and type of sanitary facilities available.
- H. The zoning designation of the premises.

Said application shall be accompanied by a deposit of the required license fee in cash or certified check which fee, in the event that the application shall be denied, shall be returned by the clerk to the said applicant.

SECTION III. TIME AND OPERATION

No licensee shall operate any of the aforesaid exhibits or races after the hour of 8:00 P.M. Eastern Standard time and all patrons and participants are to vacate the premises prior to 9:00 P.M. Eastern Standard time. No licensee shall operate any of the aforesaid exhibits or races before the hour of 12:00 Noon.

SECTION IV. POLICE PROTECTION

No such licensee shall operate any AND AMPLIFIERS. No licensee shall be granted to a hibits unless a minimum of three (3) licensee so long as any loud speaker

special uniformed peace officers are provided by the licensee at said race or speed exhibit site for a period beginning not less than one (1) hour before the scheduled start of any event and until at least one (1) hour after the end of the last scheduled event.

SECTION V. PARKING FACILITIES

No license shall be granted unless the licensee provides a minimum of one (1) automobile parking space for every four (4) seats provided for spectators; or if no seats are provided for spectators there shall be one (1) automobile parking space for every four spectators.

SECTION VI. FENCING

No license shall be granted unless the licensee constructs a fence of sturdy construction at the minimum height of eight (8) feet around the entire premises including parking facilities.

SECTION VII. SANITARY FACILITIES

No license shall be granted unless the licensee constructs and provides adequate sanitary facilities, as determined by the Township Board of Health for all spectators, employees, servants and agents.

SECTION VIII. FIRST AID

No license shall be granted unless the licensee provides suitable and adequate facilities for the rendering of first aid to spectators, agents, servants, employees, and participants.

SECTION IX. FIRE PROTECTION

No license shall be granted unless the licensee provides suitable and adequate fire fighting facilities including fire extinguishers.

SECTION X. PUBLIC LIABILITY INSURANCE

No license shall be granted unless the licensee shows evidence of having obtained public liability insurance in the amount of not less than Fifty Thousand and No/100 (\$50,000.00) for injury to one person and not less than Three Hundred Thousand and No/100 (\$300,000.00) for one accident.

SECTION XI. CONSTRUCTION OF SEATS

No license shall be granted until the Independence Township Building Inspector has approved the construction plans and issued building permits for the construction, and final inspection certificates of any seats. Said Building Inspector shall not issue a building permit or final inspection certificate until it reasonably appears that the structural strength of said seats will be adequate to sustain the weight necessary for said seats to bear to permit the spectators to enter upon, leave and view the speed exhibition or race in safety.

SECTION XII. COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER TOWNSHIP ORDINANCES

No license shall be granted to a licensee until said licensee has fully complied with all Independence Township zoning ordinances and other Township ordinances and regulations.

SECTION XIII. PROTECTIONS OF SPECTATORS

No license shall be granted to a licensee until he has made adequate provisions for the protection of all spectators and non-participants in the race or speed exhibit from injury by any of the racing objects through the construction of an adequate and suitable barrier, barricade, abutment, and/or embankment.

SECTION XIV. LOUD SPEAKERS

No licensee shall be granted to a licensee so long as any loud speaker

or amplifier employed on the premises by said licensee can be heard from any distance greater than One Hundred (100) feet off of the premises.

SECTION XV. INSPECTION BY TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS

It shall be a condition of all licenses issued hereunder that the operation and facilities be at all times subject to the inspection of the duly authorized officials of the aforesaid Township.

SECTION XVI. TERM OF LICENSE

All licenses issued hereof shall expire on the first Monday of April following the issuance thereof.

SECTION XVII. FEES

The fee for the issuance of any such license shall be as follows, to-wit: One Hundred and No/100 (\$100.00) Dollars. Said fee shall be payable to the Independence Township Treasurer at the time of issuance of this license.

SECTION XVIII. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

If any section, provision, phrase, or word of this Ordinance shall be held void, ineffective, or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such finding shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, provisions, phrases, or words hereof.

SECTION XIX. PENALTY

Any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association, or society that violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a

fine of not more than One Hundred and No/100 (\$100.00) Dollars and/or confinement in the Oakland County jail for a period not exceeding 90 days or both. Each act committed in violation of the provisions hereof shall be deemed a separate offence and shall be punished accordingly.

SECTION XX. EFFECTIVE DATE

Independence Township Ordinance No. 48 adopted on the 3rd day of September, 1963, to become effective on the 11th day of October, 1963.

Moved by Altman, supported by Johnson, that the Township of Independence adopt Township Ordinance No. 48, an ordinance to regulate and license racing and speed exhibitions of powered and motored vehicles and animals and to provide penalties for violation of the same. 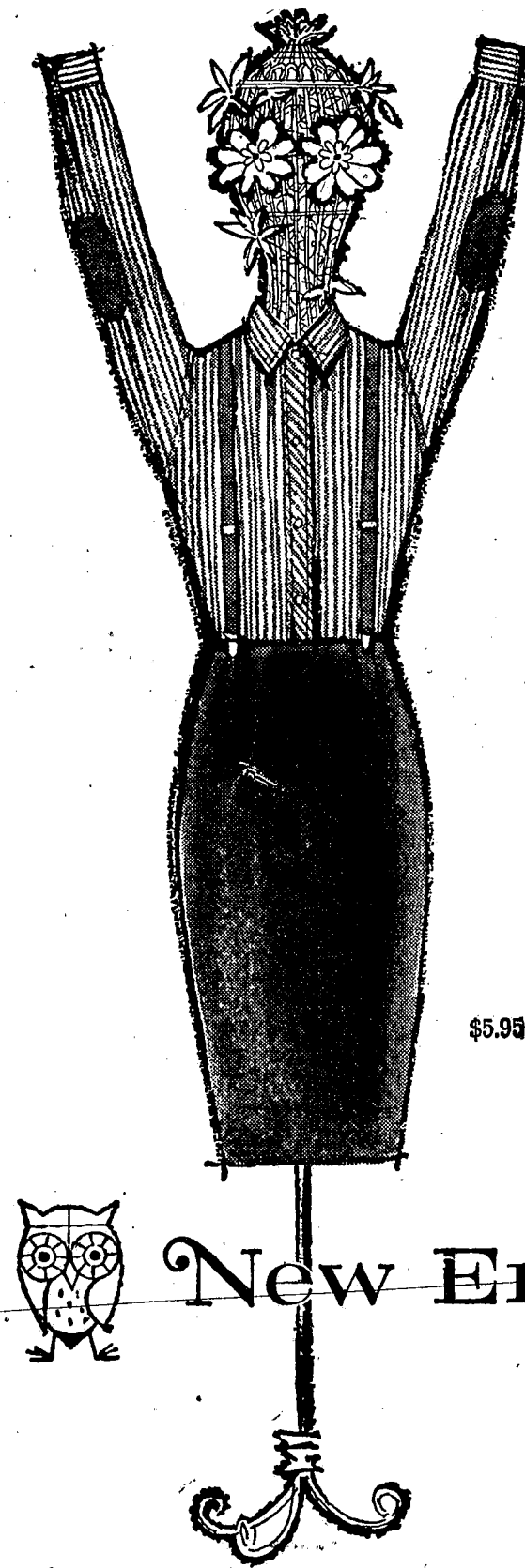
