Community College To Be Discussed

A meeting of the Citizens Advisory Council of Committee on a proposed Oakland County community college has been called for Wednesday, October 16, at 8 p.m. in the Oakland Schools offices.

Wendell Brown, acting chairman of the steering committee, invited any other citizens who wish to help in promoting the establishment of community colleges.

A county-wide vote in June favored the establishment of a college but rejected a one mill tax to support the institution. Under state law, tax support must be voted at the same time the establishment of a community college is approved.

The Oakland Schools Board of Education has indicated a second vote on the community college issue will be placed on the ballot in the June 8 school election.

GOVERNOR ROMNEY REPORTS



The problems of an increasing number of senior citizens were paramount when I drew up my proposal for fiscal reform.

Much criticism has been directed at a single aspect of this program the provision to defer property taxes for senior citizens.

Without even considering the validity of these criticisms and certainly they have some validity, many other benefits which my program would afford senior citizens are generally being overlooked in the debate over the property tax deferral provision.

Here are some of the ways in which the program would recognize the special problems of senior citizens.

1. Social security benefits would be exempted from state and local income taxes.

2. Every citizen over 65 would receive a double exemption - \$1,200 in computing his or her state income tax. If both husband and wife were over 65, this would mean that the first \$2,400 of family income over and above special security benefits would be exempt.

3. If the city in which the senior citizen lives imposes an income tax, each couple over 65 would have a \$2,400 tax exemption over and above social security benefits in computing that tax too.

The first three points add up to the fact that the average senior citizen couple will pay no state or local income tax. In addition, senior citizens will enjoy the following tax savings:

4. Prescription drugs would be exempted from the sales tax - a significant savings where there is illness.

5. The 4% sales tax would be taken off food.

6. Along with other citizens, senior citizens would get a 20% reduction in local property taxes imposed for school purposes.

7. The intangibles tax would be repealed. This would mean a real savings for many senior citizens who have retired and receive a part of their income in dividends or interest.

8. Finally, there is the property tax deferral itself. I recognize the need for senior citizen relief from property taxes; I think my proposal is a sound one. Under this provision, senior citizens would have the choice of deferring property taxes on their homesteads until their death or until they dispose of their property.

At the outset, this would be limited to taxes up to \$200 per year on homesteads with a market value of less than \$10,000 where family income is under \$2,000.

There are three basic arguments against straight property tax exemption, rather than deferral. They are these:

1. With a few years of experience, it should be possible to broaden the program to cover many more people than could ever be made eligible for straight exemption. It should be possible, in fact, to eliminate any limitations on family income and property value. This could not be done under the exemption approach without huge expenditures of general state money.

2. One of the principal benefits of straight exemption would be to the children or other heirs of senior citizens. Is it fair to ask general taxpayers to pay millions of dollars of taxes each year so that these relatives can inherit property free and clear after the owner's death?

3. After the first few years, a tax deferral program will become self-sustaining without any charge to the taxpayers other than a modest amount to pay for administration and to cover losses. An exemption program would cost the taxpayers millions of dollars each year for as long as the program continued.

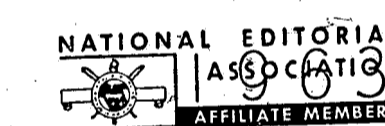

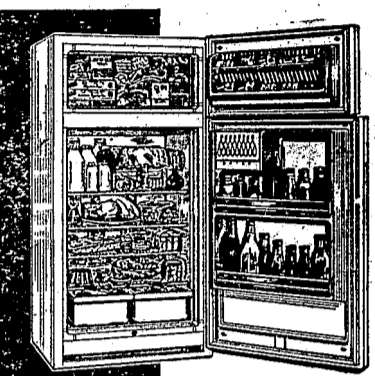
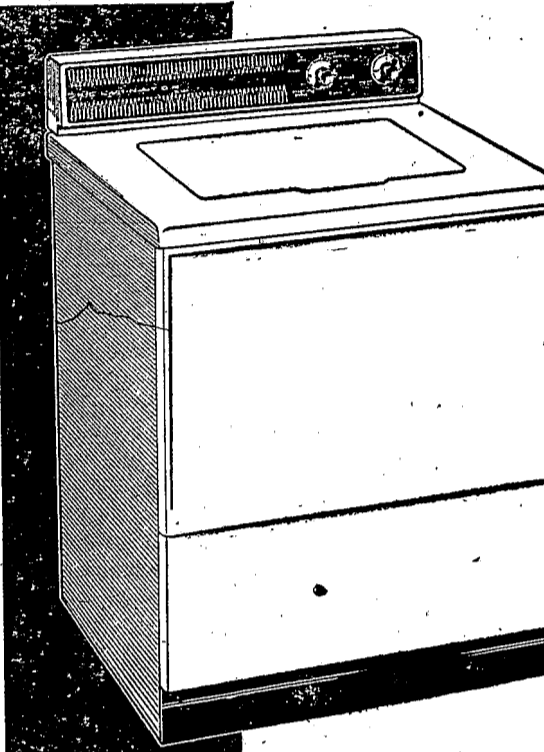

A family dinner honoring the couple will be hosted by their son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Friday, at their Eston Road home Saturday afternoon.

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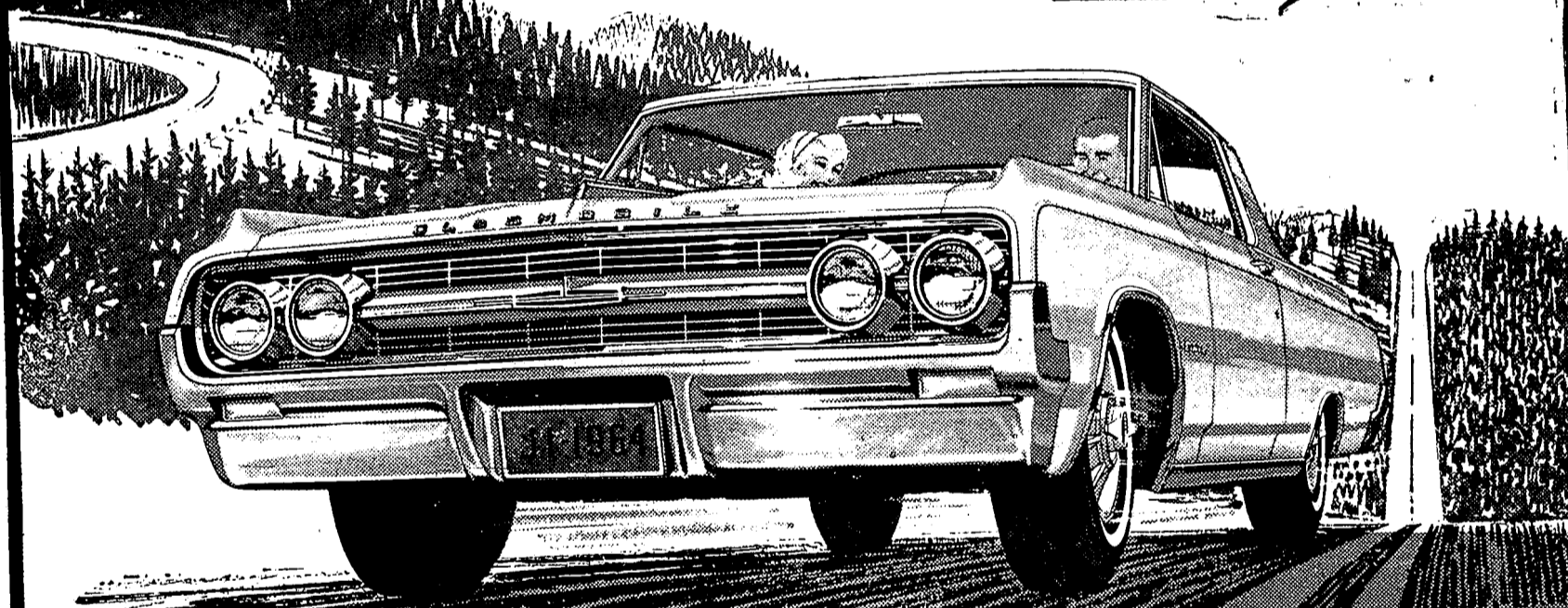
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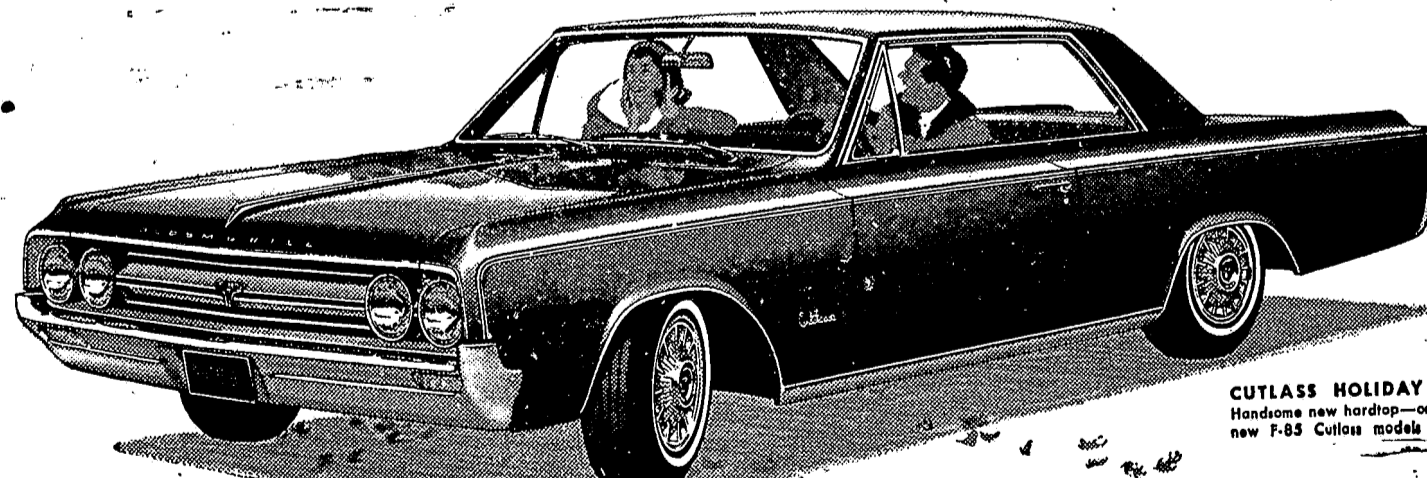

If you are not satisfied with your newly purchased home, you cannot force the builder to act by withholding payment on the mortgage.
